This state-of-the-art renovation and expansion required strategic movement of programs throughout the school year. Keeping all programs running throughout the construction phase was a challenge but the new facilities rival any contemporary industry facilities.
- Year three of the University of Colorado's Life Skill Anti-Drug Education Grant was implemented in grade 8
- Two high school science classrooms were redesigned as part of the 2018-2019 construction project
- Year Four of the Dyslexia Early Intervention/Prevention Program
 - 6 additional teachers completed level one training
 - 1 Teacher became a certified Orton-Gillingham trainer while another teacher completed her supervisor certification.
 - DVOG was expanded to include Grade 3 teachers and students. Additional training was provided to the grade 3 team
- Leader in Me
 - All four elementary schools have been implementing the program
 - Both middle schools implemented the program during the 2018-2019 school year
 - Additional professional development sessions have been provided
 - Lighthouse teams plan student leadership and parent events throughout the school year.
 - Students have begun using data notebooks

- The fall in-service day focused on PLC training for the secondary, mathematics for elementary, and Leader in Me training for the middle school teachers. Instructional Assistants were provided with a variety of special education, behavioral, and reading training options
- A cohort of elementary teachers participated in LETRS training while another group of elementary and middle school teachers attended TDA trainings at IU20
- Throughout the year, and during the June In-service day over 73 Professional Development offerings were provided for the staff in many areas including the following highlights:
 - Behavioral Strategies
 - Mathematics
 - Reading
 - Science
 - TDA (writing) training
 - Technology integration including Google classroom applications
 - STEM instructional strategies/program trainings
 - Reading
 - Writing
 - Team common assessment development
 - Instructional Strategies
 - o Medical training (CPR, epi-pen use, basic first aid)
 - Athletic programs (concussion management, cardiac and coaching recertification)
- A total of 68 curricula were revised across the K-12 disciplines by teachers' district-wide
- The Delaware Valley Cyber Academy had an average enrollment of 65 students throughout the school year. Dr. Farrell, Dr. Vives, and Mr. Mitchell conducted research on cyber program offerings and worked with the IU team to design a second curriculum option for DV Cyber academy to be implemented during the 2019-2020 school year.
- Quarterly, there were elementary districtwide PLC meetings held via ZOOM.

On August 21, **Freshman and new students** were welcomed and walked through the building to find their lockers and classrooms. After the tour everyone gathered for a pizza lunch.

The high school opened its doors on August 27th to all students returning for the upcoming school year. This year the students were excited to see the **changes to the library** and all the new staff members that joined the high school team.







Once again we had very positive **Advanced Placement** test results. The school had *128 total AP Scholars*, including **11 National AP Scholars**, the highest honor the College Board can give to a student and the most the high school has EVER achieved. In order to be a National AP Scholar, a student must score at least a 4 on all AP exams taken, and score a 4 or higher on eight or more exams.

Hosted the **annual Open House** on September 4th. The bell schedule was followed to allow teachers the opportunity to showcase each of their classes individually. Parents were able to see the newly renovated library, as well as meet multiple new staff members. The teachers used the technology present in their classrooms to showcase their various classes in creative ways.

On September 7th, the 5th annual DVHS Club Fair was held in the Freshman Gymnasium. Club advisors and student leaders set up informational tables, provided handouts, and created an exciting atmosphere for recruitment. The goal of the fair is to inform the students of all of the club offerings at DVHS. There is truly a club for everyone! Over 40 clubs were represented during all three lunches.



On September 8th the United Way of Pike County held its 18th Annual Day of Caring. Over 250 Delaware Valley High School students volunteered their time at numerous non-profit agencies in the Milford/Dingmans Ferry area. The day began with a delicious breakfast prepared by Mr. Alexander

Niosi's Culinary Arts students. The following sites participated in this year's Day of Caring: American Red Cross, Ann Street School, Delaware Township, GAIT Therapeutic Riding Center, Green Tree Early Learning Center, Habitat for Humanity, Milford Borough, Pennsylvania Department of Transportation Adopt-a- Highway, Pike County Developmental Center, Pike County Public Library, and Pocono Environmental Education Center. An extra debt of gratitude goes to the following people: Marvin Eversdyke and the support services staff, Justin Roselli and the food service staff, and the many teachers, secretaries, and other staff members who helped to make this year's Day of Caring such a success.



On September 16th, multiple Delaware Valley National Art Honor Society students attended the **2018 Interdependence Hexagon Project** at the Marketplace at Steamtown. Overall, six DVHS students won awards for their work on this project, which was on display from September 7-September 16.



On September 18th, DVSD took over thirty girls (8th grade to 12th grade students) to the **Women in Science Symposium** at Woodloch Pines Resorts in Hawley, PA. The symposium focused on women in our state that hold careers in the STEM fields. Student participants were able to meet and listen to speakers that work in fields ranging from computer engineering to watershed specialists, as well as information services. The keynote speaker for the symposium was Deputy Secretary of Technology & Innovation at the Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED), who helps ensure success of PA's technology industry by promoting innovation and entrepreneurship. Students did not only get to speak with the panel of female professionals, but they were also able to connect with representatives from local colleges, specifically about higher educational opportunities for girls in STEM fields.



Math teacher Mrs. Sara Walsh entered a contest on Twitter called **#CricutClassroom**. To enter, she had to share photos of different items she created in her classroom with the help of her Cricut cutting machine. Cricut then chose 10 teachers from around the globe as their winners. Mrs. Walsh has received a prize valued at nearly \$1,500, which includes a brand new Cricut machine, a heat press machine, multiple accessories, and materials to create more projects for her classroom.



On September 14, **WBRE Eyewitness News** traveled to Delaware Valley High School to film **Friday Morning Pep Rallies**. Over 350 students arrived at the high school at 4:45 AM and filming finished by 7:00 AM. Numerous students were featured on both live and recorded broadcasts throughout the day. Students were then treated to a breakfast prepared by our Culinary students before beginning their school day.

After breakfast, the second annual Spirit Games were held in both the 9/10 and 11/12 gymnasiums. Students in grades 9 and 10 competed against one another and students in grades 11 and 12 competed against one another. Mrs. Wummer, Mrs. Marchetti, and Mr. Vasquez with help from Mr. Sotak and Mrs. Rojas organized the games, recruited students from all grade levels, and decorated both gymnasiums for a record level of school spirit and highly competitive games. The cheerleaders and marching band performed during the games in both locations and the Warrior was passionately encouraging the competitive spirit. The Sophomores and Seniors won their respective titles.






On September 20, for the **first time ever**, the **Delaware Valley High School hosted a College Fair** for all 11th and 12th grade students. Students were assigned a time to come to the gymnasium and visit with recruiters from 37 different colleges and universities. Feedback was overwhelming positive and we're looking forward to expanding the fair next school year.



The 2018 Homecoming Court was comprised of five males and five females selected through a school wide vote that took place on September 12th & 13th. In the crowning ceremony, held during halftime of the Homecoming Football Game on September 15, Isaac Yost was named Homecoming King, and Kiki Ruggerio was named Homecoming Queen. The 2018 Homecoming Dance was held on September 15, immediately following Warrior Festival and the Homecoming Football Game. The Homecoming Dance, which serves as the culminating event to Spirit Week activities, hosted 609 DV students from grades nine through twelve and offered three hours of entertainment, refreshments, and dancing.



The Rachel's Challenge club sponsored "Start With Hello" week from September 24-28. Students wore name tags on Tuesday and were encouraged to start a conversation with someone they didn't know. On Wednesday, students wore tie dye shirts and started a "Good Vibes" wall during all lunches. On Thursday, students wore green in memory of the victims of the Sandy Hook Elementary shootings.



The Delaware Valley High School once again **hosted the SATs** on October 6. Almost 200 Delaware Valley students participated in the exams. All sophomore and junior students participated in the PSATs on Wednesday, October 10. The data collected from students is used for scheduling and placement purposes, as well as making students eligible for National Merit scholarships.



On October 13, DV hosted its **fourth annual Tri-State Tussle tournament** for 24 teams from around the Northeastern US. DV almost pulled off the upset of the day, and was the only team to make a serious challenge to eventual champion Troy (NY). Despite the loss, Delaware Valley qualified for the PACE-NSC National Championships, and had two players earn book awards for top individual points: Emma Dove and JD Flick. The DV Scholastic Bowl team also played in the Philly Quiz Bowl tournament October 20, taking 5th of 36 teams.



On October 20 the Delaware Valley Marching Band competed in the **U.S. Bands Regional competition**. There were eight bands in the competition in various classes. The Marching Warriors took home a score of 84.25 with a 3rd place finish and took home awards for best drum majors and best band director. The marching band will be competing in the U.S. Bands National Championship Sunday November 4th at J. Birney Crum Stadium in Allentown PA. They will be in competition with forty bands and will receive a national ranking.



On October 23, the Pike County Board of Elections held a training for students that qualified to fulfill their duty as a poll worker in the upcoming midterm elections. Thank you to Nadeen Manzoni for organizing and training the students that are participating.



During the week of October 22-26, Delaware Valley High School students and staff showed their **school spirit** by wearing colors to support various causes. Monday was a pink out in support of breast cancer awareness. Wednesday was wear orange day to protest violence and support Unity Day. Thursday SASA/TATU sponsored a wear red day and distributed pencils to students, reminding them to make good decisions. This television campaign, conceptualized by NEIU 19, is designed to call attention to high school students who have excelled in the study of the arts. Julia will be featured in a 1-minute vignette which showcases the student, high school, and school district and salutes them for their artistic achievement. The spotlight will be aired on WVIA TV for one week beginning in March. Julia will then be in the running to compete for Artist of the Year in the WVIA viewing region.



The art department was recognized for **winning the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation's Annual "Paint the Plow**" contest for Pike County. Our plow will now be submitted to a fan vote through Facebook to determine the overall winner in Northeastern Pennsylvania.



The Delaware Valley High School would like to thank Lowe's for **donating labor and resources** to finish a quiet room in the new Library. The space that was previously used as a storage closet is now outfitted with new paint, new flooring, and new furniture so that students can use it as a quiet area to read, study or finish work.




The Varsity Field Hockey Team was recently honored by the Pennsylvania Field Hockey Coaches Association as one of the top teams in the state academically. They received the Academic All-State TEAM award for having a cumulative GPA of about 3.7 out of a 4.0 scale factoring in all 18 players.

There were also three other events at the competition that focused on other science, engineering, and mathematics challenges, ranging from trivia to on-site building events. The team consisting of Catlin, Mary and Shira placed in the top 10 (out of almost 40 teams) in the pre-building engineering event.







The **Delaware Valley HS FBLA Chapter** celebrated FBLA Week despite the weather. The chapter decided to condense the activities into a few days so all members got to experience all the benefits of the week. Members spoke to non-members in their classes and encouraged current members to be more active in the programs/scholarships that FBLA offers. On Oct. 13, the Scholastic Bowl Club hosted the **fourth annual Tri-State Tussle tournament**. There were 24 teams from all over the Northeast and 13 different schools. The day was split into various morning and afternoon rounds. Within each round a team would be given a series of "toss ups", ranging from questions about math to politics to literature to even sports. They need to have acquired knowledge about every possible topic. If they answer a question correctly, a bonus round is initiated and teams gain separate points for bonuses. When the midday results were announced book prizes were given out to the top 10 scorers of the day. Senior Emma Dove placed sixth and sophomore J.D. Flick placed tenth.



On December 10th and 14th, six CTE students competed in **various vocational contests** at Luzerne County Community College and Johnson College. Some of the categories included: Automotive Service Technology, Commercial Baking and Motorcycle Service. Most students were first time competitors and proudly represented the DV vocational programs. Adriana Galliano for Job Interview, Danielle Palmer for Commercial Baking, and Nick Christensen for Motorcycle Repair earned gold medals in their respective competitions.



On December 14, Mrs. Kaylor's, Mrs, Thompson's and Miss Anderson's ceramics students participated in Delaware Valley's **8th annual "Empty Bowls" soup luncheon**. While learning the art of ceramics, the students work towards aiding local families in the fight against hunger. This international grass-roots effort started with the purpose of helping to shed light on world hunger and our need to give back to our communities. Through the efforts of our students, their families, local businesses, and the generous donations provided by all who attended, the project was able to raise nearly \$1,000 to be donated to two of our local food banks.



The annual college roundtable held on December 21st proved to be extremely successful once again this year. Fourteen alumni that graduated in 2018 returned to answer questions and discuss their transition from high school to college with our current seniors. Sara Serrano and Jose Falcon facilitated this discussion and the topics ranged from study skills and time management to ways to participate in the college community and how to cope with leaving home. It was filled with excellent dialogue and meaningful reflections.

On December 21, a group of "anonymous" students lined every locker in the Delaware Valley High School. The students arrived at 6:15 in the morning so as to surprise their peers with **positive messages**. It was a great success and we are very proud of their selfless actions.



The Warrior Pride School Store sold pink tie-dye t-shirts during the month of October in honor of **Breast Cancer Awareness Month**. For every t-shirt sold the store donated \$1.00 to the National Breast Cancer Foundation. The store sold 110 shirts and a donation of \$110 was donated to the foundation. The Business/Marketing class operates the school store in the morning, during all lunch periods and after school.



DV FBLA attended the **Region 22 Leadership Conference** at the University of Scranton. Gavin Brazanskas was elected as Region 22 Vice President and Kaleigh Kudder was elected as Region 22 Treasurer. DV FBLA exhibited success by earning 10 1st place event finishes and 32 state qualifiers. State only events will be announced in January.



On January 16, **Dr. Michael Pitarro** spoke to the sociology classes and also the members of Rho Kappa, the National Social Studies Honor Society in the high school auditorium. Dr. Pitarro is an assistant professor of Criminal Justice at American Military University and an adjunct professor at East Stroudsburg University. Dr. Pitarro spoke about the typical background of offenders and why they began to offend. It was followed by a question and session which the students were actively involved. Questions raised dealt with criminology, human trafficking, serial killers, psychopaths, sociopaths, giving habitual offenders alternatives to avoid trigger events and also leadership skills within the field of criminal justice.

The Scholastic Art & Writing Awards are the nation's longest-running and most prestigious recognition program for creative teens in grades 7–12. Delaware Valley High School Students competed with over 900 works of art in our region. 13 of our students received honorable mentions and 9 students were awarded silver key medals. The following students earned gold key awards: Ariana DiGeso, Izabelle Brink, Jarrett Palmadessa, Rayona Story, Nickolas Thalassinos, Caroline Toomer, and Kayley Baker with 2 gold keys. The gold key winners will have their artwork displayed at the Everhart Museum in Scranton from February 9th-25th. These artworks will move on to be judged at the national level.

DVHS musicians had a great month of January as both **PMEA District 10 Band and Orchestra festivals** occurred. Six students attended the District Band Festival at Catasauqua where they rehearsed and performed under the direction of Dr. Andrew Yozviak of West Chester University. While there each student auditioned for Region Band, 2 of whom successfully earned a spot in that ensemble. Similarly, 6 of our Orchestra students participated in the District Orchestra festival at Boyertown Area Senior High School under the direction of Peter Brye from Millersville University. Of the 6 students participating, 4 of them earned their place in Region Orchestra which will take place in February.



On February 8, the Career and Technical Education department hosted our **annual freshmen CTE tour**. Every 9th grade student selected one program to spend an entire period in. The students were engaged in a hands on activity in order to better understand what a CTE classroom looks like and how each course can prepare you for a possible career in that field. This event is scheduled in such a way so that students have a better understanding of our CTE program before they head into individual scheduling. Afterwards, 217 students identified that they were potentially interested in scheduling CTE classes next year.



On February 10 the High School Jazz Ensemble participated in the **Steel Stacks High School Band showcase** in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania. There, they received an excellent rating. Theo Bookey was awarded best trumpet soloist and Daniel Bradley was awarded best rhythm soloist for his feature guitar solo on the piece "Squiggly" by Kris Berg.



During the week of February 11-15, the high school partnered with Safe Haven to host **Teen Dating Violence Awareness Week**. They were able to display over 60 dresses, and approximately 30 students came and tried on dresses and accessories. Nine students left with formal dresses to wear to this year's prom. There will be two more events held before prom on May 3. The staff will continue to accept any donations throughout the remainder of the school year.



