#### **FRESHMAN ORIENTATION**

On August 20<sup>th</sup> the Delaware Valley High School held another successful Freshman Orientation for all incoming 9<sup>th</sup> grade students and their families. The students were introduced to high school teachers, guidance counselors, secretaries and the administrative staff. Student leaders from various clubs and teams also spoke to the incoming freshmen about the extracurricular opportunities available in the high school. After the presentation in the auditorium, students tried out their lockers and walked around the building to learn their schedules. Lastly, they were treated to a pizza lunch in the 9/10 cafeteria.







#### **DVHS CONSTRUCTION**

Construction was nearing completion for the first day of school. Many students were delighted by the upgrades to their respective CTE programs, as well as a variety of other changes over the summer, including technology, manufacturing, architectural drawing, art, and multiple science rooms.









#### ADVANCED PLACEMENT

Delaware Valley High School once again had very positive Advanced Placement test results. We administered 959 total exams and 646 were passed (67%). The school had 134 total AP Scholars, including 10 National AP Scholars, the highest honor the College Board can give to a student and the most the high school has EVER achieved. In order to be a National AP Scholar, a student must score at least a 4 on all AP exams taken, and score a 4 or higher on eight or more exams.

#### **OPEN HOUSE**

The Delaware Valley High School hosted their annual Open House on September 3<sup>rd</sup>. The bell schedule was followed to allow teachers the opportunity to showcase each of their classes individually. Parents were able to see the newly renovated library, as well as meet multiple new staff members. The teachers used the technology present in their classrooms to showcase their various classes in creative ways.

#### **CLUB FAIR**

On September 6<sup>th</sup>, the 6<sup>th</sup> annual DVHS Club Fair was held in the Freshman Gymnasium. Club advisors and student leaders set up informational tables, provided handouts, and created an exciting atmosphere for recruitment. The goal of the fair is to inform the students of all of the club offerings at DVHS. There is truly a club for everyone! Over 40 clubs were represented during all three lunches.







#### **UNITED WAY OF CARING**

On September 7<sup>th</sup> the United Way of Pike County held its 19<sup>th</sup> Annual Day of Caring. Over 250 Delaware Valley High School students volunteered their time at numerous non-profit agencies in the Milford/Dingmans Ferry area. The day began with a delicious breakfast prepared by Mr. Justin Roselli and his cafeteria staff. The following sites participated in this year's Day of Caring: Akenac Park, Ann Street School, Camp Speers, Center for Developmental Disabilities, GAIT Therapeutic Riding Center, Green Trees Early Learning Center, Milford Borough, Pennsylvania Department of Transportation Adopt-a-Highway, Pike County Developmental Center, Pike County Public Library, Pocono Environmental Education Center, and Safe Haven. An extra debt of gratitude goes to the many teachers, secretaries, custodians, bus drivers, and other staff members who helped to make this year's Day of Caring such a success.







#### FIFTH ANNUAL WOMEN IN STEM SYMPOSIUM

On September 17, DVSD took over forty girls (8th grade to 12th grade students) to the 5<sup>th</sup> Annual Women in STEM Symposium at Woodloch Pines Resorts in Hawley, PA (27 of the students were high school girls!). The symposium allowed DV students to connect with representatives from local colleges and companies to promote higher educational opportunities for girls in STEM fields. Student participants were able to meet with and listen to women that work in fields ranging from engineering to biomedical, as well as digital electronics and environmental professions. Students did not only get to speak with the female professionals, but they were able to visit over 10 stations that each had a specific hands-on component. Some hands-on activities included programming robots, 3D printing, veterinary medicine, solar panels, physics, etc.



#### **SCHOLASTIC BOWL**

On October 26, the DV Scholastic Bowl team of Darius Bermudez, JD Flick, Lucas Helms, and Aodhan Young competed in our own Tri-State Tussle Quiz Bowl event, qualifying for two Nationals tournaments! In addition to their excellent placement in a very strong field with teams from PA, NY, NJ, and Delaware, DV had four of the top 16 individual scorers.



