Teacher of the Year: Mr. Andrew Rupp

For always going the extra mile for his students and for forming strong connections with each student is why Mr. Andrew Rupp has been chosen as the Del.Aware's 2020 Teacher of the Year. In 2013, Mr. Rupp graduated from Penn State University with a bachelor's degree in the field of kinesiology with a focus on exercise physiology and movement science. Then he went to East Stroudsburg University to complete a postbachelor's teacher certification program and finished student teaching.

Mr. Rupp knew at an early age that he wanted to be part of the science field.

"I've always been the type of person to ask 'why?' and seek explanations for everything," said Mr. Rupp. "As I grew up, I realized science was the only way to truly get evidence-based, reliable, satisfying answers to those sorts of questions."

Prior to teaching at DV, Mr. Rupp taught at Western Wayne High School and Honesdale High School. In 2015, he was a student observer at DVMS. He enjoyed DV so much that he told

DVMS principal Dr. Pete Iopollo if he had the opportunity he would love to teach here. Three years later he heard rumors that there might be an opening at the high school, so he applied and the rest was history.

Currently, he teaches General Chemistry, Anatomy and Physiology and Science 9. Next year he will be adding AP Chemistry to that list.

His favorite part of his job is watching his students graduate. As they are heading out into the world, Mr. Rupp always thinks to himself, "Yeah, they're going to be all right." Rupp has found a new appreciation for his students.

^a'Having lived through the COVID crisis and teaching from home, it's really struck me how much my students mean to me. I certainly love the things I teach and I place a lot of value on the skills and material that get covered in each of my classes, but all of that pales in comparison to how much I appreciate getting to see my students every day."

His advice to new teachers is to "get friendly with people who've got more experience than you, then lean on them until you start to find your way."

Mr. Rupp recommends that new teachers take as much knowledge from them as possible and always remember to do right by the students. In addition, he also had some advice for his students.

"Develop a work ethic that is going to enable you to become the sort of person you will ultimately be happy being," said Mr. Rupp. "Don't just hear people, listen. Be empathetic to others, and always try to understand where someone is coming from, even if their life experiences are wildly different from your own. Be skeptical, demand evidence for everything, and never stop asking 'why?""