On February 22nd, two DV teams participated in the **4th Annual Emmaus Programming Competition** at Emmaus High School in Emmaus, PA. The two teams consisted of Rich Albanese, Jason Bello, Nick Drago, Andrew Hoopman, Noah Irgang, Yumi Jin, and Christian Secular. This competition is unlike any other event the programming students attend because students from Emmaus's programming club organized, wrote and judged the competition (with little help from their advisors). Although the results were only released for the top three teams, the two teams were extremely competitive and represented DV well, managing to complete extremely difficult coding programs in just only three hours.

The 11/12 guidance department held our **annual Junior Parent night** on February 21. Parents were presented information regarding graduation, financial aid, and important dates for their students. The 9/10 guidance department held our annual Incoming Freshman Parent night on February 27. Parents were introduced to the scope and sequence of courses available in the high school, graduation requirements, CTE and AP options available, and extracurricular possibilities. Parents at both events were invited to ask questions to counselors at the conclusion of the presentation.



The 2nd Annual Induction of the DVHS Chapter of the National Art Honor Society was held on February 28. Six new students applied and met the criteria of academic and artistic achievement, joining the current membership of students inducted last year. This recognition is based upon criteria regarding access, engagement and achievement within the PTLW Engineering program that we offer in the high school.

The **IU20 Regional PA Governor's STEM Challenge competition** was held on March 6. The DVHS team, consisting of Richard Albanese, Nicholas Drago, William Ehlers, Angus Muttee, and Issac Thollot, won the competition with their invention of a solar-powered bear-proof garbage can. The team presented their project to a team of judges and also worked together to solve an on-site engineering challenge to demonstrate their problem-solving and teamwork skills. The team is now on to the State competition in May in Harrisburg.

Mackenzie Panetta and Hannah Williams competed in **the Regional Media and Design Competition** hosted by IU20 at Northampton Community College on Tuesday, March 12, 2019.
The students claimed first place in the 3D Design event with their 3D printed auto backup camera cover. They will next compete in the state competition at Dickinson College in May.



Our Family & Career Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) club had an outstanding performance at the State Leadership Conference this month. Seven students advanced to the Nation Leadership Conference in California this summer and seven additional students earned a gold, silver, or bronze medal in their state- only events. Great job!



On March 25, **motivational speaker Jeff Yalden** came to DVHS for an assembly with all high school students. Jeff focused on perseverance through difficult times as an overarching theme to his presentation. Jeff was originally scheduled to speak in October, but was unable to do so when our school suffered the loss of a students. 



Members of the DV Jazz band provided entertainment, while student volunteers from the Junior Historians club waited on our guests and assisted with food preparation. They designed and built a bear-resistant garbage can be featuring a solar- recharged electromagnetic locking mechanism, with remote wireless unlocking capabilities and a manual override switch. The can also features LED lights to enhance safety when moving the can at night. Their final ranking was 21st in the state. The team also was able to visit the Pennsylvania State Museum, the National Civil War Museum, and Penn State Harrisburg during the event.



Odyssey of the Mind competed at the World competition this month. The Structure team placed 19th out of 53 teams, Vehicle team placed 8th out of 45 and the Theatrical team placed 10th out of 55 teams. The Theatrical team also brings back to DV the coveted Ranatra Fusca award for outstanding creativity. Only 4 of these awards were presented this year.



On May 23, the DVHS Student Council held our second annual **DV's Got Talent event** in the high school auditorium. Following a series of auditions, contestants were chosen to compete in the talent show based on scores from a panel of student council members and faculty. Fourteen acts comprised of vocalists, dancers and musicians performed in front of a crowd of 200 students, parents, and spectators as well as a panel of four judges. In the end, singer/songwriter Liv Zinn earned the first place award with the most points. Guitarist Domenick Sanducci shared second place honors with the musical talents of Jeanna McDonough, and third place was shared between piano player John Zirpoli and last year's winner, singer Amber Hernandez.

On May 30th, the high school science department hosted its **17th annual Senior Science Research Seminar Project Presentations**. Students presented on a variety of projects that they have worked on all year, including a Kevlar anti-shooter door screen, a wearable mechanical suit, animal research and many other topics.



On May 31, students from DVMS and DVHS combined for a **Mini-Jazz festival**. Members of the high school jazz ensemble worked in sectionals with the middle school students. The middle school students were very excited to learn from them. That evening, the students put on a concert that opened with the high school after-school jazz ensemble known as Jazz 2.0, then the Middle School band took the stage and put what they learned that afternoon to good use. Next the High School jazz band performed a short set. The evening completed with a combined performance of all students playing "September" by Earth Wind and Fire. This was a fun event where students got to be mentors and leaders and encourage younger students to continue with jazz band.



On April 26, at the State Capitol in Harrisburg, the DV Scholastic Bowl team took Fourth Place in the state at the Pennsylvania Academic Championships. DV, representing IU 20, defeated other IU champions Hollidaysburg, Wilson, Selinsgrove, DuBois, and Indiana, claiming the #2 seed in the state, and almost pulled off a dramatic playoff comeback against Henderson, which dropped us to fourth place among the 30 champions at the tournament. Congratulations to Emma Dove, Chris Secular, Darius Bermudez, Lucas Helms, and JD Flick, all of whom scored well at the tournament!



In March, the Advanced Placement Spanish students participate in the **National Spanish Contest** sponsored by the American Association of Teachers of Spanish and Portuguese. The National Spanish Contest winners for the Northeast Region were: David Marcial, who merited a (plata) Silver award nationally and 1st place (classroom experience) regionally; and Alexandra Garcia, who merited an Honorable Mention nationally and regionally. 





DDPS has a Positive School-Wide Behavior Support program, **Primary Pride**. Student referrals and suspensions have decreased since implementing the program. The program is designed to create consistency for students and celebrate students' successes for making good choices and following the DV 5. Students who remain in the "green zone" during the month are invited to a Primary Pride Surprise. Fun "surprises" are held at the end of each month to acknowledge and celebrate students. Some of the students and staff favorite surprises include: **Dance Parties**, **Storybook Character Parade**, **Healthy Heart Relays**, a **Winter Fest**, **Flashlight Glow Bingo**, **School Plays**, **Spring Hat Parade**, and the **Mad Scientists**!









DDPS celebrates October as Safe Schools Month. Staff and students participate in "Safe School Drills". A review of procedures and expectations are practiced each month making sure students understand the procedures for each drill. Bully Prevention education begins in October and is carried throughout the year. Students participate in a "No Name Calling" spirit week. A performance by Yo-Jo presented a show about acceptance and tolerance with peers. Students create a Friendship Chain during guidance classes to display along the stairs during October. Staff and students participate in an annual Unity Walk. Staff and students wear orange to show unity for those who have been bullied. The Unity Walk is led by our guidance counselor and the DDPS Lil' Warrior. DVHS TATU program visits and shares lessons about drug awareness in support of Red Ribbon Week. Dingmans Township Fire and Rescue and Smokey the Bear also visited the Primary School. Students tour fire trucks and an ambulance. Students especially enjoy the fire truck's high ladder! Wellness is also promoted at DDPS with a celebration of Apple Crunch Day.







During **National Bullying Prevention Month and Safe Schools Month**, DDPS focuses on kindness, no name-calling and making good choices with our peers throughout the month of October. The school counselor and student leadership team plans events for each week for staff and students.

- Wearing blue to kick off National Bullying Prevention Month.
- Daily announcements with positive quotes from our student Lighthouse Team.
- "No Name Calling" Spirit Week was held. Staff and students participated in spirit week to show their awareness of bullying. In guidance classes, students signed a pledge to be kind no bullying. Selected students shared information on the morning news show daily during the month. Many random acts of kindness were observed. The week ended with an assembly with our friend, YOJO on Friday, who returned to the Primary school with a bully prevention assembly. Students and staff enjoyed learning ways to stand up for yourself, help others and be good friends.
- DDPS participates in national Unity Day, with an annual Unity Walk. Students and staff wear orange and walk the DDPS / DDES school grounds in unity. The Unity Walk is led by our DDPS first grade warriors. The student leadership team assists the kindergarten students as walking buddies. Second grade class makes motivational posters that are displayed along the walkway.
- October 30th, the high school students from TATU talked to students in their classrooms about making good choices and peer pressure.









The DDPS PTA hosts a variety of events for our students and families. Highlights from include: **The annual Bus Driver Appreciation Breakfast**. The annual **Art Show** with amazing student art work and delicious treats, other fun events such as **Yo-Jo's visit** to promote summer reading, **Harlem Wizards basketball**, **Little Shoppers**, **KISS Event**, (**Kids Inviting Someone Special**).







Students brought their special someone to school for an evening filled with games, dancing, crafts, live music and fabulous snacks.

The PTA Harvest Festival is also a favorite, where families enjoy Fall activities from face painting to pumpkin relays and much, much more. A Purse Bingo/Tricky Tray brings many community members to the school for a fantastic fundraiser. The Spring Extravaganza is always a community favorite. The Dr. Seuss Celebration, Staff Appreciation, a Carnival Themed Field Day and an Ice Cream Send-off wrap up June. PTA has amazing events for the DDPS students and staff!

The odyssey in Odyssey of the Mind! This year, a team of seven creative second graders from DDPS represented our OM team. Students were presented with the task of creating an original museum. The museum needed to include a curator, tourists, a humorous character, and three displays. The team decided to flip the idea of museums. Instead of people visiting their museum to see creations, the creations went to the museum to see their creators! Our humorous character, Bob Ross, kept up laughter as he painted many happy trees! The Mona Lisa saw her creator, Da Vinci; a diamond saw her origin, a coal mine; and bones saw the caveman that once lived. The team worked so hard and showed such teamwork! They have a great future as OMers!



Autism Awareness is truly a culture at the Primary School. Each year, the bar to bring about awareness, acceptance and funds is raised higher and higher. Each year our Autistic and Special Education staff arranges a variety of events and activities at the Primary School. The staff and students always participate in the activities. DDPS raised well over \$3,000 which was donated to PASS. Several fundraisers were organized by the staff including Jeans Days, Staff Breakfast, Staff Luncheon, and weekly bake sales. Mr. Burns raised \$1300 at his spring concerts. Students continue to raise money by doing various chores at home. Our student leadership team sells autism bracelets. Two iPads have been purchased for students in the Autistic Support classroom. Applications for iPads were given to the two new incoming Autistic Support students. PASS uses this money to purchase iPads for our kids as well as to provide various community services including GAIT, adaptive swimming classes, and a Challenger Baseball Team. Money is also used to provide parent scholarships to attend conferences, take various trips, and sponsor a Breakfast with Santa at Christmas where any individual with special needs can come for breakfast, a picture with Santa, and a personalized gift. Many staff members, parents, and students purchase Autism Awareness and Acceptance shirts, they are worn each Friday in April. This was our best fundraising year ever! When combined with money raised from the Christmas cookie sale and kielbasa sale, we have raised over \$5,000! The staff, students, and families continue to go above and beyond for Autism Awareness this year!







DDPS first grade students has the opportunity to visit and tour the **Pike County Library**, **Dingmans Branch**. The purpose of this trip is to expose students to all the wonderful resources that the library has to offer. Walking into the library, many children expressed that they have visited the library before. The librarian talks to the students about the different genres that are available in the library. She uses the terms fiction, nonfiction, biography, and auto biography. Students are able to give her definitions for each type of genre. The librarian also reads three stories to the children. Students interact with the stories.

The librarian shows students the card catalog, computers and the area where parents can read a newspaper or a magazine. The field trip to the Delaware Township Library is a great opportunity for our students to learn of a wonderful resource that is available in the community.

DDPS Student Lighthouse Team creates Kindness Challenges during the school year.

Students share the importance of kindness and how good it makes people feel. Discussion of random acts of kindness and what that means, saying Good Morning and Hello to our friends as well as smiling at new student when we see them. The students worked together to design a "Kindness Matters" banner that is hanging outside of the school gym.





Many donations are collected to teach students the appreciation of giving and helping others. Kindness is demonstrated with students and families donating hats, mittens, scarves, coats and toys. DDPS is able to help organizations such as Toys for Tots, Leukemia, Pennies for Patients, Heart Association, and Safe Haven. Also, the staff has the opportunity to play "Santa" and help make miracles happen to our own DDPS families. Staff members honored wishes from families'

"wish lists" for Christmas. During the school year, Student Leadership Council raised money for Autism Awareness to support our very own Dingman Delaware families by selling Autism Awareness bracelets.

Second grade students practiced creative writing topic about random acts of kindness efforts. Students were writing on the topic, "If I had one thousand dollars to give away, I would..." Students had to select a charity or an organization to donate money, Red Cross, orphanages, animal shelters, homeless shelters, storm recovery, terminally ill children, are a few students selected. Students researched the charity and learned how money donated would be able to help make a difference. Students also expressed the feelings they would have from donating to such organizations. Afterwards, students shared writings and put writings on display for the school to enjoy titled, "We Care." Our young students are full of kindness and greatness. DDPS uses a multi-sensory approach to teaching reading in kindergarten, first, and second grade classrooms, Orton Gillingham based. Multi-sensory teaching and learning fills the classrooms. Teachers have been busy reinforcing literacy skills with different multi-sensory activities. Students are making tremendous reading progress, and having a lot of fun learning, too!

Retro Bill, a California based motivational speaker, is a one of the most sought after K-12 motivational speakers in the United States and Canada. He visited DDPS and spoke to our students. He explored many topics such as:

- * Being nice to friends and treating others how you want to be treated
- ★ Taking care of our school and property
- ★ Being respectful to others
- ★ Working hard and doing your very best in school
- ★ Talking about your problems







DDPS invites DDMS and DDES to "Read Across the Parking Lot." Classes from DDMS and DDES volunteered to buddy up with DDPS and share stories. All Primary classrooms receive a buddy class and had stories shared. First grade classes met with Third grade class and Second grade classes buddied with seventh grade classes to share their love of reading. Each student read their favorite book to their reading partners. It was a well-planned experience for all students.







DDPS Reading Team hosts parent/student events to encourage and support reading. The purpose of the events is to inform and teach parents how to support students at home with reading. Parents and students have the opportunity to win cool prizes for attending.



Incoming Kindergarten parents receive a make and take workshop during Kindergarten registration. After the parents accompanied their child on a school bus ride, parents were invited to attend a "Make and Take" called "*Getting Your Child Prepared for Kindergarten*." In the past, parents looked over K curriculum in the library while their child completed a screening by the Kindergarten team. This idea was put into action after discussions between the kindergarten teachers and the reading specialists during PLC's. Over one hundred parents completed surveys and all agreed that the workshop was fun as well as informative and beneficial. The reading team prepared a power point that discussed the following topics and parents were given materials to use to support their child:

- <u>Fine Motor Skills</u>: Parents were given pencils, crayons, and scissors so that their child could practice the correct pencil grip and their cutting skills. Parents were also encouraged to have their children practice opening snacks and lunch items and zipping their coats and backpacks. Parents agreed that the summer is a great time to work on these skills to help their children become more independent.
- <u>Handwriting</u>: For handwriting practice, parents were given a write and wipe marker and laminated *Fundations* handwriting paper, and a packet showing correct letter formation using the *Fundations* letter approach. Our incoming Kindergarten parents were happy to receive information about how to help their children with their handwriting.
- <u>Communication</u>: The importance of having students understand that it is safe to talk to grownups wearing badges in school and ask them for help was discussed. It is also important that students coming to Kindergarten know both their first and last name as well as their given names. (Example: Given name William but called Billy). This is important so that during the hustle and bustle of the first few weeks of school teachers can help the students find their homerooms and school buses.
- <u>Beginning of Year Assessments</u>: Beginning of the Year DIBELS assessments which include Letter Naming Fluency and First Sound Fluency were explained along with benchmark goals. The purpose of these early literacy skills was also explained and parents were provided with fun ways to expose their children to these skills.
- <u>Academics:</u> "Getting Your Child Prepared for Kindergarten" would not be complete
 without discussing academics. Multi-sensory learning was discussed and our "Make and
 Take" provided numerous activities that incorporate the use of all our senses such as:
 sound and word games, writing paint bags, letter pool noodles, clothes pin uppercase and
 lowercase letters, and name puzzle pieces.