#### **PEP RALLY**

On September 20, WBRE Eye Witness News traveled to Delaware Valley High School to film Friday Morning Pep Rallies. Over 500 students arrived at the high school at 4:45 AM and filming finished by 7:00. Numerous students were featured on both live and recorded broadcasts throughout the day, including senior Josh Balcarcel who broadcasted one of the segments with reporter Anja Whitehead. Students were then treated to a breakfast prepared by our Culinary students before beginning their school day.



#### **HOMECOMING**

The 2019 Homecoming Court was comprised of five males and five females selected through a school wide vote that took place on September 18<sup>th</sup>. In the crowning ceremony, held during halftime of the Homecoming Football Game on September 21, Joshua Balcarcel was named Homecoming King, and Clorinda Petrillo was named Homecoming Queen. The 2019 Homecoming Dance was held on September 21, immediately following Warrior Festival and the Homecoming Football Game. The Homecoming Dance, which serves as the culminating event to Spirit Week activities, hosted 585 DV students from grades nine through twelve and offered three hours of entertainment, refreshments, and dancing.



#### **SECOND ANNUAL COLLEGE FAIR**

On September 26<sup>th</sup> the Delaware Valley High School hosted our second annual College Fair for all 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> grade students. The fair grew from 37 colleges and universities last year to 46 this year. Students were assigned a time to come to the gymnasium and visit with recruiters each of the colleges and universities.





#### RACHEL'S CHALLENGE CLUB

The Rachel's Challenge club sponsored "Start With Hello" week from September 23-27. Students wore name tags on Tuesday and were encouraged to start a conversation with someone they didn't know. On Wednesday, students were encouraged to buy an ice pop to share with someone they didn't know. On Thursday, students wore tie-dye to support peace and kindness.



#### **US BAND COMPETITION**

The marching band had two U.S. Bands competitions in the month of October, 2019. The first competition was at Met-Life stadium in East Rutherford NJ. The day consisted of around 40 bands who played throughout the day. The marching band scored a 73 and placed 8th overall and 4th in music in our respective class. The band also competed in a U.S. Bands regional competition last Saturday in Westchester PA. The marching warriors placed first in our class winning all individual caption awards. The marching band scored an 85, which is the highest score we've received in our three years competing.







### <u>SAT</u>

On October 5 Delaware Valley High School administered the SAT to 162 students. On October 16 Delaware Valley administered the annual PSAT's (Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test) to 610 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> graders. Students received their results of the SAT in mid-October through their college board account. PSAT results should be sent to the School in Mid-December and will be sent home with the students.

## Safe2Say

On October 10, all DVHS students received refresher training on how to use the Safe2Say Something tip reporting system. Accessible through a website or mobile app, students and parents have the ability to submit student safety concerns securely and anonymously. Some of the most common tips involve issues of self-harm, harassment, drug/alcohol use, and bullying. The Safe2Say Crisis Center communicates the tips with the school; depending on the issue, school officials work with local law enforcement, guidance counselors, mental health providers, and parents to investigate and intervene.



#### **RHO KAPPA**

On October 21, the DVHS chapter of Rho Kappa, the National Social Studies Honor Society had its 2<sup>nd</sup> annual induction ceremony. 15 juniors and seniors were inducted. Requirements for consideration are 3 credits of social studies classes, an AP exam score of 3 or better, a 3.5 or better unweighted GPA in social studies classes and a weighted overall GPA of 3.5 or better.

Nick Troiano, a DV Class of 2007 graduate was inducted as the chapter's first honorary member. Mr. Troiano is involved in the third party movement in national politics after graduating from Georgetown.







