Delaware Valley School District Health and Safety Plan outlines our school district's instructional and non- instructional school reopening activities for the 2020-2021 school year. As with all emergency plans, the Health and Safety Plan developed for each school entity should be tailored to the unique needs of each school and should be created in consultation with local health agencies. All school activities are informed by <u>Governor Wolf's Process to Open Pennsylvania</u>.

The Governor's plan has categorized reopening into three broad phases: red, yellow, or green. These designations signal how counties and/or regions may begin easing some restrictions on school, work, congregate settings, and social interactions. Depending upon the public health conditions in our county, there could be additional actions, orders, or guidance provided by the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) and/or the Pennsylvania Department of Health (DOH) designating our county as being in the red, yellow, or green phase. There may be times that our county may not experience a straight path from a red designation, to a yellow, and then a green designation. Instead, cycling back and forth between less restrictive to more restrictive designations may occur as public health indicators improve or worsen in our local area. Delaware Valley School District Health and Safety Plan accounts for changing conditions to ensure fluid transition from more to less restrictive conditions in each of the phase requirements as needed.

This first version of the plan is simply for the summer 2020 Extended School Year (ESY) programming. The second version that will relate to reopening all seven schools in the fall will be developed and approved later this summer. Since this version involves a small number of students, many of the procedures and practices are not applicable to the larger population returning in the fall.

Note: the red and yellow phases have not been completed in this first version as Pike County is in the green phase. All three phases will be completed in the second version. If Pike County were to regress back to the yellow phase, we feel confident that the procedures and practices detailed in this plan would still serve our children well. In fact, we built our model under the assumption that we might still be in the yellow phase at the onset of programming.