The survey results were overwhelmingly positive. Below are a few parent testimonials:

DDPS celebrates Dr. Seuss and Read Across America throughout the month of March.

Every Friday had a theme based on a different Dr. Seuss book. The reading team recorded readings of Dr. Seuss books that went with the theme and they were played on DDTV in the classrooms. Students participated in a reading challenge called **Hats Off to Reading**. After completing 10 or more activities from the reading challenge, a Dr. Seuss hat with the child's name was placed outside their classroom. Students who partook in the challenge received a certificate and a bracelet. The classroom from each grade level that had the most hats got to participate in a special surprise activity with Ms. Butaitis at the end of the month.

To culminate the month DDPS had a Storybook Character Parade. Students dressed like their favorite book character, carried the book, and paraded through the school. The students were thrilled to dress up and see their peers and teachers dressed up too! After the parade all classes reported to the gym. The classes that won the Hats Off to Reading Challenge got to spray Ms. Butaitis with silly string. It was a blast! We had over 300 students participate in this fun reading challenge!

Flat Stanley Adventures in second grade! The students read the story <u>Flat Stanley</u> in second grade classes. The students write letters summarizing the book. The teachers ask their students to send Stanley cut-outs and letters to relatives or friends, who would then take Stanley on a journey and detail the characters' exploits in a letter back. Kids also request to send pictures as well as postcards of Stanley's journey. The students anxiously await to hear back about Stanley's adventures. Classes also map Stanley's adventures in the second grade hallway.





Read to the Principal! Each month, first grade students show off their reading progress with the principal. A day is set aside for the students to come to the principal's office. Students bring their favorite book to share with Principal Ms. Butaitis. Ms. B. brags over their first graders accomplishments. Afterwards, students are recognized with a photo by the librarian which is later displayed on the school news for the whole school to see, and a certificate.















Veterans Celebrations Veterans' Day is acknowledged and celebrated at DDPS. Our PTA hosts a Veterans' Day assembly. US Veterans Misty Albaugh (Army), Gary Albaugh (Army), Jose Luyando (Marines), Bill Keller (Marines), and Debra Heaton (Air Force) and many others from the community speak to students about their specific branches of the armed forces, show pictures, explain the multitude of job possibilities, share how women are an important part in the military and tell stories about their years of service. Each of the veteran volunteers briefly speak about their time in the service and share memorabilia from their travels. Students receive important information about veterans, thank veterans for their service, and learn that there are many veterans living within our local community.

Second grade students make cards for the Department of Veterans Affairs Medical Center in Wilkes Barre. The cards are distributed to the veterans on meal trays and during visits from volunteers. The students receive a heartfelt written thank you letter from the medical center.

Leader in Me Teachers, staff and students continue to receive training in Stephen Covey's Seven Habits. Roles throughout the school changed to have students have more leadership opportunities. Banners and Mission Statements are developed and displayed around the building. Student Lighthouse team was formed and students direct the morning news program helping younger friends recite the Pledge of Allegiance, greet students at the doors, facilitate morning announcements and model good citizenship. Student Lighthouse team members also demonstrate leadership around the school through the Leader in Me lessons. They create leadership bulletin boards such as, "The Key to being a Good Leader," which displays quotes and inspirational words about leadership for all students to see. Annual Leadership Days occur where parents and community members along with the school board members are invited into our school to view leaders in action! Our young leaders demonstrate amazing leadership talent!

• The Student Lighthouse team gave a Leader in Me presentation at the DDPS PTA to an attentive crowd full of parents. Some of the students talked about their favorite habit from the Seven Habits of Healthy Kids and how they practice the habit in school and at home. Other students shared the different ways that Leader in Me has impacted our school. For example, one student said the quotes around the school are inspiring. They also talked about the ownership shared in different leadership roles such as being morning greeters and organizing and creating our daily announcements. Following the presentation, two short video were shared. The first video highlighted the changes and impacts that Leader in Me has had on the Dingman Delaware Primary School while the other showcased students embracing the seven habits through music.

• Leader in Me Facilitators, Jessica Palumbo, Kris Zamborsky and Natalie McCann, attended a Leader in Me Coaching Day in Easton, Pennsylvania. This training discussed the role of the Lighthouse Facilitator. The beginning part of the program centers around the importance of modeling and creditability. Habit 1, "Be Proactive" was discussed in depth and an individual action plan was developed by each participant. Participants have from now until the Spring Coaching Day to work on achieving their individual action plans.

Students reach into a stingray tank and touch the rays as they swim by. The education center shows all about animal adaptations and how animals avoid predators, find food, and survive in harsh climates. Students are even encouraged to

pet an alligator!





At the Lakota Wolf Preserve in Columbia, NJ, the students are able to see a variety of wolves in a natural habitat. Jim, the wolf-master, provides an in depth lecture on wolves and wolf behavior. The preserve also has a population of bobcats and foxes. The Pocono Environmental Learning Center (PEEC) in Dingmans Ferry allowed students the opportunity to see the EcoZone Exploration & Discovery Room. Sheri Bone gives the kids a guided tour of a beaver lodge, a bat cave, an eagle's nest, and a fossil pit. Afterward, the kids have a picnic lunch and go hiking and fishing.











Hands-on science experiments are always a favorite! The experiment pictured is called *Walking Water* and demonstrates the principles of absorption and color mixing.



DDPS celebrates **Random Acts of Kindness (RAK)** during the month of February. The purpose is to highlight the importance of treating one another with respect each and every day. All students hear the story *Have You Filled a Bucket Today? A Guide to Daily Happiness for Kids* by Carol McCloud, in guidance or library class. Students participate in activities that allowed them to identify ways they can show kindness to others within their school, home, and community.













The Student lighthouse team visits all kindergarten classrooms to talk about kindness and reads stories. Students read the story Fill my Bucket and share their version of the "Emotional Bank Account" theory from 7 Habits. Random Acts of Kindness Spirit Week is held, each day has a different theme about being kind such as: Powered by Kindness, Let Kindness Shine, Team Kindness Day, Words that Hurt Can't Be Taken Back.

Several opportunities for kindness were demonstrated throughout the year:

- Every year the Dingman Delaware Primary School takes part in a Christmas Wish gift giving tree. The Staff and Faculty sign up to buy a gift for students and family members in the community. This year a total of 54 gifts were bought for Dingman's families. The families are always so appreciative.
- DDPS Student Leadership team presented a check to the American Leukemia Association.
 The DDPS student lighthouse team together with Mrs. Schuster and Mrs. Fells initiated a
 "Change for Leukemia" fundraiser, which raised money for the Leukemia and Lymphoma
 Society for Children. The whole school participated by bringing in different coins each day
 and dressing according to that day's theme.



Several DDPS students participates in the Special Olympics each year. Students spend the day at DVHS and participate in a variety of events. Our students cheered on peers and former classmates. It is fun to celebrate all students. The students and staff enjoy the day.











PTA sponsors several whole school assemblies, BMX bike rider and motivational speaker – Chris Pulous, Sedecky Puppets for Bully Preventions, Magicians, Retro Bill, ScienceTellers, YO-JO, and many, many more. These assemblies help to enhance the curriculum and engage learners.









DDPS PTA does many things for our school. PTA has purchased two Buddy Benches for our playground. One of our previous second grade students, Nick Keller, was instrumental in getting Buddy Benches for our school. Nick's name is engraved on the benches; he will always be remembered at DDPS. The original bench was created by a second grade student as a cure for loneliness. The idea behind the bench is to allow students who may not have someone to play with at recess to sit on the bench and find a friend.







The Bus to Beat Challenge is a positive behavior incentive put in place by the school police officer and school counselor to encourage positive behavior while riding the bus to and from school every day. Students who followed the rules and did not receive any bus referrals, are rewarded in June with a special celebration as well as each month students receive a trip to the school treasure chest. Highlights

- During the summer of 2018, several DDES students attended the National Youth Leadership Forum: Pathways to STEM and Lehigh University. NYLF pathways to STEM provided students with the ability to further develop their critical thinking skills while practicing medical techniques during a realistic simulation. They also participated in STEM challenges where they explored the cardiovascular system, complete with hands-on heart dissection; designing a robot and solving a crime.
- 3rd graders participated in the ART Writer's Project A GIRL NAMED HELEN KELLER with Jeffrey Stocker. They prepared for Mr. Stocker's visit by researching facts about Helen Keller and reading a book about her. He had them write biographies about Helen Keller and then participate in an art project. Students were asked to "draw in the dark" to simulate how Helen Keller lived her life. The event culminated with select students presenting their stories as well as a dramatic reading of the story.
- Two DDES field trips occurred during the month of October. 3rd grade was once again able to visit Stewart Air Force Base. Students were able to see real planes and equipment used on the base.
 5th grade students visited Harrisburg as well as the planetarium. We were fortunate to have experienced these wonderful trips!
- During the week of October 29th, DDES students and staff celebrated Kindness Week in an effort to stop bullying. Students and staff wore orange to show their support on Unity Day, October 31st to stand up to bullying.





- The Dingman-Delaware Children's Choir was very busy during the month of December. On December 1 & 2, they performed with the Delaware Valley Choral Society in Sandyston, NJ and Milford, PA respectively, as well as the tree lighting at the Milford Community House. On December 8, the Choir took part in their annual Christmas tour, traveling to the Milford Convalescent Home, Belle Reve, Skytop Lodge, and Camp Akenac where they performed a variety of season-appropriate music. On December 15, the Choir participated with 4 other choral groups in a holiday concert in East Stroudsburg, PA. The Choir also performed with the Dingman-Delaware Middle School Sixth Grade concert on December 17, ending their performances on December 20, at a Christmas concert at St. Patrick's Church in Milford. They also performed on December 1 at the annual PTA Holiday Craft Fair, and again on December 21 at the annual "Hands of Hope" candle light vigil held on the steps of the Pike County courthouse.
- Student Lighthouse Team developed the Positive Post It bulletin board to highlight staff members.
 Students and staff are encouraged to post a positive note on the board throughout the month. Our first recipient was Pete Yalango, our head day custodian.
- This year's Veteran's Day breakfast and assembly was held November 9th. Once again, student council along with our veteran buddies' club organized the day. PTA provided a wonderful home cooked breakfast for over 50 people, hallways were decorated and the assembly was once again outstanding! This year the assembly highlighted the musical talents for our DDES students. Children's choir and 5th grade chorus sang patriotic songs. Several of our band and orchestra students performed solo pieces in honor of our veteran's. Each branch of our nation's military were honored in song.







- Representatives from the Red Cross met with 5th grade students to present to them the Pillowcase Project. This initiative aims at teaching children how to prepare for emergencies to help keep their families and communities safe when emergencies happen. The project was started in New Orleans, where students used pillowcases to carry their belongings during a hurricane emergency. We will expand the project to include 3rd and 4th grade for next school year.
- DDES 4th grade was once again selected to participate in the NAEP (National Assessment of Educational Progress) testing. NAEP is the only ongoing assessment of what our nation's students know and can do in a variety of subjects. In addition to conducting assessments, NAEP gathers information on school policies and characteristics using a school questionnaire. This questionnaire provides supplemental information about school factors that may influence students' achievement,

- helping to make the NAEP assessment more accurate and complete. It is given to the principal or another official of each school that participate in the current NAEP assessment.
- Bridge Club: The DDES Bridge Design/Engineering Club worked afterschool for several months to
 construct popsicle stick bridges. Students were given stringent rules to abide by regarding bridge
 dimensions, limits on popsicle sticks and glue, etc. with the goal of building the lightest bridge that
 would support the heaviest load. Students had opportunities to construct "trial" bridges and learn
 from their mistakes before constructing the "final" bridges that were tested during an assembly on
 May 17th. Four teams competed and the heaviest load supported by the winning bridge was just
 over 100 pounds. The winners of the bridge building contest visited the Franklin Institute as their
 prize!





- 4th grade students attended the D & H Canal Days' presentation as this year's annual field trip.
 Students were able to learn about how the canal transported goods and the way in which people in those days lived. Representatives from the parks department visited DDES prior to the trip to explain to students the history of the canal.
- Our first ever DDES Talent Show was held to celebrate the end of PSSA testing and the students'
 hard work during the month of April. Both faculty and staff entertained the students with song and
 dance
- 5th Gr. Gifted Field Trip: On May 10th, the DDES Gifted students in 5th grade traveled to Lacawac Sanctuary and Biological Field Station in Lake Ariel, PA. The students participated in a hands-on forest ecology program to collect and analyze data at a forest restoration site to determine the rate of understory regeneration based on growth parameters. They also compared plant diversity in and out of a deer enclosure to determine the impact of deer populations. The trip concluded with a nature hike through the sanctuary.
- The Global Studies Club at DDES is working on a project to assist the Lerala Junior Secondary School in Lerala, Botswana. The students collected 1,000 books and sent them to the school in 2016 so that they would have an established library. This year, the students aim to collect \$1,000 in donations of loose change so that they can help the poorest families in the village pay for school tuition, school uniforms, and supplies. The club members have also started a pen pal project with the students there to increase global awareness and establish friendships. To date, the club members and DDES students have donated just over \$500 towards our goal

The DDES staff and student Leader in Me lighthouse teams out did themselves with our 4th annual
parent night event on December 12th! This year's theme was synergy. Students and staff set up 7
different stations where parents and their children needed to work together to accomplish a fun
task. Our very own DDES drummers provided some additional entertainment demonstrating how
they worked together.







Office Clark and the DDES PTA held a bus driver breakfast to introduce our new bus incentive
program to the drivers. The "Bus to Beat" Challenge will launch in February. All the drivers were
eager to work with our school to help keep our buses safe and reduce behaviors. Winning busses
got to "pie" their favorite teachers!





- 5th grade D.A.R.E. graduation was held with an added guest speaker this year. Retro Bill came to all the DV elementary schools for and assembly prior to graduation to discuss the lessons they have learned during their DARE program. Retro Bill attended the DDES DARE graduation and spoke with students and parents. In addition, a family night was held at DDMS the evening of May 30th.
- Starting the month of January, DDES is having a NBA challenge. Students are encouraged to NEVER BE ABSENT. Each month students will earn a spot on the basketball court. Students names will be entered into a monthly and end of year raffle. The more months that they are "NBA" the more chances they have to win.



• Mrs. Adams' autistic support classroom has been partnering with other teachers and staff to help her kids with life skills and prevocational tasks. So far they have helped out with office tasks, putting together first aid kits in the nurse's office, and taking care of the classroom. Pam, Janine and Debbie allowed us use of the oven so that we could bake a cake from start to finish, right down to doing the dishes. Mrs. Cicileo is also bringing the peer buddies into it at lunch, helping the kids sweep and wipe the table. Mr. Pete is helping out with that. The kids really enjoy it and are gaining valuable skills, and so many people have come together to make it happen.









Delaware Valley Elementary School Mary Ann Olsommer, Principal

- DVES had a Medieval School Year, organized and led by the Special Area Teachers! Utilizing the book series, Harry Potter, on its 20th anniversary as inspiration, a portion of the main hallway was transformed into a castle and all students were divided into four Houses during a House Sorting Ceremony. The four Houses included: House of Bravery, House of Kindness, House of Creativity, and House of Integrity. Throughout the school year, when the students displayed these qualities they earned "House Points" for their team, while also practicing the skills of leadership, teamwork, and empathy. Various Medieval events were held throughout the year to encourage community building and positive behavior around the school including House Games, a Harry Potter movie night, and a Medieval Art Show!
- Upon returning to school after summer break, many students were celebrated for participating in the Summer Reading Incentive. These students had visited the Pike County Library over the summer and because they had done so, attended a party with fun activities and snacks.
- In mid-September, DVES faculty participated in training for the Leader in Me. This day of training included a culmination of the work that was begun in the prior 2 years in Level 1 where teachers learned and practiced leadership and life skills of the 7 Habits, built a leadership environment at DVES, and created opportunities for student leadership and also in Level 2 where teachers applied leadership to academics in their classrooms. The focus for Year 3 was "Empowering Instruction." In 2018-2019, the goal was for the teachers and students to continue to build a school wide leadership culture where students were encouraged to take more ownership in their learning.
- DVES's "Start with Hello Week" was a district initiative during September that helped students spread positivity and kindness by starting with the word hello. The week generated excitement and a great amount of energy for the students. Each day the children learned new ways to say "Hello" in different languages (Spanish, French, Italian, Japanese, and Chinese), spread random acts of kindness, and on Friday, wore green to show support for the victims of Sandy Hook Elementary School.