#### **SCHOOL SPIRIT**

During the week of October 21-25, Delaware Valley High School students and staff showed their school spirit by wearing colors to support various causes. Wednesday was wear orange day to protest violence and support Unity Day. Thursday SASA/TATU distributed pencils to students, reminding them to make good decisions. Friday was a pink out in school and at the football game for breast cancer awareness. Thank you to all the clubs and advisors for publicizing and participating in these events.



## **SHAKESPEARE**

The National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) in partnership with Arts Midwest presented Shakespeare in American Communities on October 28. The Pennsylvania Shakespeare Festival is one of 40 professional theater companies selected to participate in bringing the finest productions of Shakespearean theater to high schools across the country. Delaware Valley High School invited members of the Linny Fowler WillPower Tour (PSF) to share Shakespeare's *Macbeth* with our high school seniors and summer readers in an effort to bring the richness and complexity of Shakespeare's characters and the power of his language to our students. It was an experience that broadened their horizons and fed their creative spirits.



#### **NINTENDO SWITCH**

Junior Class officers set up a Nintendo Switch gaming tournament as a fundraiser on October 29. Officers and their advisor put on the tournament as a way to include students from different social circles who may not be part of clubs or sports. Students played 4 different games to show skills across different gaming disciplines and were separated into 4 groups. The winner of each group advanced to a final in the Learning Commons to play a surprise game. In the finals the winner was Vincent Trezza, second place Bryce Escallier and third Ryan Shearer.





#### **NATIONAL ART HONOR SOCIETY**

On October 28, Delaware Valley High School held its third annual National Art Honor Society Induction ceremony. The ceremony, officiated by Dr. Lantz, Chapter Advisor and Mr. Lou DeLauro, Vice Principal, inducted twenty-five members. The National Art Honor Society supports more than 58,000 members, aiming to inspire, recognize, and honor those students who have shown an outstanding ability and dedication to the arts. As part of the society, students receive several opportunities to help them in their artistic journeys and to cultivate the continuation of the arts. The past two years the members have helped to spread the importance of the arts throughout our Milford community and our Delaware Valley District schools with various volunteer art projects.

#### **CAREER CAFE**

The first Career Café of 2019 was held on October 29. Students signed up to have lunch with an Occupational Therapist so that they could learn more about the field and ask any other questions that they have regarding this career path.

#### **VETERANS DAY DINNER**

The Junior Historians were proud to serve around 75 veterans and their families at this year's annual Veteran's Day dinner on November 7<sup>th</sup> at DVHS. The evening opened with four uniformed Eagle Scouts presenting the flag and leading our guests in the Pledge of Allegiance. Our honored guests and their families were treated to dinner provided by

John's of Arthur Avenue. Members of the DV Jazz band provided constant entertainment. This dinner is a small token to show our appreciation to those brave individuals who served our country. This event would not be possible without the help of all of the students and faculty who volunteered their time to honor our veterans.





#### **UFC STAR CHARLIE BRENNEMAN**

On November 14, former collegiate wrestler and UFC star Charlie Brenneman came to DVHS to speak to our students. He communicated to the students how important perseverance and grit are in all aspects of life. His message of always getting up when life gets you down resonated well with our students.



#### **FINANCIAL AID**

Students and their parents were invited to Financial Aid Night held in the HS Auditorium on November 19. A representative from PHEAA provided information on what exactly financial aid is, different types of financial aid, how to apply, aid sources available as well as tips for making smart decisions. The slideshow presentation was made available on the Guidance Department website after the presentation was given.

#### **COMBO ENGLISH/SOCIAL STUDIES DEBATES**

The Combo English/Social Studies program hosted their annual debates on November 21 and 22. The topics the students debated were facial recognition software, pay to play in the NCAA and Brexit. After the debates, the program gave individual awards out to students at a breakfast.

#### PARENT TEACHER CONFERENCES

Parent Teacher Conferences were help on November 26. There were 439 requests for conferences submitted by students, for a total of 1879 individual conferences.

#### **SCHOLASTIC BOWL**

Over the Veterans Day holiday weekend, 2019, the Delaware Valley Scholastic Bowl team competed at a large Quiz Bowl tournament in Ithaca, NY, with our A team taking the third place trophy in the entire tournament and finishing behind only two teams from Michigan. Darius Bermudez, JD Flick, Lucas Helms and Aodhan Young re-qualified for Nationals. Our B team of Adam Kanterman, Mikayla Courtright, Alexis King, and Janice Healey also fared well, going 6-3 on the day and finishing in eighth place. #### STUDENT COUNCIL THANKSGIVING FOOD DRIVE

The competition consisted of four different events that tested their science knowledge. Both teams represented DV well and came in the top third overall. The team consisting of Kaleigh, Laura and Abby came in first place in the pre-made engineering event. They were able to build a trebuchet that launched the furthest out of all the teams. The team consisting of Alice, Kenzie and Hannah came in third place for the mystery architecture event, where they had to use their critical thinking and problem solving skills to calculate and determine the mass of given objects. #### **EMPTY BOWLS**

#### **DV MOCK TRIAL TEAM**

The DV Mock Trial team entered into the Monroe County Bar Association 2019 Mock Trial Invitational Tournament at East Stroudsburg South High School. Delaware Valley High School fielded two teams for this tournament. Sophomore Paul Guagdagni was named as the tournament's 3<sup>rd</sup>-best attorney.



#### **DVHS ENGINEERING CLUB**

Stevie Hamilton and Samantha Pellet of the DV High School Engineering Club were selected as Regional Finalists in the PennDOT Innovations Challenge. The challenge involved the following scenario: Aside from laws, programs and educational campaigns, what cost-effective, innovative solution can be developed in the next five to 10 years to help PennDOT more efficiently, effectively and safely control litter along roadways? Stevie and Samantha described an innovative litter-collecting drone system in their proposal. The next step is to present their idea at the PennDOT office in Dunmore, PA. If successful at the regional level, they will move on to the state competition.

#### THE SCHOLASTIC ART & WRITING AWARDS

The Scholastic Art & Writing Awards are the nation's longest-running and most prestigious recognition program for creative teens in grades 7–12. Delaware Valley High School Students competed with almost 1,000 works of art in our region. Ten of our students received honorable mention awards and nine students were awarded silver key medals. The following students earned gold key awards: Melody Bookey, Erika Cutaia, Julia Ficken. Olivia Gandolfo, Kathryn Johannessen, Alexis King, Ayanna Koczot, Kaitlyn Nagrowski, Abigail Reno and Jarrett Palmadessa. The gold key winners will have their work displayed at the Everhart Museum in Scranton from February 13th-March 9th. Gold key winners also advance to national judging.



#### **GRAPHIC DESIGN CLASS**

Students in graphic design class created public service announcement posters for Prevent Suicide PA's annual poster design contest in conjunction with Suicide Prevention Awareness Month. Dena Salotti's poster was entered to represent Delaware Valley. Her poster was chosen as one of only five state finalists.



#### **DVHS MUSIC**

DVHS musicians continue to be active through the month of January as our Concert Band began the month with their make-up concert that was snowed out in December. Both PMEA District 10 Chorus and Orchestra festivals occurred. Three students attended the District Chorus Festival at Boyertown Area Senior High School where they rehearsed and performed under the direction of Dr. Peggy Dettwiler of Mansfield University. While there each student auditioned for Region Chorus, 1 of whom successfully earned a spot in that ensemble.

Similarly, 2 of our Orchestra students participated in the District Orchestra festival at Wilson (West Lawn) Senior High School under the direction of Allen Scott, of the Helena Symphony Orchestra and the Southeastern PA Symphony



#### **SKILLS USA**

We had a successful Skills USA regional competition this year. Grace Gandolfo took first in Job Demonstration, where she gave a demonstration on safety and sanitation. Chris Tants took first in Commercial Baking by making a beautiful fruit tart. Both students will be competing at states in Hershey. We had 3 other students medal. Zachery Quill took second in Motorcycle Service Technology. Mathew Budd got third in Power Equipment Technology and Anton Scheuermann got third in Residential Wiring.