- Kindergarten students made Apple Crisp! The students learned about apples through reading books, discussing the parts of an apple, and apple crafts. Parents contributed to the Apple Crisp by donating some ingredients. The students were able to measure, pour, count, and stir the Apple Crisp. The Apple Crisp was cooked in a crock pot and during snack time, each student was able to taste a bowl of Apple Crisp topped off with vanilla ice cream.
- All first grade classes did a study on apples in September! This included learning the life cycle of an apple, identifying the parts of an apple, using graphs, and learning about Johnny Appleseed. The students also had the opportunity to taste red, yellow, and green apples and vote for their favorite. The final and most exciting activity for the students was making homemade applesauce in the classrooms. The students were able to eat their applesauce by the end of the school day!





 Ms. Atchison's and Mrs. Moglia's fifth grade scientists created models, built, or drew plant and animal cells and presented them to their class. The projects demonstrated the organelles of each cell and described their functions. Many decided to draw a poster of one cell and create the other one in a 3-D model. They could see similarities of the cells as well as differences with this fun, rewarding, and engaging project. Some students presented their projects to students in Miss Casey's 4th grade class.





• Throughout the month of September, grade level Professional Learning Communities met weekly to analyze beginning of the year data on their students. Each team worked to create a data wall of the progress of their students on math fact fluency. Then for the remainder of the school year, the communities updated their data wall using weekly assessments given to their students and focused their discussions on their instructional plan for each week.

- **Student Council elections** were held on Tuesday, October 2nd. Sixteen 4th and 5th grade students presented speeches to the 3rd, 4th, and 5th grade who voted for those who served as representatives for the 2018-2019 school year.
- Third grade students took a field trip on October 15th to Stewart Air Force Base. It was a day full of learning about our military for the students.
- On October 18th, DVES fifth grade students traveled to Harrisburg for their field trip. They visited the Capitol and the Pennsylvania State Museum. A group picture was taken with 139th Legislative District House of Representative Michael Peifer.
- Jeffrey Stocker presented the **American Reader's Theatre Project** to the third grade students during the week of October 22nd. The students learned about Helen Keller by reading the book "A Girl Named Helen Keller." After the students read, performed, and discussed the Helen Keller biography, they interviewed a classmate about their life and wrote a short biography about them. During the week, the students sketched realistic portraits of their interviewee in art class. Each student read their classmate's biography in front of their class. The American Reader's Theatre program culminated with an assembly of third graders reading their biographies on stage, followed by two professional actors performing the biography of the accomplished Helen Keller.
- The PTA hosted the annual Harvest Festival on October 26th. A parade led by Mrs. Olsommer and Mrs. Stewart (AKA Tweedle Dee and Tweedle Dum) started the evening, and the students and their families visited multiple stations with games, activities, and prizes. The event was attended by approximately 260 children and their families.
- Fourth and fifth grade students learned about the invasive Spotted Lantern Fly when Ms. Angie Smith from the 4H Youth Development Penn State Extension visited DVES with information on this invasive species. The Spotted Lantern Fly is a plant hopper native to China, India, and Vietnam. The students learned what to look for, which trees they love, and how bad these pests can get. They were told that they haven't been spotted in Pike County, however, they have been found in Southeastern Pennsylvania.
- The DVES reading team encouraged reading with a camping theme during the 2018 2019 school year. Reading teachers sent home weekly fluency passages to read and charts to graph with their students to work on at home. Students needed to read the passage while being timed once each night during the week and graph their results. The materials went home on Mondays and were returned on Fridays. Students who returned 4 charts during the month of October were invited to celebrate a November "campfire". Students who returned 4 charts during the month of February were invited to a "cowboy sing a long". The staff and student participants read a story and sang several songs.



- DVES celebrated Veterans' Day on November 12th. Students invited their veterans and active duty service men and women for refreshments in the cafeteria. The students then escorted their veteran or active duty member to the gymnasium where they were honored in a school wide assembly led by the Student Council. After the assembly, the students introduced their guest to their classmates, and each service man or woman had the opportunity to share what it meant for him or her to serve our country.
- Kindergarten students were busy in November. Mrs. Niemotka's Kindergarten "Mystery Readers" were some of the students' grandparents. Mrs. Lawson's kindergarten class made wind socks and learned firsthand about wind direction as they went outside to test out their wind sock craft.
- Students attended an assembly about owls presented by the Director of Pocono Wildlife
 Rehabilitation and Education Center, Mrs. Kathy Uhler. The presentation included a variety of
 different owls native to Pennsylvania and this area. The children were treated to the adaptations and
 habitats of five different species of owls and their stories of how they ended up in the Rehabilitation
 Center.
- The DVES Student Council stayed busy during the month of December with several community and school based projects. They kicked off the month by collecting blankets and coats for *Project Giving Warmth* in a combined effort with the DVHS. They worked hard setting up and decorating for the annual DVES Holiday Celebration dinner. They also hosted a school wide fun-filled Holiday School Spirit Week. Students were asked to join in the fun by dressing up as snowmen and Grinch characters, along with wearing crazy hats, ugly sweaters, and holiday pajamas. Finally, they ended the month with a peppermint estimating contest which granted one lucky student a jar of peppermints and a free gym pass.
- The 5th grade students performed Random Acts of Kindness during December by spreading some cheer in the holiday season. They collected candy canes and delivered them to the staff as well as the other grades in the building. They also baked cookies and gave them out to all of the staff members while caroling in the halls.

- DVES held their annual **Holiday Celebration Dinner** for students and their families on December 13th. The faculty and staff donated their resources and gave of their time to host this special event. Their guests ate ham, mashed potatoes, vegetables, salad, and dessert and the students received gifts from Santa Claus that had been donated by the high school students in the National Honor Society.
- The Special Area teachers coordinated the Second Annual **DVES Holiday Traditions Around the World** event. Classes were asked to select a country from around the world and to learn how their country celebrates the holidays. Each class then decorated an assigned area of the "Acceptance Avenue" Hallway to share what they had learned. Each display was judged, pre-k through second grade and third through fifth grade. The upper level (3-5) winner was Sweden from Mrs. Genovese's fourth grade class. They received a pizza party. The winner from the lower level (pre-k through 2nd) was Germany from Mrs. Connell's second grade class. They received stockings with treats.





- The staff and students attended the traditional prewinter-break assembly during the afternoon of December 21st. Classes presented on the Holiday Traditions Around the World and some DVES traditions like the teachers participating in a rendition of The Twelve Days of Christmas were enjoyed by all.
- Delaware Valley Elementary School was treated to a **NED assembly** in early January. The presenter from NED's Mindset Mission performed a 45-minute assembly filled with humor, yo-yo's, magic tricks, puppetry and storytelling. In the assembly, a cartoon boy named NED was introduced. His name stands for: <u>Never give up</u> (understanding the power of yet), <u>Encourage others</u> (spark courage in other people), <u>Do your best</u> (always be learning and growing). NED is on a mission to find his mindset. He overcomes many obstacles, finds treasures, and grows his brain in the process. It is the hope that the performance helped the students to overcome social, emotional, and academic challenges.
- Approximately 40 students attended Sports Night on January 11th, hosted by the DVES PTA. The
 students and their adult guests competed against each other in a football throw, an inner tube relay,
 Hungry Hippos with scooters, balloon tennis, basketball bounce, and bowling.
- Mrs. Kudrich's third grade class encouraged those at DVES to eliminate the use of plastic straws to
 do their part to reduce single use plastics to help the environment. They spread their slogan, "Save a
 sea turtle, skip a straw!" throughout the building and spoke to classes to educate others.

- Mrs. Moglia, fifth grade teacher, created visual reminders of skip counting to encourage the learning
 of multiplication facts on the stairwell in the school. She said that even if it helps one child, it is well
 worth it!
- On January 9th, the **DVES Lighthouse Team** participated in on-site training sessions for the Leader in Me. Participants reflected upon the progress of The Leader in Me initiative at DVES and developed action plans for the Nine Action Teams for the future.
- Each third grade class focused their writing skills in different places during the month of January.
 Mrs. Krisanda's class celebrated National Hobby Month, writing about and presenting on their own
 hobbies. Mrs. Kudrich's class wrote letters to encourage others to eliminate or minimize their use of
 straws, and Mr. Brocious' class took pictures of events, created captions for the pictures, and created
 a class book.
- Kindergartners participated in a kindergarten fashion show as a culminating activity with the
 alphabet. The children received paper bags, made vests out of them by decorating them at home,
 and modeled them for family and friends that were invited to the fashion show.



- Mrs. Genovese's fourth grade class learned about the different species of plants and animals that
 live in the various biomes of the world. Students discussed why different animals and plants can
 survive in a given area, while others cannot. Students were able to build and construct a biome as
 well as research and present their findings to the class.
- The **Annual Sweetheart Dance** was sponsored by the PTA and held on February 8th. Over two hundred students were in attendance.
- On February 15th, the Lip Sync Assembly was held. Seventy-seven students from all grades danced and lip synced to their favorite song as their audience sang and clapped along.

• Kindergarten Teacher, Dana Niemotka, began a **Student of the Month** initiative. Each month teachers in each grade level nominated and selected one student from each grade level who excelled in academics, social skills, and leadership. These students were presented with a certificate and honored in a display in the Acceptance Avenue Hallway.

Almost every morning on DVE TV, individual or small groups of student performed the **Star Spangled Banner**. Whether by singing or playing an instrument, these talented student volunteers

led all of the students in honoring our country each day.



- Mr. Brocious' third graders were scientists in February. First, they experimented with yeast to prove that it eats sugar to produce a gas. The students put yeast, warm water, and sugar in an empty water bottle and covered it with a balloon. When they shook the mixture to activate the yeast and water, it began to produce gas and the balloons partially inflated! They also experimented with surface tension by trying to see how many drops of water could fit on a penny. Because of the ability of water to form a dome and cling together when adding water, a drop at a time, it piled until it finally spilled over the sides.
- The students and staff at DVES celebrated Read Across America during the week of March 4th-8th, featuring several reading-themed activities and contests, sponsored by the Reading Department. Students were invited to join a daily lottery drawing to earn Dr. Seuss inspired prizes by reading a minimum of 15 minutes each night. Students also got to participate in an "Oh, The Places You'll Go!" scavenger hunt, a "One Fish, Two Fish, Red Fish, Blue Fish" estimation contest, and Seuss trivia. The Cat in The Hat, thanks to Mrs. Polanis, made a surprise guest appearance to hand out prizes and read to students in the nurse's office. They also teamed up with the cafeteria as staff and the students had the unique opportunity to feast on "Green Eggs and Ham." DVES was truly Seussified!



- On March 9th, Delaware Valley Elementary School sent three teams to the Odyssey of the Mind Regional Competition at Pocono Mountain West High School. Mrs. Curtis' Team Problem 2 Hide in Plain Sight earned second place in their division. Miss Casey's Problem 4 Structure Toss team earned second place in their division. Mrs. Bailor and Mrs. Dowd's Primary team showed beautifully as well. The Curtis team and the Casey team moved on to States on April 6 at the Pocono Mountain East campus.
- Fourth Grade students participated in a Penn State Extension Pike County 4-H School Enrichment Program titled, 'The Magic of Electricity.' During this 4-part educational series, students received instructional presentations and completed hands on experiments, guiding them to a basic understanding of the principles of electricity and magnetism. Students created series and parallel circuits, experimented with insulators and conductors, developed an understanding of electrons and energy production, discovered magnetic fields, constructed a compass, built an electromagnet, and determined electron directional flow using homemade galvanometers. For this year, a project that aligned with the school's Harry Potter House theme was added to the program. Students were able to complete a make and take light up wand project using craft sticks, LED diodes and copper tape with a binder clip switch to open and close their circuits. 4-H school enrichment programs used research based curriculums that align with state learning standards to enhance understanding and provide additional opportunities for students to participate in a variety of projects that support all learning styles.
- DVES held its first Spirit Week full of fun and games! Students and teachers alike had fun dressing
 in different themes every day and School Houses participated in a variety of competitions with the
 Green House winning for the week. A big thank you to the DVES Special Area Team for organizing
 Spirit Week!
- Barry Benson, aka Papa Bee, author of *There's a Flower in Our Vegetable Garden* visited DVES. He was interviewed on DVE-TV, by DVE-News/TV reporter, Connor Giblin on the morning program. When asked how he came up with the characters, he explained that some of the characters were based on his son and a friend of his. He wrote the book to support anti-bullying. He wants children to realize that they are all special and should be accepted as themselves. After the interview, he signed a copy of the book and handed a copy to Librarian, Mr. Mang, for the DVES library. He then went to visit each second grade class and read the book to the students.
- DVE-News/TV invited Mr. Daniel Padavona from the **National Weather Service** in Binghamton, New York to the Delaware Valley Elementary School. All DVE-News/TV reporters were in attendance to meet him and to learn more about DVES being the weather station for Matamoras, PA through their CoCoRaHS program to collect and record precipitation amounts for the National Weather Service. The reporters learned that DVES has been collecting information for CoCoRaHS for about ten years. Mr. Padavona stressed the importance of collecting proper information as it helps the National Weather Service collect useful data for farmers, river heights, and to check if their weather prediction was correct. The reporters also learned that DVES is one of 10 schools involved in the CoCoRaHS program for the Binghamton, NY area. Mr. Padavona then went on to the DVE-TV morning program to be interviewed by DVE-News/TV reporters, Sophia Chen and Colin Anderson.



- In their investigation of Weather on Earth with the FOSS module, Ms. Atchison's Fifth Grade Meteorologists designed and conducted an experiment to compare how earth materials (water and soil) heat up when exposed to sunlight, since these two materials make up most of the surface of Earth. Each team placed containers of equal amounts of water and soil on a white surface in direct sunlight with thermometers in each. For 15 minutes they recorded the temperatures of both water and soil every 3 minutes. They then did the same after placing the containers in the shade. Meteorologist Dan Padavona, of the Binghampton, NY National Weather Service guided the 5th grade scientists in connecting how water heats up and cools more slowly than soil to create the weather. Students enjoyed being able to ask an expert about how the weather works. Students were also interested in learning how to become a meteorologist. Students continued their investigation as they graphed and discussed their results.
- The Delaware Valley Elementary School held an **egg decorating contest** through their Student Council. Students were challenged to decorate their very best eggs. The Student Council chose a winner from each grade.
- Ingrid Peterec, Chief of Interpretation of the UPDE S&RR visited DVES and spoke to the fourth grade
 classes at Delaware Valley Elementary School. Then the fourth grade visited the **Delaware**Aqueduct and Delaware and Hudson Canal in May. They learned about the different modes of
 transporting goods that were previously used in this area and other history regarding the canal and
 aqueduct.
- Classes submitted entries for the Children's Edition of the Pike County Courier. Kindergarten shared what makes them happy, first graders described a special place, second grade wrote a story about something funny or special, third grade wrote a letter to someone who has helped them, fourth grade wrote a journal entry about something, and the fifth graders wrote about someone or something that inspires them. Student selections from every grade level were selected and published in the special selection.
- Several end of the year concerts were held. Ms. Kondracki directed the kindergarten, first grade, second grade, third grade, and fourth/fifth grade chorus in a concert. Ms. Hess directed the third, fourth, and fifth grade orchestra students and Mrs. Maurer directed the fourth and fifth grade band

students in separate concerts. A PTA sponsored Book Fair was also held in conjunction with one concert.