#### **FBLA**

The Delaware Valley FBLA members recently competed in their Region 22 Conference at the University of Scranton. Thirty-three students qualified to attend the FBLA State Competition in Hershey, in April. Eleven students received first place in their events and the Community Service and Partnership with a Business Projects state-only events also qualified for the conference. Kaleigh Kuddar was elected Region 22 President and Olivia O'Grady was elected Region 22 Vice-President at Large for the 2020-2021 school year.

#### **ROTARY ESSAY CONTEST**

The three winners of the annual Rotary Essay Contest are: Jennifer Lee in 3<sup>rd</sup> place, Zane Pick in 2<sup>nd</sup>, and Kaila Dunn won 1<sup>st</sup> place.

#### STUDENT VOLUNTEERS CAMP SPEERS

On February 1<sup>st</sup> DVHS Students volunteered their time at Camp Speers' annual Winter Carnival. Students from various clubs and organizations, including the National Honor Society and National Art Honor Society, helped the camp with event setup/breakdown, face painting, parking, guest services, and other activities. This event was a continuation of a new partnership between DVHS and Camp Speers that began at the annual United Way Day of Caring in September.

#### **DVHS COMMUNITY SERVICE**

On February 3<sup>rd</sup>, DVHS students and staff cleaned a stretch of the three lane from Taco Bell to Burn the Ships CrossFit as part of Penn Dot's Adopt-a-Highway program. This was the second cleanup of the year with more planned for the spring.

#### **ASVAB**

On February 4<sup>th</sup>, 26 students in grades 10-12 were administered the ASVAB. The Armed Forces Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) is a series of tests developed by the Department of Defense and is used by the U.S. Army to determine whether you have the mental aptitude to enlist. The ASVAB also helps determine which Military Occupational Specialties (MOS) the student qualifies for. Delaware Valley High School offers the ASVAB once every year to all 10<sup>th</sup>, 11<sup>th</sup>, and 12<sup>th</sup> grade students. The ASVAB Scores are received and interpreted to the students by School Counselor Mrs. Keisling and representatives from each Military branch.

#### CTE TOUR

On February 7<sup>th</sup> and February 11<sup>th</sup>, the Career and Technical Education department hosted our annual freshmen CTE tour. Every 9<sup>th</sup> grade student selected one program to spend an entire period in. The students were engaged in a hands on activity in order to better understand what a CTE classroom looks like and how each course can prepare you for a possible career in that field. This event is scheduled in such a way so that students have a better understanding of our CTE program before they head into individual scheduling.

#### **CTE RECOGNITION**

The Delaware Valley High School CTE department was recognized at the annual PACTA Winter Symposium for their outstanding performance on the NOCTI last year. Delaware Valley was one of eight schools in the state to have at least 75% of students achieve a score of Advanced on both the written and practical portions of their respective NOCTI exams.

#### **GORDMANS OPENING & GENEROUS DONATION**

The librarian talks to the students about the different genres that are available in the library. The librarian also reads stories to the children. The librarian shows students the card catalog, computers and the area where parents can read a newspaper or a magazine. Field trips to the Delaware Township Library is a great opportunity for our students to learn of the wonderful resource available in our community.

DDPS Student Lighthouse Team creates Kindness Challenges during the school year. Students share the importance of kindness and how good it makes people feel. Discussion of random acts of kindness and what that means, saying Good Morning and Hello to our friends as well as smiling at new students we may not know. The students designed a "Kindness Matters" banner that hangs outside the school gym.

Many donations are collected to teach students the appreciation of giving and helping others. **Kindness** is demonstrated with students and families donating hats, mittens, scarves, coats and toys. DDPS is able to help organizations such as **Toys for Tots, Leukemia, Pennies for Patients, Heart Association, and Safe Haven**. Also, the staff has the opportunity to play "Santa" and help make miracles happen for our own DDPS families. Staff members honored wishes from families' "wish lists" for Christmas. During the school year, **Student Leadership Council** raised money for **Autism Awareness** to support our very own Dingman - Delaware families by selling Autism Awareness bracelets.

Second grade students practice creative writing topic about random acts of kindness efforts. Students write on the topic, "If I had one thousand dollars to give away, I would..." Students select a charity or an organization to donate money, Red Cross, orphanages, animal shelters, homeless shelters, storm recovery, terminally ill children, are a few examples. Students research the charity and learn how donations would help make a difference. Students also express their feelings from donating to such organizations. Afterwards, students' writings displayed on the, "We Care" board for the school to enjoy. Our young students are full of great kindness.







DDPS uses a **multi-sensory approach to teaching reading** school wide in classrooms, **Orton Gillingham** based. Multi-sensory teaching and learning. Teachers are busy reinforcing literacy skills with different multi-sensory activities. Students make tremendous reading progress...and have a lot of fun learning, too!









DDPS uses touch-screen Chromebooks and iPads to enhance learning! Students love using Chromebooks and teachers like how user friendly Chromebooks are. The students enjoy all of the different modalities of learning, especially on Chromebooks.

DDPS has a FAB Lab, student named, which is their **Innovation lab**. Students love to spend time in the lab, creating, building, designing, and exploring. Classes complete science experiments in the FAB Lab and afterwards, students write/draw in **science journals**. Some classes incorporate **STEAM** bins into their classrooms for early finishers and/or have STEAM bins as math stations. Great **learning happens at DDPS**!











DDPS invites DDMS and DDES to "Read Across the Parking Lot." Classes from DDMS and DDES volunteered to buddy up with DDPS and share stories. All Primary classrooms receive a buddy class and share stories. First grade classes met with Third grade classes and Second grade classes buddied with seventh grade classes to share their love of reading. Each student read their favorite book to their reading partners. It was a well-planned experience for all students.







The Dingman Delaware Primary School provides students a **fun summer reading program**. During the spring parent workshop, the reading department discusses the importance of summer reading, and how to prevent the "summer reading slide." Each student is given **a reading passport** so that they could embark on a **summer reading adventure**. They also receive **free books and travel games**. Students are encouraged to read at least fifteen minutes a day and complete a reading passport with reading stamps. In the fall, completed passports are returned to school, so that students could receive a certificate, a coupon for a McDonalds' Happy Meal, and the chance to win an iPad. Students are excited to share passports with teachers and looking forward to using McDonalds' Happy Meal certificate.



**DDPS Reading Team hosts parent/student events to encourage and support reading.** The purpose of the events is to inform and teach parents how to support students at home with reading. Parents and students have the opportunity to win prizes for attending.





Each year, **Incoming Kindergarten parents** receive a make and take workshop during Kindergarten registration. After the parents accompanied their child on a school bus ride, parents are invited to attend a "**Make and Take**" called "**Getting Your Child Prepared for Kindergarten.**" In the past, parents looked over K curriculum in the library while their child completed a screening by the Kindergarten team. This idea was put into action after discussions between the kindergarten teachers and the reading specialists during PLC's. Over one hundred parents completed surveys and all agreed that the workshop was fun as well as informative and beneficial. The reading team prepared a power point that discussed the following topics and parents were given materials to use and support their child:

- **Fine Motor Skills**: Parents were given pencils, crayons, and scissors so that their child could practice the correct pencil grip and their cutting skills. Parents were also encouraged to have their children practice opening snacks and lunch items and zipping their coats and backpacks. Parents agreed that the summer is a great time to work on these skills to help their children become more independent.
- <u>Handwriting</u>: For handwriting practice, parents were given a write and wipe marker and laminated *Fundations* handwriting paper, and a packet showing correct letter formation using the *Fundations* letter approach. Our incoming Kindergarten parents were happy to receive information about how to help their children with their handwriting.
- <u>Communication</u>: The importance of having students understand that it is safe to talk to grown-ups wearing badges in school and ask them for help was discussed. It is also important that students coming to Kindergarten know both their first and last name as well as their given names. (Example: Given name William but called Billy). This is important so that during the hustle and bustle of the first few weeks of school teachers can help the students find their homerooms and school buses.
- <u>Beginning of Year Assessments</u>: Beginning of the Year DIBELS assessments which include Letter Naming Fluency and First Sound Fluency were explained along with benchmark goals. The purpose of these early literacy skills was also explained and parents were provided with fun ways to expose their children to these skills.
- Academics: "Getting Your Child Prepared for Kindergarten" would not be complete without discussing academics. Multi-sensory learning was discussed and our "Make and Take" provided numerous activities that incorporate the use of all our senses such as: sound and word games, writing paint bags, letter pool noodles, clothes pin uppercase and lowercase letters, and name puzzle pieces.

The survey results are overwhelmingly positive. Below are parent testimonials:

- "Thank you for the materials and the time you spent putting everything together! My daughter will love them."
- "Everything you have included this year is wonderful! Great improvement!"
- "Everything was great. Very helpful. Great to already have items to practice."
- "I'm really happy that we received the packet that explains how to tell your child how to write the letters so we can match the way the teachers teach them."

- "Video clip of correct letter sounds, without the vowel sounds at the end of the sound was very informative."

DDPS celebrates Dr. Seuss and Read Across America during the month of March. Every Friday has a theme based on a different Dr. Seuss book. The reading team records readings of Dr. Seuss books that go with the theme. DDTV broadcasts stories in the classrooms. Students participated in a reading challenge called **Hats Off to Reading**. After completing 10 or more activities from the reading challenge, a Dr. Seuss hat with the child's name was placed outside their classroom. Students who partook in the challenge received a certificate and a bracelet. The classroom from each grade level that had the most hats got to participate in a special surprise activity with Ms. Butaitis at the end of the month.

DDPS had an annual Storybook Character Parade. Students loved to dress like their favorite book character, carried the book featuring their character, and parade through the school. The students were thrilled to dress up and see their friends and teachers dressed up, too. It was a blast for all kids and the big kids at heart! We have wonderful memories from this most loved event!

**Flat Stanley Adventures!** The students read the story <u>Flat Stanley</u> in second grade classes. The students write letters summarizing the book. The teachers ask their students to send Stanley cutouts and letters to relatives or friends, who would then take Stanley on a journey and detail the characters' exploits in a letter back. Kids also request to send pictures as well as postcards of Stanley's journey. The students anxiously await to hear back about Stanley's adventures. Classes also map Stanley's adventures in the second grade hallway.



**Read to the Principal!** Each month, first grade students show off their reading progress with the principal. A day is set aside for the students to come to the principal's office. Students bring their favorite book to share with Principal Butaitis. Ms. B. brags over the first graders accomplishments. Afterwards, students are recognized with a photo by the librarian which is later displayed on the school news for the whole school to see, and a certificate.

**Veterans Celebrations** Veterans' Day is acknowledged and celebrated at DDPS. Our PTA hosts a Veterans' Day assembly. US Veterans from the community were invited to the school for cookies and cheers from our students. Students sing songs, read poems, give letters of appreciation and say "Thank you for your service." Afterwards there is time for photos with families.







DDPS enjoys an **Annual Hallway Holiday Sing Along** hosted and organized by Mrs. Caldwell, our reading specialist, and Mr. Burns, our music teacher. Students and staff gather in the center hallway to sing a variety of favorite holiday tunes!