- The Kindergarten teachers at the Delaware Valley Elementary School held their second annual Mother's Day Tea for their students and their parent or guardians. The children enjoyed having their family in school. They were served cookies with tea or coffee, had their pictures taken and the children performed songs for them. The tables were decorated with placemats made by the students. Flowers adorned each table made by the kindergartners.
- As an annual science project and for the final time, as Mr. Brocious will be retiring, his third grade students set up an incubator, checked the temperature to be sure it was close to 100 degrees as possible, and waited for chicks to hatch. After about 21 days, 10 of the eggs hatched and the class took care of the baby chicks. The students learned about embryo development and the care of an incubator.
- The fifth graders of DVES held their annual **D.A.R.E. Graduation** on May 17th. The fifth graders opened with singing, Brave by *Sara Bareilles*, accompanied by Miss Kondracki on the guitar. Some students read their D.A.R.E. essay, others performed a skit, and all students received a certificate. The celebration was prepared and led by the students with the help of Officer Cavallaro.
- Amy King and Payton Nekich from the National Park Service came to the Delaware Valley Elementary School to teach the fifth graders about river and water safety.
- The DVES Special Area teachers collaborated together to bring Environmental Day to the students. All grade levels participated. The grades rotated through different activities. They had Water Rocket Launches with Mr. Mang. The students worked on chalk drawing and seed pod creations with Mrs. Zito, Miss Kondracki, and Mrs. Maurer. Then they also had a nature walk led by Mrs. Heather Hubbard and Mr. Chris Neidig. Mrs. Lehman flew a shark kite throughout the day! Mrs. Kudrich's class ended the day with a reading of a rendition of the Lorax.
- The students of DVES participated in a "Walk for Autism" as a fundraiser for Pike Autism Support Services. During the month of April, students learned about Autism and communication in the Health classes. On May 23rd, the students were taken out to the soccer field to walk in support of autism for a set period of time. The end of that day, the students walked a combined total of 9 miles and had raised \$2000 for P.A.S.S.



- Retro Bill stopped by DVES for a school assembly. Retro Bill taught the Delaware Valley Elementary School students the Six Pillars of Character. Trustworthiness, Respect, Responsibility, Fairness, Caring, and Citizenship. He included DVES school officer, Officer Cavallaro, the school counselor, Mr. Adelfio, and Head Custodian, Ms. Cheryl. He boosted students' self-esteem while celebrating diversity and encouraging goal-setting, good grades and making safe choices at school, home, and on the internet.
- DVES first grade students visited the **Pike County Library** on May 22nd. The librarians read to the children and introduced some of the activities that take place at the library. The students were also taken on a tour of the library and taught how to use a library card.
- DVES held Field Day on May 30th. The students enjoyed outdoor activities and games including parachute fun, kickball, 40-yard dash races, and sponge relays. In addition, there were bouncy houses, a dunk tank, and snow cones, sponsored by the PTA. The Warrior even stopped by to provide high fives to the students.
- Twenty four students participated in DVE News and thirty one in DVE TV during the 2018-2019 school year. DVE TV/News went on location to the Town of Deerpark for 9-11, Maples Farm, Edsall Romer's Halloween House, Vernon Valley Teleport, Richards Military PX, Bubble Babez, and the Special Olympics at DVHS. They interviewed Tara Vecchio at the Milford Dance Studio, new DVES School Counselor, Matt Adelfio, Dylan Saturno about Z Space, Author Barry Benson, a National Weather Service Meteoriologist, Rotary Club Members, OMers, and many DVES students and staff. For their end of the year trip, twenty three reporters and their chaperones traveled to Lancaster, Pennsylvania on an overnight trip. While there, reporters learned about the Amish experience, visited the Turkey Hill Experience, Wolf Sanctuary in Lititz, Julius Sturgis Pretzel Factory, Lititz Historical Society Fair, Strasburg Railroad for a train ride, and attended a Lancaster Barnstormer Baseball game.
- The fifth grade class was honored in a Moving Up Ceremony on June 11th. Students, along with their family and friends, celebrated successes from the school year, remembered their days at DVES, and acknowledged their graduation to the middle school. Twenty-nine DVES fifth graders received the Presidential Academic Award of Excellence, recognizing their A- average or higher in English language arts, math, social studies, and science.

Business/Marketing class:

The three-year instructional Marketing CTE Program of Study prepares individuals for occupations and careers in advertising, marketing, public relations and sales. Through actively participating in the Marketing program students will develop leadership ability, strengthen communication skills and demonstrate the professional skills necessary to succeed in today's business world. Topics include but are not limited to: advertising, retailing, merchandising, business operations, promotion, selling, economics, financing, distribution, inventory control, pricing, entrepreneurship and professional development.

The Business-Marketing class had hands-on experience by completing work for local businesses and school projects. The students worked on projects that included: DVHS Honor Society, DVSD Hall of Fame, DVMS and DVHS school plays, Special Olympics, music events and physical cards for the athletic department. The students also had speakers from the Pittsburg Institute, PA College of Technology PA Free Enterprise Week and past DV graduates to share their expertise on Business/Marketing. The students also attended Marketing Day in Six Flags Great Adventure where they learned how the entrainment marketing industry operates.



The Business/Marketing students were responsible to operate the new DV Warrior Pride School Store during the school year. The store is very successful and is open in the mornings, during all lunches and after school. Some of the tasks the students were responsible for were: creating a store name, designing the layout, arranging merchandise, processing orders, operating the register, communicating with customers, determining prices, inventory and preparing reports. Level one students also took the RISE customer service exam from the National Retail Federation at the end of May

and earned certification. All the Marketing students took the OSHA Safety Training and received certification. Eight students also earned college credits though dual enrollment with Luzerne County Community College. The following credits were earned: customer service, advertising, marketing and sales. Five students took the NOCTI Retail Merchandising test and all earned the PA Skills Certificate.



Diversified Occupations/Capstone classes:

The Diversified Occupations program provides a cooperative arrangement between Delaware Valley High School and local employers whereby the student receives career- related theory instruction in the school and on-the-job training through part-time paid employment in business/industry. The area of training may be in any career area where there are needs for trained persons and must relate to the student's career objective. Students in the program participate in a school-to-work class every 1st period to learn soft skills, finance, employment documents and teamwork. Students are employed in a meat deli, architect office, daycare and retail stores. Students also received an OSHA safety certificate by completing a Career Safe Program and the Customer Service Certification from the National Retail Federation. Three students took the NOCTI 21st Century Skills for Workplace Success and all the PA Skills Certificate.

The Capstone students extend their learning by working in a business relating to their CTE program. The students meet once a week to reinforce their shop skills and employability skills. Students were placed in a daycare and Dingmans Ferry Stone.



Office Technology:

The students assisted teachers, prepared flyers for DV Foundation, various athletic programs, camps, clinics and assisted in filing and organization within the 9/10 and 11/12 Offices. The students completed class activities to prepare them to work in an office environment and created a resume and letter of application for a simulated job.

7th grade Career Leadership classes:

Mrs. Favaro completed the following projects with the students:




Examples of Advanced Microsoft Word Projects Adjusting Tab, Indents, and Leaders

Career and Technical Education Barbara Coyle, Chair

OVERVIEW:

The 2018-2019 school year was full of thrills and challenges for the Career and Technical Education Department. We are grateful to the DVHS Administration, Dr. Bell and the School Board for their support as we move through our exciting construction and transition. We continue to expand our dual enrollment and articulation agreements with our post-secondary partners (Luzerne County Community College, Lackawanna College, Keystone College and Johnson College) through our SOAR- Students Occupationally and Academically Ready program. Our team of Instructors, Dr. Blaum, Mr. Mitchell and our Guidance Counselor, Jennifer Cosentino our proud to represent our department as we continue to "spread the word" about the value of CTE and attract and enroll an ever-growing number of students to prepare them for careers of the future.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS:

Automotive Technology:

Mr. Ryan started his year in November after the retirement of our previous chief, Mike Dobrzyn. The Automotive Technology Program continues to provide services to district and community drivers while providing state-of-the-art education to our students. The Automotive Technology is at maximum enrollment and has 25 new Level 1 students starting in the fall.

18-19 enrollment for the program includes 18 Level 1, 16 Level 2 and 9 Level 3 students. Of the 9 level 3 students taking the NOCTI all passed – 2 competent, 7 advanced in both areas. All earning their PA Skills Certificates. Mr. Ryan currently has 3 female (non-traditional) students who are fitting in quite well. Next year's enrollment is expected to be 25 in the morning and 26 in the afternoon.

Mr. Ryan reported that this year they've had the opportunity of servicing our district's maintenance vehicles providing our students exposure to 63 different types of vehicles giving them exposure to a huge variety of basic skills.





Building Trades:

The Building Trades Program had a great year settling into their new shop and classroom space. Enrolled students for the year were 13 Level 1, 9 Level 2 and 4 Level 3. There are 12 students enrolled to start Level 1 in the fall.

the end of May and earned certification. All the Marketing students took the OSHA Safety Training and received certification. Eight students also earned college credits though dual enrollment with Luzerne County Community College. The following credits were earned: customer service, advertising, marketing and sales. Five students took the NOCTI Retail Merchandising test, and all earned the PA Skills Certificate. There are 10 students enrolled in Business and Marketing Level 1 in the fall.



Diversified Occupations/Capstone:

The Diversified Occupations program provides a cooperative arrangement between Delaware Valley High School and local employers whereby the student receives career- related theory instruction in the school and on-the-job training through part-time paid employment in business/industry. The area of training may be in any career area where there are needs for trained professionals and must relate to the student's career objective. Students in the program participate in a school-to-work class every 1st period to learn soft skills, finance, employment documents and teamwork. Students are employed at a butcher/delicatessen, architect office, daycare and retail stores. Students also received an OSHA safety certificate by completing a "CareerSafe" Program and the Customer Service Certification from the National Retail Federation. Three students took the NOCTI 21st Century Skills for Workplace Success and all earned the PA Skills Certificate.

The Capstone students extend their learning by working in a business relating to their CTE program. The students meet once a week to reinforce their shop skills and employability skills. Students were placed in a daycare and Dingmans Ferry Stone.





Culinary Arts:

Chef Niosi and the Culinary Arts students enjoyed a busy and challenging year. There are currently 8 level 1, 10 level 2 and 4 level 3 students. Three of the 4 level 3 students took the NOCTi and all 3 received Advanced on both written and practical sections, 2 with a 95 and 1 with a 100! Eight level 1 students received their SERV Safe Food Handler Certification. All level 2 & 3 students took the SERV Safe Allergan and Manager Certification Exam the end of May. Projected enrollment is 12 level 1, 4 level 2 and 7 level 3 students. Chef reported that of his 3 level 3 students, 2 are currently enrolled in a culinary college with 1 student still undecided. The students have been extremely busy with the additional task of packing up the kitchen, along with the many community and school related breakfasts, dinners and functions. Chef reported that he, Mrs. Luna and all students are extremely excited about the new kitchen opening. He's hoping that the dining room will be able to offer more community involvement by way of outside organizational luncheon meetings.



Early Childhood Education:







On September 19th Deb Anagnost and Alyson Powell from Northampton Community College came to teach First Aid and CPR to Mrs. Pavinich's and Mrs. Farr's Early Childhood Education classes at Delaware Valley High School. 12 Level 1 Sophomores and Juniors, and 4 level 3 Seniors in the Early Childhood Education program participated in a 4-hour training that consisted of Infant and Pediatric CPR and First Aid. The students need to learn this information because they work very closely with children ages birth through 9 throughout their 3 years in our Early Childhood Education Program. There are 16 students enrolled to start ECE Level 1 in the fall.

On September 18th Mrs. Luann Scardino from the Mountain View School in Matamoras visited Mrs. Beth Pavinich's Early Childhood Education Level 1 classroom at Delaware Valley High School. Luann is an advocate in the field of Early Childhood and makes frequent visits to the classroom to discuss various topics in Early Childhood. During Monday's discussion Luann expressed the importance of observing children and maintaining confidentiality. Luann spoke with the high school students about why we observe children and shared some tips and tools to properly write an observation. Luann also spoke in length about the importance of confidentiality when working with children. Then Luann showed the Early Childhood Education students how to properly hand wash and sanitize tables. Luann expressed the importance of cleanliness in and Early Learning Center and when working with children.





On December 10, Ms. Chelsea Falotico from Safe Haven of Pike County came to talk to Mrs. Pavinich's Early Childhood education class at Delaware Valley high school. Chelsea is the outreach advocate for Safe Haven. She talked to the Early Childhood education students about the services that Safe Haven offers and about possible indicators of abuse. The students are currently learning about Abuse and Liability and the mandated reporting responsibilities teachers have when working with children. Chelsea provided the class with valuable information and resources that they will be able to use in their clinical

experiences. Ms. Pavinich had 11 Level 1 students, and all passed for the year. ECE Level 1 students, after they acquire required clearances and receive CPR training visit local pre-schools to work with industry professionals daily. Ms. Farr's Upper Level classes had 9 Level 2 students and 4 Level 3 students. All passed for the year. Our Level 2 students are trained to run our In-House pre-school, planning activities and curriculum. Our Level 3 students travel daily to DVES to serve as interns with teachers.

Electrical Trades:

Mr. Kuhn reported he currently has 7 level 1, 7 level 2 and 1 level 3 student. One level 2 and one level 3 student took NOCTI with both scoring Competent, receiving their Certificate of Competency. Mr. Kuhn's projected enrollment is 11 level 1, 6 level 2 and 5 level 3 students. Mr. Kuhn reported that he will have 1 female student next year. Mr. Kuhn spoke of seniors furthering their education with Evan Snyder going to Johnson College and Nathaniel DeVita going to High Point College.

Mr. Kuhn continues to improve and expand the Electrical Trades program and welcomed guest speakers Nelson Soberal – Lineman Local #1319 and Mike Brust – Union #81 to speak to potential and current students. Nelson brought his bucket truck and did several hands-on demonstrations. Students have been actively involved in various projects in conjunction with the task list. Mr. Kuhn reported that equipment has been approved by his committee that is essential to the task list which is: Hydraulic Punch Kit and a Communications Termination/Testing Kit. Additionally, the committee recommended Linemen High-Voltage Trainers, Linemen Climbing and Safety Gear, various linemen tools and Chromebook/Laptops. Mr. Kuhn reported that his students provided technical services for DV Drama's production of Mary Poppins.

Healthcare Careers

Ms. Coyle and the Healthcare Careers students moved into their new classroom/lab in May and have been busy settling into our beautiful new space. The Healthcare Careers program finished the year with 14 Level 1, 10 Level 2 and 6 Level 3 students. All passed for the year. 22 new Level 1 students have enrolled in the program this fall. 8 Seniors took the NOCTI exam, 4 of whom scored Advanced on their combined scores and earned PA Skills Certificates. Their scores qualified them to sit for a Certified Medical Assistant or Certified Nursing Assistant exam through our partnership with the AMCA (American Medical Certification Association). Of our graduating seniors, 5 have enrolled in 4-year post-secondary programs, 2 in 2-year programs and 1 is headed to the workforce. One has signed with the Air Force National Guard will attend basic and technical training beginning in August.

Our program continues to partner with Milford Healthcare and Belle Reve Senior Living to provide our upper level students with real-world client care experiences. Both valued partners offer monetary awards to graduating seniors. We welcomed a guest speaker from Safe Haven of Pike County to address our students' role as future Mandatory Reporters recognizing the signs of Elder Abuse. All upper level students (levels 2 and 3) receive CPR/AED certification and an OSHA Workplace Safety certification

through "CareerSafe". Finally, each graduating senior earns a Pennsylvania Personal Care Assistant Certification through the PA Department of Health. This certification qualifies them to work in an Assisted Living setting providing direct patient care when they graduate and turn 18.

Healthcare Careers students and HOSA members participated as volunteers in both the United Way Day of Caring 9/11 Memorial Blood Drive and DVHS' Student Blood Drive in April (our January blood drive was cancelled due to weather). Our Red Cross Leadership Team attended the "HS Kickoff Event" at the Pike County Training Center in October where they learned and explored donor recruitment techniques.

English Language Development (ELD) Raycharlyn Krasulski, Chairperson

Highlights:

It was an exciting year for the new English Language Development (ELD) department. First, we started transitioning from our name of English as Second language (ESL) to English Language Development for the start of next school year. As a department, the staff worked together to streamline our entrance, reclassifying and monitoring methods in accordance with PDE regulations and the WIDA instructional model for all English Learners (ELs) in the district. We also redesigned district ELD documents including the ELD verification cover page that accompanies all ELD documents and established an ELL accommodation form to assist during PSSA and Keystone testing to ensure all of our students' needs are met. This will also help guide all content area and ELD specialists to help their ELs attain their English proficiency goals.

The ELD staff in the elementary setting adopted a new textbook series entitled Reach from National Geographic and is in the process of rewriting new curriculum for Kindergarten, 1st grade, 2-3 and 4-5 grade clusters to be in place next school year. In the secondary setting, we welcomed a new hire, Lindsey Strapec to assist with ELD instruction at Delaware Valley Middle School. She brings with her three years of experience working with ELs in the Scranton School District.

As a department, we hosted two in-service offerings at the elementary and secondary levels to educate our teachers about the needs of our EL population. This year, Mrs. Raycharlyn Krasulski and Ms. Samantha Orr attended ELD networking meetings hosted at IU 20 to gain valuable information about best practices, PDE updates and current issues in English Language Development. We also made goals to strengthen our program in the years to come including but not limited to implementing additional inservice offerings in the elementary and secondary setting for all staff and developing cultural pamphlets to educate our staff about cultural sensitivities.

Throughout the school year, 2nd grade English Language Developers at DDPS worked on many writing and reading comprehension activities. Our main focus was on learning how to use the RACE Graphic Organizer to answer Text Dependent Analysis Questions and Narrative Writing activities based on various prompts. Delaware Valley Elementary School (DVES)

There were three 2nd grade students, three 4th grade students, and one 5th grade student at DVES. Six students received instruction once a day and one was on a consultative model. Developing English Proficiency through Writing, Reading, and Speaking were the primary focus for these students for this past school year. Technology was a valuable tool and highly motivational for these students as we incorporated the use of the smartboard, chrome books, and IPad apps to engage them with English language rich experiences as well as using the ESL Companion books to the ELA curriculum for each of their grade levels.

The ELD, classroom teachers, and reading teachers were in daily contact and discussion to collaborate and plan an individualized program which was designed to each student's specific ELD needs. Students were fully engaged within their classrooms with their grade level peers attempting to complete curricular work and tasks with adaptations and accommodations discussed and provided as needed by their teachers. As the end of the year approached, the students flew kites, learned how to play games such as Dominoes, Scrabble, Outburst, Jr., Guess What I Am, and Jeepers Peepers (an ask and answer question game), and various card games.

From these students, there were over eight home languages spoken in our classroom including Arabic, Portuguese, Gujarati, Spanish, Haitian Creole, French, Hungarian and Polish. This diverse group of students brought with them varying degrees of educational backgrounds, literacy levels, cultural practices and English language proficiencies. During the month of September, Mrs. Krasulski's class spent time developing their classroom community. To start of the school year, the class of English Learners prepared a presentation about their home languages and cultures to share with the other students and staff. The ELs were excited to introduce themselves in the new Library Commons. During each presentation, students were able to compare their home cultures with one another. The students learned a lot about each other and a lot of excitement was created from their follow-up discussions. The students learned that even though we may have differences, we have a lot more similarities in the end.



Our current group of six English Learners (ELs) worked hard to build their current reading levels and English proficiency abilities. On a daily basis, we practiced our listening, speaking, reading and writing skills while learning about current events, cultural practices in the United States and themes while tailoring the course to meet each of the student's current English proficiency levels. One special event was when the emerging ELs prepared and performed a Poetry Slam about "Coming to America." Each week, the class worked as a large group to complete a class read. During the third marking period, Mrs. Krasulski's students read, discussed and investigated their own lives as they read Mawi Asgedom's "The Code: The 5 Secrets of Teen Success". During



this workshop, students first journaled about their identity in a response called "Who Am I?". During a follow-up discussion, students were able to share lines from their narrative and share moments of empathy or surprise about one another. Students planned personal goals about improvements that they wanted to work on in their own lives. They identified support systems in their lives both at home and at school. In the last activity, students penned a letter to themselves about what they wished for their future including words of encouragement and tentative goals for the future. The students will receive their letters in the days leading up to their high school graduation. For some, that is this year and for others, in a few.

Reading Team

DVMS & DDMS – Both middle schools took teams to the annual Reading Olympics Competition this past winter. "The Reading Olympics competition is the culmination of the program that has teams of students reading books from a prepared list for several months prior to the final event. Each team consists of 8 to 16 students who agree to read from groups of 45 books appropriate for their age and reading level. The book lists are prepared the previous year by interested teachers and librarians." Both middle schools represented Delaware Valley School District very well, competing impressively. The DVMS team placed ninth; the DDMS teams place second and eighth.

- DVHS Being a member of the reading team gives the opportunity of encountering new books to students. Each team of approximately ten students is faced with the task of reading 45 books and answering questions based on those books. The team from Delaware Valley High School participated in the Colonial IU Reading Olympics, coming in sixth place.
- Brown Book Award This award is given to the junior with the most highly developed verbal and written communication skills. Virginia Yost received the award this year.
- English Proficiency Award This award goes to the strongest senior English student.
 Department members donate money to give the student a monetary award. This year's award went to Emma Dove.
- Special Moments and Highlights
 - o The staff of the *Del.Aware* published ten regular editions and a 40-page senior edition this school year.
 - Read Across the Parking Lot This year, Mrs. Kratz's Honors 8 students participated in Read Across the Parking Lot. Students went to DDPS and partnered with a buddy to read for one half hour. According to Mrs. Kratz, this was one of the most memorable experiences of the year for students.
 - Flipgrid Reflections To help students become more reflective learners, Mr. Jayne utilized Flipgrid in his sixth grade classroom this year. Flipgrid allows students to record videos in response to assessments/TDAs. Students then have the ability to analyze their mistakes and look for areas in which they can make improvements and talk about goals that they have for the next assessment.
 - Hour of Code Students in Mr. Jayne's ELA 6 classes participated in the Hour of Code.
 Coding teaches students computational thinking, analytical thought, and problem solving.
 Writing an essay is a lot like writing code, so this activity was the perfect fit for the ELA classroom. During the activity, students were challenged to create an original short story using Scratch, a block coding platform used by Google.
 - Wordsmithing Opportunities
 - Through a writing elective, after school writing clubs, and school- based publications, our students were given numerous opportunities to fine tune their writing skills and explore their creativity during the 2018-2019 school year.
 - Literary Magazines Both middle school produced fabulous magazines this year, highlighting original student poetry and literature.
 - Poem in Your Pocket Day is a national day of poetry appreciation. Mrs. Kratz's classes celebrated the day by hosting a Poetry Café where students were invited to read their favorite poems.
 - Combo Celebration To celebrate a year of diligence and commitment and to highlight fellowship, the keystone of the Combo experience, the Combo teachers organize a gathering at the end of each school year for the Combo students in grades nine through eleven. - Combo 10 During a class trip, students volunteered at Malibu Dude Ranch, cleaning stables and performing odd jobs.









Highlights:

Delaware Valley High School:

Intermediate Foods and Gourmet Foods

Hand washing:

Students in Mrs. Studsrud's Intermediate Foods A and Gourmet Foods classes learned how bacteria is transferred from surface to surface, surface to food and surface/food to a person. Types, symptoms and foods were discussed for many types of food poisoning. To prevent food poisoning students applied a non-toxic liquid to their hands and then discussed the reasons for thoroughly washing hands with hot water and soap to remove bacteria prior to working with food. The liquid glows under a black light allowing the students to see how well they wash their hands. To conclude the lesson, there was also a glow in the dark powder on the tables which many students had touched after washing their hands. This showed students that germs are everywhere and transfer unnoticed to other surfaces. To conclude the lesson, students scrubbed the tables, counters, and sinks.





Knife Skills:

Students in Mrs. Studerud's Intermediate Foods A class learned safe Knife skills, using the appropriate knife for the job, different cuts, and how they enhance the appearance of a plate of food. Students practiced their knife skills with playdough they made in class. Then using the newly acquired knife skills the students prepared vegetables for vegetable platters.





Measuring:

Students in Mrs. Studsrud's Intermediate Foods A and Gourmet Foods classes practiced their measuring skills by individually preparing a "Cake in a Mug" recipe. Each student went through the buffet style measuring steps by measuring each ingredient and placing in a mug, stirred by hand, and microwaved for one and half minutes. Student enjoyed the fast and easy individual dessert.



Math and Measuring:


Intermediate Foods A begins with a learning some basic math skills such as fractions and measurements. After mastering these skills students make an Orange Julius for their first food prep experiences.



Crepe Wars:

Students in Mrs. Studsrud's Gourmet Foods classes competed within each class to prepare the best crepe. The winning kitchen from each class earned the right to compete in the Crepe Off against the other class winners for overall best crepe. Each group used the same crepe recipe, but chose their individual kitchen crepe filling, garnish and plating ideas. The groups also chose a descriptive name for their crepe. As each crepe was served, judges were able to ask questions to the students regarding preparation, assembly, and ingredients choices.





Baked Alaska:

Students in Mrs. Studsrud's Gourmet Foods classes finished the Southwest and Alaska unit by making Baked Alaska. During the unit students presented topics on how the purchase of Alaska by the US came to be, the value of the land, lifestyles, food and the Iditarod. Also discussed was how and where Baked Alaska was made to commemorate the purchase from Russia. Students successfully followed the guidelines to beat egg whites to stiff peaks, assemble cake, ice cream and meringue. The Baked Alaska then would bake in the oven for 3-4 minutes until browned. They chose to make individual servings or one large baked Alaska





Day of the Dead Cross Curricular Activity:

Mrs. Ross's Intermediate Foods A class worked collaboratively with Senor Cotroneo and his AP Spanish class to prepare for a presentation followed up with traditional foods for the Day of the Dead. Students from the foods classes made and decorated skull shaped cookies and Day of the Dead yeast bread. Students from the AP Spanish class prepared and presented facts about the Day of the Dead.











Homemade Pasta:

The students in Mrs. Stuchlak's Intermediate Foods A class took a trip to Italy during their Pasta Unit. All students participated in making homemade pasta. Instead of making just the basic spaghetti, many of the students decided to challenge themselves and make homemade ravioli. They were surprised how easy and delicious the homemade ravioli was.



Student in Mrs. Ross's Intermediate Foods A class enjoy the hands on experience of making their own homemade pasta. Once the pasta dried, it was then boiled to all dente. Then the students made homemade chicken alfredo.





Food Truck Challenge!

Intermediate Foods B students had a fun time designing and competing in the Food Truck Wars. There is something for everyone to do when preparing for the Food Truck Wars. The students were judged on the design of the Food Truck, the samples of food they made, and also originality.



It's Ham Good!

First semester Foods B students in Mrs. Ross's class made a ham dinner and enjoyed inviting teachers to join them. They learned how to prepare foods the day before and reheat the casseroles the day of the dinner. The ham was roasted for 2 ½ hours in an electric roasting oven.





Quick, Bread!

During the Quick Bread unit, students learned the technique of biscuit making. Not only did they learn how to make buttermilk biscuits, but by adding a little sugar and fruits they made a yummy easy drop Danish. Biscuits became an easy snack to prepare and enjoy while completing hands on learning activities such as the pie vocabulary lattice pie puzzles.





Grilled Cheese Challenge:

The students in Mrs. Stuchlak's Intermediate Foods B classes participated in a Grilled Cheese Competition. Kitchen groups were given the challenge of making a grilled cheese using various types of cheese, breads, and meats. The groups used their imaginations and created some award winning sandwiches that were judged by DV staff volunteers.





Pizza, Pizza!

As a final project, the students in Mrs. Stuchlak's Intermediate Foods B classes participated in a Pizza Challenge. Kitchen groups were given the challenge of creating an "Out of this World Pizza". Students used their creativity to combine different ingredients to create pizzas that were unique and delicious.






Housing and Design:

Students in Mrs. Studsrud's Housing and Design class learned the steps and financial costs of buying a house. To explain the role of a Real Estate Agent, Mr. and Mrs. Schutte from Better Homes and Gardens Real Estate spoke to the class. The discussion began with how to become a real estate agent and the pros and cons of the career. Mr. Schutte talked of selling stigmatized homes, applying for a mortgage, counteroffering, the possibility of losing money and the actual cost of closing. In addition, Mr. Schutte stated the steps a buyer should go through to be sure their mortgage is approved such as, credit rating, debt to income ratio and financial stability.



Freshman Seminar:

Students in Freshman Seminar class had to opportunity to listen to senior Julia Thompson as she spoke of her challenges and successes in having Tourette's Syndrome. Julia first explained what Tourette's is and symptoms that are visible. She described how she feels when she is ticking and the variety of tics that a person may display. There are treatments and methods she uses to control the tics. She explained how art has helped her to control the tics and how her family and friends are a great support system. To end she told of her goals in Art Therapy, how she is using this to build a career.




The Bean Budget Game:

Students in Mrs. Studsrud's and Mrs. Pavinich's Freshmen Seminar experienced budgeting one's income with the Bean game. Following lessons on fixed and flexible expenses, gross and net pay, students were given a set amount of beans which represent money. Student had to decide how many beans they spend in each category, such as housing, food, and transportation. With the beans they had left, they could spend in other categories such as entertainment, insurance, savings, gifts and personal care. Beans were taken away to represent a lower income and to redo their budget. Discussion on difficult decisions in budgeting were covered. Lastly the beans were cut back again to represent minimum wage. Students again discussed difficult decisions.

Parenting Skills:

On Wednesday September 12, Elaine Tucker spoke to Mrs. Pavinich's Parenting Skills class about the harmful effects of drinking while pregnant. Mrs. Tucker works for the CMP Drug and Alcohol commission and is the Drug and Alcohol Prevention Specialist for the Delaware Valley School District. She presented to the Parenting Skills class as part of Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder Awareness month. Mrs. Tucker stressed the importance of abstaining from consuming any sort of alcohol during pregnancy and the harmful effects it could have on your unborn child. She also showed the class a baby simulator that was born with FASD. The class members immediately took notice of the facial and size abnormalities that this baby had. Mrs. Tucker's message was extremely important and well received by the students.



Real Care Babies!

Taking care of an infant is easy, isn't it??? The students in Mrs. Pavinich's 5th period Parenting Skills get to see for themselves, sort of. Delaware Valley High School is fortunate to have the "Baby Think It Over" program as a component of the Parenting Skills class. This program has been a part of our curriculum of over 15 years. The students practice with the "robot babies" in class for about a week before they take the baby home for the weekend. During the weekend simulation the student has to rock, feed, burp, change, and care for the baby. This experience helps the high school students realize what a huge responsibility having a baby is.





Maslow's Hierarchy Of Human Needs:

Student's in Mrs. Pavinich's Parenting Skills Class tried to determine the order in which our needs have to be met according to Psychologist Abraham Maslow. Needs lower down in the hierarchy must be satisfied before individuals can attend to needs higher up. The students used cups with words and phrases on them to recreate the Hierarchy.







Safe Haven:

On December 10 Ms. Chelsea Falotico from Safe Haven of Pike County came to talk to Mrs. Pavinich's Early Childhood Education and Parenting Skills class at Delaware Valley High school. Chelsea is the outreach advocate for Safe Haven. She talked to students about the services that Safe Haven offers and about possible indicators of abuse. Chelsea provided the class with valuable information and resources that they will be able to use in their clinical experiences.

The Delaware Valley High School Counseling Department continues to have an ongoing commitment to building relationships with various colleges and programs of post-secondary education. On September 20th, for the first time ever, the Delaware Valley High School hosted a College Fair. All 11th and 12th grade students were assigned to visit with the recruiters from 37 different colleges and universities. An instant admit day was held this year with Wilkes University. A Senior Parent Financial Aid Night and Junior Parent Informational Night were held to assist parents and students in the financial aid and college admission process. A financial aid workshop was offered for parents and students where participants were able to bring in their financial paperwork and complete the actual financial aid application. The 11/12 Counseling Office, through the use of Naviance, processed approximately 995 college applications for the Class of 2019.

Support Groups

Support groups are offered at all levels and vary by school and student need. Groups that are offered include: Alateen, Anger Management, Boys Group/Girls Group, Changing Families, Coping Skills, Dealing with Anxiety and Depression, Dealing with Feelings, Expressive Art, Expect Respect, Girls Empowerment, Go Girls, Goal Setting, Grief, Healthy Relationships, Leadership, Organizational Skills, Self Esteem, Serenity Now, Social Skills, SOGIE (formerly LGBTQ+), and Stress Management.

Classroom Instruction and Meetings

Classroom instruction is part of the Elementary School Counseling curriculum. School Counselors and Social Workers offer other classroom instruction and meetings that take place at the secondary level. Elementary classroom instruction topics covered include: The 7 Habits, Bullying, Career Education, Coping Skills, Effective Communication, Feelings, Goal Setting, Good Touch/Bad Touch, Healthy Choices, Problem Solving, Safety, Self-Awareness, Stranger Danger, and Test Taking Skills. Secondary level topics include: Advanced Placement courses, Career Day, Career Planning, College Application Process, Counseling Services Offered, CTE presentations, Hobby Presentations, "I" statements, Scheduling, Social Skills and Transition Groups.

Instructional Assistance and Student Assistance Program

School Counselors and School Social Workers work closely to identify and help students in need of academic or personal/ social assistance. As members of the team, they collect and analyze data and work with teachers and families to develop a plan for student success.

Student Attendance Improvement Plans

The School Counseling Department worked with students and families to create an attendance plan for any student with truancy or excessive absenteeism.

Suicide Prevention

The School Counseling Department is committed to the safety of our students. Members will speak with students who expresses a concern, screen their level of safety and make appropriate referrals for further care or assessment.

SCHOOL COUNSELING DEPARTMENT HIGHLIGHTS Bully Prevention & Unity Day

Each building participated in Bully Prevention Month in October including Unity Day. A wide variety of activities and events took place including an annual unity walk, spirit week(s), daily announcements, bulletin boards, and classroom lessons all related to types of bullying, statistics, and resources.



Start with Hello





Delaware Valley School District joined with thousands of schools and youth organizations from across the country to bring Sandy Hook's Start with Hello initiative to the district. This initiative helps students be more social, more aware, and more accepting of all their peers. Students learned to say hello in five different languages at the Elementary School. On September 24th, students passed on their smiles.

School Assessment Coordinators

School Counselors serve as the School Assessment Coordinators for all state testing including the Pennsylvania System of School Assessment and the Keystone Exams.



Mental Health Awareness Month

May is Mental Health Awareness Month. All Counseling Departments recognized the importance of wellness, how to identify feelings and resources. A variety of activities included: Spirit Week(s), teacher appreciation letters, student created posters, informational bulletin boards, daily announcement and self-care activities to practice daily.

Career Readiness Standards

The Counseling Department developed, collected and oversaw the Pennsylvania Career Readiness Standards. Students are required to generate six artifacts in grades 3-5 and 6-8, and eight artifacts in grades 9-11. Counselors maintain these artifacts and report completion.





Elementary School Counseling Department

Kindness





All students listened to the story "Have You Filled a Bucket Today?" Students then took a Kindness Pledge with their class and signed the banner. All students were given a Kindness Card task (open the door for someone, smile at 5 people, give someone a compliment, etc.).

Leadership Day

Fifth grade students led stations throughout the day in different themes. The themes included: Sports, Arts, STEM, Music/Readers Theater, and Mini Museum. Fifth graders were tour guides for the third and fourth grade students.

Bus to Beat Incentive Program

This incentive program was developed to decrease bus referrals and promote positive behavior. Students earned a trip to the treasure chest every 10 days of good behavior on their "ship" (bus). When six treasure chests are acquired, students have the opportunity to participate in a fun end of year activity.





The House System

The House System was created to help improve overall attendance, behavior, and academics. Each grade was split among four houses:


Dual Enrollment

- Chief Moglia and Officer Gaughan continue to assist in teaching the drug and violence prevention portion of the Health 9 classes using the "Too Good for Drugs and Violence" curriculum. This is an interactive and hands on curriculum that uses a variety of learning strategies to teach topics such as assertive behavior, communication skills, relationship building refusal skills, decision making skills and conflict resolution skills. They also teach lessons in Driver's Education on DUI, and Health 11 and Health 12 on cyber safety, drug and alcohol prevention, and healthy relationships.
- The DVHS physical education department continues to offer the following elective courses: Physical Fitness and Training, Sports Officiating, and Leadership and Adventure Education. In Physical Fitness and Training, students learned various training methods and techniques, wrote SMART goals, and created training plans to meet their personal fitness goals. In Sports Officiating students learned the rules and various calls involved in officiating both team and individual sports. Students also received information about different officiating certifications and openings in the area. In the Leadership and Adventure Education class, the students participated in different team building activities that centered on the 7 Habits of Highly Effective Teens. The class completed different team and individual initiatives culminating with a trip to Pine Forest Camp for a high ropes course.
- The Athletic Training Classes took a field trip to tour the Kings College sports medicine facilities. Students participated in activities demonstrating the science behind lower and upper extremity taping, ankle injury prevention programs, modalities for healing, dual-energy x-ray absorptiometry for bone density, and tensiomygraphy for muscle function.
- The Officiating Class put their skills to good use officiating a volleyball tournament hosted by the sophomore and freshman classes as well as a dodgeball tournament hosted by the senior class.



Students stayed after school with parent permission slips to watch Cloudy with a Chance of Meatballs in our cafeteria. We had a little over 50% of our student population signed up to stay for the movie! After parent pickup, we held our annual art show featuring pasta and meatball artwork, PTA spaghetti dinner, book fair, and fourth grade bake sale. We were very fortunate that many of our teachers and staff stayed to assist in our Extravaganza Night. Our PTA raised about \$650 which will be used towards the purchase of a new sound system for our gymnasium.
- Ms. Goudreau and Mrs. Mang collaborated on a 5th grade science project. Students researched a
 biome and animal of their choice. During their research, students were able to use zSpace to
 experience their biome and the various animals. Upon completion of their research, students
 create a Google Slides presentation.
- Held an in-service for zSpace, Cricut, and 3D printer.
- Students that were in good standing in the library and had all library books returned at the end of the year were entered into a raffle. Flagship Cinemas donated 4 movie passes for our students. We also had various prizes such as posters, books, games, and toys.
- During gifted students used the 3D printer and zSpace for various projects.
- Gifted students competed in the K'Nex Challenge through the IU.
- Gifted students went on a field trip to the Lackawanna Coal Mine and Anthracite Museum.



DDMS:

- The DDMS library provided all students with the opportunity to have one free 3D print a month. Students were able to download premade items from Thingiverse or design their own items with Tinkercad, a free web based 3D modeling software. Over 300 items were printed throughout the year, ranging from toys, puzzles, model airplanes and cars, and phone holders.
- The Z-space was used by many students, learning how to build circuits with the app Franklin's Lab, did dissections with Vived Science, and showed off their artistic side with the Leopoly modeling app.
- Many classes came for library book check out and several of the sixth and seventh grade classes
 had interactive lessons on genre and created their own Book Spine poetry, a form of found poetry
 using books available in the library.







- The library hosted many events, including Round 2 of the Tri-state Spelling Bee, Career Day, Leader in me Workshops, Department meetings, High School Scheduling, FBLA competitions, Student Council Game Night, two Scholastic Book Fairs. The library is also a place for multiple clubs to meet including Literary Magazine, Yarn Club, Stock Market Club, Anime Club, After School Library, and Lighthouse Team.
- Mrs. Goldstein also is in charge of the Sound and Lights team and lead her team to run the tech for two shows, Willy Wonka Jr. and I Think My Teacher is an Alien. They also assisted on the school Talent show and other concerts. DDTV is another club Mrs. Goldstein runs, they are in charge of broadcasting the morning news program. There are anchors who read the announcements and the techies who monitor the technology to be sure that it is running smoothly. The team also makes sure that concerts, plays and awards assemblies are recorded so that Mrs. Goldstein can make DVDs of the event for archiving and production purposes.
- DDMS Gifted: This year's theme was Power. The students learned about superpowers, electricity, marketing and propaganda, and more. They worked with Mrs. Yatsonsky to do artistic representations of what they believe power represents. Mrs. Waleck, the FACS teacher, taught them how to sew and they created monster dolls. With Mr. Comunale, the Tech Ed teacher, the students learned and honed their 3d modeling skills and also worked together as a team to build a functioning conveyor belt using VEX parts. The students also worked on Passion Projects of their choice, some worked on learning sign language, learning how to modify computer games, teaching their fellow students, and building and coding a vending machine.

DVMS: Thingiverse, a website dedicated to the sharing of user-created digital design files, was utilized for students in the gifted class to search for a significant object (literal or symbolic) from their *Blind Date with a Book* novel to print. Once students located and uploaded their object, it was printed using the library's new 3-D printer. Students explained the significance of the object to their novel when they presented their movie poster.





DVHS:

- The beginning of the year began with big changes to the library, now the Learning Commons. The old library tables were turned into white boards, which have been a popular addition for classes to work on, new tables on casters were added that can be moved into different configurations for class use and for testing during Keystones and AP exams, and also new high top tables on a newly tiled floor which became a popular lunch spot for many students this year. Mathematics Department Christine Marcial, Chair

Highlights: Math Peer Tutoring Program

The Math Peer Tutoring Program served approximately 400 students in 27 sessions during the 2018-2019 school year. Under the supervision of two math teachers, tutoring was primarily provided by students who volunteered their time after school each Wednesday to serve as math tutors in any math course, including Calculus and AP Statistics (a special thank you to Kevin DeVizia for his time and effort in providing extra help in AP Statistics). As the program ended, twenty-two students were awarded Certificates of Appreciation for their contributions as math tutors. Dominic Dijan received the "Math Tutor of the Year" award for his commitment and dedication to the program.



Marywood Math Contest

The 2019 Marywood High School Math Contest, sponsored by the college's Math and Computer Science Club, iMACS, was held on, March 30th from 10 to 11 a.m. in the Liberal Arts Center of the campus. There were two versions of the exam for this annual contest:

- The Level I test is designed for 9th- and 10th-grade students.
- The Level II test is more appropriate for 11th and 12th graders.

Eighteen DVHS students participated in the Marywood Math Contest. The following students ranked in the top 10:

Scholastic Bowl: Competition Tournaments

Delaware Valley's Scholastic Bowl program had one of its busiest seasons ever in 2018-19, with its share of near-misses and big wins. Despite losing all four members of the previous season's A-team to graduation and having others expecting that this would be a rebuilding year for DV, the members of this year's team took it on themselves to set some lofty goals and eventually finished as champions of our local Tri-State Rotary League, champions of the IU-20, champions of Northeastern PA's High School Challenge, and runners-up in WVIA's 24-county Scholastic Scrimmage and took their best-ever finish at States, finishing fourth. But more important than any team win was the way they went about accomplishing all of this, not giving up after some disappointing early-season near-miss finishes. They believed in themselves, didn't give up on their goals, identified how to improve and along the way to

building their legacy of winning they built on their excellent teamwork and character. A huge portion of this effort belongs to two excellent senior leaders, Emma Dove and Christian Secular, who finished off their stellar four-year careers in great style. As these two seniors graduate, they leave behind an excellent core for the future, including Darius Bermudez, Lucas Helms, and JD Flick who will now look to build on the foundation they've already started and follow the examples of hard work and love of learning left behind by the likes of Emma and Christian.

University of Scranton Programming Contest

On March 29th, 6 students from both the Computer Programming Club and AP Computer Science A participated in the 29th Annual University of Scranton Programming Contest. The two teams consisted of Noah Irgang, Aaron Loihle, Christian Secular, Nick Drago, Yumi Jin, and Lauren Pearl. Although they did not place in top three, they worked very hard, coding extremely difficult programs for **over 6 hours!!** Each team ended up placing in the top half of the competition.



Women of Science and Math

On December 8th, Catalina Arrabito, Caitlin Irwin, Esther Lee, Mary Matthews, Shira Michel, and Sarah Nackman traveled to Bedford High School outside of Boston to compete in the 16th Annual Women of Science Competition. The girls competed in two teams of three. Prior to attending the competition, each team had to design and build a mousetrap powered device to carry an egg across a 1/8" cable. The device was tested during one of the events at the competition to see how far it could make it across the cable. There were also three other events at the competition that focused on other science, engineering, and mathematics challenges, ranging from trivia to on-site building events. Both teams were competitive in all events and represented DV well. The team consisting of Catlin, Mary and Shira placed in the top 10 (out of almost 40 teams) in the pre-building engineering event.



Algebra Keystone: After-school remediation program

From September to December students not yet proficient on the Keystone Algebra exam were invited to attend an afterschool program to review and reinforce Algebra topics in order to prepare them to retake the Keystone test in December. Beginning in March students scheduled to take the Algebra Keystone in May were invited to attend the review sessions that met twice a week through the second week in May. More than 30 students attended the first 12 sessions and over 50 students attended the second 15 sessions. Students attending 75% of the classes were treated to a pizza party. Students attending the winter session who showed growth as re-takers were given a free movie pass and students who attended in the spring session and were proficient will be given movie passes in the fall.

The program is student driven and individualized by using students' CDT results and past testing results from previous Keystone exams. Using the Edulastic and Khan Academy websites, students completed practice from the six different anchors. During each session two teachers were available to answer questions and reteach topics. Students worked at their own pace on topics in which they were deficient. State anchors were reviewed, as well as test taking strategies. During each session constructed response questions were reviewed as this is an area where many of the student's struggle. Laurie Osczepinski, Kimberly Orben and Jenelle Gunderman supervised the students and offered tutoring during the sessions on a rotating basis.

ACM Code Jam

On November 2, Computer Programming Club and AP Computer Science A/Principles students participated in the ACM Code Jam at the Carbon Lehigh Intermediate Unit 21 in Schnecksville, PA. The two teams that went consisted of Rich Albanese, Nick Drago, Andrew Hoopman. Aaron Loihle, Nash Hamill, Liam Hermida, Noah Irgang and Christian Secular. Although the results were only released for the top three teams, the two teams represented DV well, managing to complete extremely difficult coding programs in just only two hours.



Bloomsburg University Programming Contest

On April 9th, 15 students from both the Computer Programming Club and AP Computer Science A/Principles participated in the 24rd Annual Bloomsburg University Programming Contest. All four teams represented DV well and did an outstanding job trying to master 10 extremely difficult mathematical coding programs.

Math 24 Competition

How are your mental math skills? Do you find it easy to compute numbers mentally? If you are a mental math genius, then Math 24 is a game for you! Students from Ms. Troast's, Mrs. Gonzalez's, and Mrs. Scott's classes attended a Math 24 competition in Easton, PA. Students competed at the local level to earn one of the 15 coveted spots on the team for the regional competition. There, students from different schools around the area competed against each other. It was a fun day for the middle school students, as they participated in four thrilling rounds of competition among 100 students! Each round had a set of cards for the proctor to flip over and on every card were four numbers. The four numbers must be added, subtracted, multiplied, or divided to equal the number 24. Here is the catch...the students had only a short 15 seconds to find each solution! Some students were so quick that they solved the card within an impressive three seconds! The first round consisted of single-digit numbers, the second round included double-digit numbers, and the third round was a variable round. The variable round challenged the students to find a number that satisfied two sets of four numbers, rather than one. The final round was also a variable round. Ritesh Patel made it to round three, being one of the top twelve students in the whole competition for his grade! The amount of effort and diligence displayed by all of the students in the competition was outstanding. The combination of their hard work and mental math abilities proudly represented DVMS!

Mu Alpha Theta

The Mu Alpha Theta National High School and Three-Year College Mathematics Honor Society was founded in 1957 by Dr. Richard V. Andree and his wife, Josephine Andree, at the University of Oklahoma. In Andree's words, Mu Alpha Theta is "an organization dedicated to promoting scholarship in mathematics and establishing math as an integral part of high school and junior college education".

The Delaware Valley High School Mu Alpha Theta Math Honor Society members tied for 22nd place of 100 teams (1st of 7 teams in our region) in the Pennsylvania Math League Competition, which consisted of a series of 6 contests administered monthly from October through March.

Annual Emmaus Programming Competition

On February 22nd, two DV teams participated in the 4th Annual Emmaus Programming Competition at Emmaus High School in Emmaus, PA. The two teams consisted of Rich Albanese, Jason Bello, Nick Drago, Andrew Hoopman, Noah Irgang, Yumi Jin, and Christian Secular. This competition is unlike any other event the programming students attend because students from Emmaus's programming club organized, wrote and judged the competition (with little help from their advisors). Although the results were only released for the top three teams, the two teams were extremely competitive and represented DV well, managing to complete extremely difficult coding programs in just only three hours.



American Mathematics Competition

In February, 57 Delaware Valley students in grades 9-12 participated in the American Mathematics Competition, a challenging and prestigious contest sponsored by the Mathematical Association of America.

MathCon National Contest

DVMS had 15 students from grades sixth through eighth compete in the MathCon National Contest with Miss Troast. This competition was held online and allowed students from DVMS to compete against other grade level students on a rigorous test of mathematical knowledge. In third place for DVMS and placing 972nd for 6th grade in the country was Brady McAveney. In second place for DVMS and placing 868th for 7th grade in the country was Jake Rhein. Tied for first place for DVMS was Abby Zimmerman (placing 489th in the country in 7th grade) and Kyle Czekaj (placing 462nd in the country for 7th grade). Students competed against over 50,000 students nationally for their rankings.

Johnson College: NPCTM Math Competition

Twelve students represented the Delaware Valley Middle School in the annual NPCTM Johnson College Mathematics Competition in May. These students have earned the honor to compete at a college campus through all of their work and accomplishments in mathematics this year. Eighth grade competitors included Nicole Martel, Brandon McElhaney, Tony Yang, and Jessica Rhule. Seventh grade competitors included Christian Perunsky, Kyle Czekaj, Cameron Maino, and Nixon Kameen. Sixth grade competitors included Smit Patel, Owen Carso, Riley Krick, and Juliet Fitzpatrick. Miss Troast and Mr. Salus escorted students. At the competition, our team competed in several different rounds including an individual, group, and relay component. Riley Krick placed second in the 5th/6th grade team round and Nicole Martel placed second in the 7th/8th team round. These students have worked hard all year and had a wonderful opportunity to demonstrate those great Delaware Valley math skills!



The Math Lab

The Math Lab in room A3 of the high school is open to students all seven periods of the day, including all lunches. The math lab is staffed by teachers each period and is a place for students to catch up on missed work, get additional tutoring or take an exam. This year the math lab serviced 2604 students. Thirty-eight percent of the students came during their lunch time to get extra help and tutoring.

- October 18,-Fall Parent Workshop- "Homework Help"
 During this workshop, parents created tri-fold homework center which included: alphabet strip, cursive writing directions, COPS for editing, etc.
- DDPS reading team celebrated Read Across America in March by sponsoring a "Hats Off to Reading Challenge." Over 300 students participated. The class from each grade level with the most participants got to spray Ms. Butaitis with silly string at our school wide pop-up. The month's activities culminated with a Storybook Character Parade. Delaware Valley Elementary School (DVES)

Delaware Valley Elementary School's Title 1 reading program had a camping theme this year to support and encourage reading at our school. Our classrooms and bulletin boards promoted reading, positive attitudes, and the Seven Habits through themed displays. Our parent involvement meetings and reading incentives included many activities.

A welcome back Summer Reading Incentive event was held in September to celebrate the students who completed our summer reading challenge. We partnered with the Pike County Public Library to promote reading throughout the summer months.

In October, we held our Fall Title 1 Parent Involvement Meeting to explain the programs we use with our Title 1 students. We offered many tips and suggestions for parents to use at home to help their children with reading and homework.

Shohola Elementary School (SES)










Dingman-Delaware Middle School (DDMS)

Curriculum and Courses:

 The department has put a great deal of work into the revision and updating of multiple high school curricula and middle school courses. The middle school classes also had a complete textbook update, to reflect advances in available technology and hybrid models of learning.

Highlights:

 Mr. Koretz's 6th grade World History students received a visit from archaeologist Dr. Ruth Maher, from William Patterson University. Dr. Maher discussed how archaeologists use history and science to link together scenes from the past.



• In addition, Mr. Koretz's 6th students completed an apple mummification project, in which students used a scalpel (straw) to take the organs (apple pieces) out of an apple. Then salted it (salt), wrapped it in fine linen (toilet paper), and placed it in a tomb (happy meal box), for its trip to the afterlife.



- Mrs. Addio's 6th grade students completed several projects including Pharaoh's crowns, Thank you letters in English and Phoenician to Veterans, Cartouches in hieroglyphics, maps of China and surrounding countries, Flip books for Greece, and ABC books for Rome.
- Mrs. Bachman's 6th grade Social Studies includes Ancient civilizations and includes content from the Stone Age period through Ancient Rome. Students completed several projects that included the mummification of Cornish game hens, building Lego pyramids, geography map projects, and writing with primitive symbols.





- The AP US History students spent a day at the Franklin D. Roosevelt Presidential Library and Museum in Hyde Park, NY. Students were provided with a guided tour of FDR's birthplace and residence. The museum offered students the opportunity to learn about the personal and political lives of Franklin and Eleanor Roosevelt.

- Three high school students competed at the National History Day program which was held at Misericordia University in March. They reached the state competition which was held in May in Carlisle, PA.

- The 11th Grade Integrated English/Social Studies students completed numerous service learning projects including: The United Way Day of Caring, baked cookies and sang to the elderly during the holiday season, operated an Alex's Lemonade Stand at DVES where they raised \$400.00 for pediatric cancer research, and took a field trip to the 9/11 Museum and Reflection Pools in NYC.

World Languages Gary Cotroneo, Department Chair

Highlights

• In October, Mrs. Miller's DDMS/DVMS German 1 classes had an Oktoberfest with traditional food and some students dressed up in traditional German outfits.





On November 1 (even though it is celebrated on November 2), Students in Mr. Gary Cotroneo's AP Spanish class and one of Mrs. Ross's Intermediate Foods A classes had a cross-curricular culture day pertaining to Day of the Dead, which is known in many countries and cultures as All Souls Day. Mr. Cotroneo's class presented the cultural comparisons and contrasts of the day, complete with altar, while Mrs. Ross's class prepared the food, explained the ingredients in each recipe, and if there was a way to prepare them in a healthier manner.



On November 6, 37 Spanish students, accompanied by Mr. Cotroneo and Mrs. Krasulski, traveled to El Repertorio Español in New York City to see a play entitled "La Gringa," which is about a girl living in New York who returns to Puerto Rico to learn about her heritage, her family, and the world's view of Puerto Ricans. The play was conducted entirely in Spanish, which is an effective way to immerse students into the target language. Afterwards, the students were introduced to the actors in the play and encouraged to ask questions about what they saw.







 In December, All Spanish students took part in a Mexican culture experience to end 2018 organized by Michele Rojas.







• In January, we said "adios" to Kristin Terrones as she and her family embarked on a new journey to live in Mexico. We also said "bienvenidos" to Lindsey Strapec who replaced her and has been an asset to our department thus far.







• In March, the Advanced Placement Spanish students participate in the **National Spanish Contest** sponsored by the American Association of Teachers of Spanish and Portuguese. The National Spanish Contest winners for the Northeast Region were: David Marcial, who merited a (plata) Silver award nationally and 1st place (classroom experience) regionally; and Alexandra Garcia, who merited an Honorable Mention nationally and regionally. In May, there was a dinner in their honor at King's College in Wilkes-Barre.







Also in March, Level 4 and Advanced Placement French students participated in the National French
Contest sponsored by the American Association of Teachers of French. National French Contest
winners for the Northeast Region who merited awards in their divisions were: Autumn Baker, Bronze
award nationally, and Samuel Murray and Tara Stevenson, both Honorable Mention nationally.



• In April, the department was notified that it had again attained a Globe Award for excellent world language programs from the Pennsylvania State Modern Language Association. This is the third time in as many attempts that Delaware Valley has had the honor of meriting this award. It will last until the end of 2020.







On April 11, 4 Spanish students (Kamila Alario, Trevor Harvey, Abbey McFeely, and Jacob Siek), accompanied by Mr. Gary Cotroneo, participated in Immersion Day for high school world language students sponsored by the foreign language department at Marywood University. Students were involved in numerous activities using Spanish. They were told how important it is to continue studying Spanish, how marketable they would be in their future careers by being bilingual, and how many majors and careers there are where language is crucial and/or mandatory.





During the 4th marking period, students in Mrs. Krasulski's Spanish 2 class put their language skills to
the test. After learning terms for giving and receiving directions on a map, students worked in pairs to
successfully navigate a team member through a map designed on the classroom floor. One student
served as the GPS and had to give directions in Spanish to their partner who served as the vehicle.
The only catch, the student in the course had to rely on their listening skills to hear the directions as
they were blindfolded in the course. It was a true test of team work and Spanish communication skills.



 On June 4th, the culmination of the year in AP Spanish with "La Gran Cena" took place at El Patron Restaurant in Port Jervis.



• On June 5th, Madame Elke Miller's French 1 students took a field trip to **Holy Crepes** in Milford where they participated in a cooking demonstration and a French lunch.

Highlights:

- The Friendship House outpatient therapy social workers provided counseling to 68 students across
 the district and 18 students received psychiatric service. Twenty-one students are taking part in
 summer therapy sessions at DVMS and DDES.
- Our partnership with the Include Me program continued with another five students from DV Middle School Life Skills and Autistic Support, and Shohola Multiple Disabilities Support. The mission of Include Me is to provide on-site, intensive training and technical assistance to school districts, teachers, and families to increase the capacity to educate students with significant disabilities in general education classes.
- Step-By-Step continues to partner with us in the primary, elementary, and middle school Autistic Support classrooms. We have been approved to expand to the high school for the 2019–2020 school year.
- Technology continues to play a critical role for our students who require augmentative communication through the use of iPad apps. We have started to look into iPods, and in some cases iPhones, to facilitate communication for our older students. In addition, Chromebooks have enabled many other students to access their education in a motivating and meaningful way.
- Cheryl Nielsen, Educational Consultant and Kelly Adams, Autistic Support teacher conducted numerous professional development trainings for both teachers and instructional assistants. Mrs.
 Nielsen also planned and/or taught parent trainings throughout the school year on various subjects relating to special education.
- Our IU-contracted Social Worker provided individual and/or group counseling for 76 students in our Emotional Support programs.
- DV celebrated its 13th Annual Special Olympics on May 8th with over 400 athletes participating! Our Special Needs Resource Fair was held in conjunction with Special Olympics, providing information and resources for parents and staff.
- Speech Therapists took part in four webcasts this year as a part of their continuing professional development. Topics included Using the Shape Coding System to Teach Grammar to School-Aged Children with Language Disorders; Technology in Context: Aligning Speech-Language Interventions with Research-Based Methods; Embedding Grammar and Vocabulary Intervention in Science Curriculum; and When a Child Can't Touch a Touchscreen: A Look at Scanning.
- Of the 41 seniors who graduated this year, two will be attending a four-year college, eight are attending a two-year college, nine are attending a Technical School, seventeen are entering the workforce, and five are attending work programs with a local service provider job coach and participating in their communities.
- Twenty-three seniors and 22 underclassmen were found eligible for services through the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation. Students worked with the following agency providers: Community

Options, Community Vocational Services, Fitzmaurice Community Services, Human Resources Center, Inc., and Living Unlimited, Inc.

- The community continues to support our students in so many ways! Twenty-four students participated in Work Based Learning Experiences at Belle Reve Senior Living Center, Best Western Inn at Hunt's Landing, Big Z Stables, Bon Secours Community Hospital, Car Audio Files, County Administration Office, Dona Helene Hair and Nail Salon, Flagship Cinemas, Fort Knox Self Storage, GAIT, Hampton Inn, Home Depot, Milford Senior Care, Price Chopper, Ray's Auto, Safe Haven of Pike County, Inc., Shawnee Inn, Shohola Veterinary Hospital, TJ Maxx, and Tractor Supply Co.
- Community Job Trials for underclassmen took place at Action Bikes and Outdoor, Airport Park, Amica CrossFit, Balch's Fish Fry, Big Bear Resort, Breathless Beauty, Cliff Park, Creative Laser Creations, Delaware Run Associates, Drayer Physical Therapy, Flagship Cinemas, Fort Knox Storage, Hampton Inn, Haven 4 Heroes, Home Depot, Jeff's Garden Shop, Key Food, Laurel Grove Florist, Lowes, Luhr's True Value, Matamoras Borough Office, Matamoras Firehouse, Milford Senior Care and Rehabilitation Center, NAPA, Pike County Board of Elections, Pike County Finance Department, Pike County Humane Society, Pike County Prothonotary Office, Pocono Environmental Education Center, Port Jervis Humane Society, Price Chopper, Ray's Auto, Silver Birch Archery, Tamerlaine Farm Animal Sanctuary, The Grill, The Ship Shop, TJ Maxx, Tractor Supply Co, Trinity Pet, Tri-State Veterinary Medical Group, Wash on Wheels Cleaning Service.
- Transition Coordinator Laura Butler arranged for a number of college visits for students with
 disabilities who are seeking post-secondary education. Twelve students attended a field trip to
 Northampton Community College; nine students attended a field trip to Sussex Community
 College; eight students attended a field trip to Johnson College of Technology; and seven students
 attended a field trip to East Stroudsburg University. Students had the opportunity to meet with
 Admissions, Disability Services, and tour each of the campuses.
- Six Delaware Valley seniors participated in our first reverse job fair at the Best Western Inn at
 Hunts Landing. A reverse job fair is a career fair that flips the tables. The Delaware Valley students
 created presentation boards showcasing their resumes and pictures of themselves at various job
 sites. The employers had the opportunity to circulate among the tables and introduce themselves
 to the students seeking employment.
- The department continues to offer presentations and trainings for students, parents and staff as it relates to transition from high school to post-high school experiences.
 - Seniors, parents, and staff were invited to attend How to Access Accommodations at Post-Secondary School, presentation by Jill Ceasar Boyle, M.Ed., Coordinator of Office of Accessible Services Individualized for Students (OASIS) in October.
 - O In April, 8th grade students at Dingman Delaware Middle School and Delaware Valley Middle School had the opportunity to attend OVR Early Reach Presentation during 2nd or 4th periods. Students at the high school in 9th and 10th grade had the opportunity to attend the OVR Early Reach Presentation during 6th period. Early Reach is an outreach initiative intended to promote successful outcomes for youth with disabilities by increasing awareness of the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation services and the benefits of early career planning.

- Staff from self-contained classrooms were invited to a presentation on Career Readiness in April.
- Parents were invited to a Transition Overview presentation by Laura Butler, Transition Coordinator.
- Parents and Staff were invited to attend a presentation by Adele Bond from Goodwill Keystone in May to learn about work incentives planning for transition aged youth and an overview of Social Security benefits.
- The Pike County Workforce Development Agency and the Delaware Valley High School sponsored College/Career Night on May 1, 2019. Students and parents had the opportunity to gather information and talk to representatives from twenty-six colleges, technical schools, community colleges, and several branches of the military.

 Biological Field Station were among the many activities this year.
- Students in the upper elementary grades participated in the K'Nex competition through the IU.
 Students were challenged to create a crane that could pick up and move 3 objects to a different location.
- Some additional program-specific activities included constructing and flying kites, Launching water
 rockets, Building K'Nex roller coasters, writing short stories and animating them using zSpace,
 utilizing Breakout EDU to escape digital locks and Tinkercad to create and print 3D objects,
 learning about Hydroponics through a grant funded by the Pike County Conservation District where







Propelled by the generous support of our donors and philanthropic leaders, the DV Foundation, faculty and students impact society and lives every year.



Finally, the Foundation was successful in helping raise funds for the high school Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) team and Scholastic Bowl team. This money was used to travel to competitions and compete at the national level. The money, donations provided by local businesses and the Atlantic Philanthropies, will also be used to support the Model United Nations Club, the history department, and enhance technology within the high school.