Leader in Me Teachers, staff and students continue to receive training in Stephen Covey's Seven Habits. Roles throughout the school changed to have students have more leadership opportunities. Banners and Mission Statements are developed and displayed around the building. Student Lighthouse team was formed and students direct the morning news program helping younger friends recite the Pledge of Allegiance, greet students at the doors, facilitate morning announcements and model good citizenship. Student Lighthouse team members also demonstrate leadership around the school through the Leader in Me lessons. They create leadership bulletin boards such as, "The Key to being a Good Leader," which displays quotes and inspirational words about leadership for all students to see. Annual Leadership Days occur where parents and community members along with the school board members are invited into our school to view leaders in action! Our young leaders demonstrate amazing leadership talent!

The Student Lighthouse team gave a Leader in Me presentation at the DDPS PTA to an attentive crowd full of parents. Some of the students talked about their favorite habit from the Seven Habits of Healthy Kids and how they practice the habit in school and at home. Other students shared the different ways that Leader in Me has impacted our school. For example, one student said the quotes around the school are inspiring. They also talked about the ownership shared in different leadership roles such as being morning greeters and organizing and creating our daily announcements. Following the presentation, two short video were shared. The first video highlighted the changes and impacts that Leader in Me has had on the Dingman Delaware Primary School while the other showcased students embracing the seven habits through music.

Students of the Lighthouse Team have an extra role as members of the **Superintendent's Student Council**. Dr. Bell meets informally with the kids to talk about school, how the year is going and how to make it even better. The primary goal is to help keep Dr. Bell connected to kids and to give kids a voice in the district. Our young students share the amazing projects they do at the Primary school such as food drives, pet food drives, coat drives, Pennies for Patients, Veterans Day, Celebrations, Jump Rope for American Heart, Autism Awareness Chores Fundraisers and Bullying Prevention activities. Dr. Bell is impressed with all their greatness! Afterwards, the students enjoy breakfast with Dr. Bell.



Leader in Me Facilitators, Jessica Palumbo, Kris Zamborsky and Natalie McCann, attended a Leader in Me Coaching Day in Easton, Pennsylvania. This training discussed the role of the Lighthouse Facilitator. The beginning part of the program centers around the importance of modeling and creditability. Habit 1, "Be Proactive" was discussed in depth and an individual action plan was developed by each participant. Participants have from now until the Spring Coaching Day to work on achieving their individual action plans.

DDPS gifted class travels to exciting places with Mr. Lehman. The **field trips** reflect the learning which occurs during GT class lessons. From the **Scranton Aquarium** to the **Lakota Wolf Preserve** in Columbia, NJ, student extend their learning on each adventure.

At the Electric City Aquarium and Reptile Den in Scranton, PA, the class was able to see up-close a variety of fish, sharks, stingrays, an octopus, and other sea creatures. Students reach into a stingray tank and touch the rays as they swim by. The education center shows all about animal adaptations and how animals avoid predators, find food, and survive in harsh climates. Students are even encouraged to pet an alligator!

At the Lakota Wolf Preserve in Columbia, NJ, the students are able to see a variety of wolves in a natural habitat. Jim, the wolf-master, provides an in depth lecture on wolves and wolf behavior. The preserve also has a population of bobcats and foxes. The Pocono Environmental Learning Center (PEEC) in Dingmans Ferry allowed students the opportunity to see the EcoZone Exploration & Discovery Room. Sheri Bone gives the kids a guided tour of a beaver lodge, a bat cave, an eagle's nest, and a fossil pit. Afterward, the kids have a picnic lunch and go hiking and fishing.

Hands-on science experiments are always a favorite!

DDPS celebrates **Random Acts of Kindness (RAK)** during the month of February. The purpose is to highlight the importance of treating one another with respect each and every day. All students listen to the story *Have You Filled a Bucket Today? A Guide to Daily Happiness for Kids* by Carol McCloud, in guidance or library class. Students participate in activities that allow them to identify ways they can show kindness to others within school, home, and the community.











The Student lighthouse team visits all kindergarten classrooms to talk about kindness and reads stories. Students read the story Fill my Bucket and share their version of the "Emotional Bank Account" theory from 7 Habits. Random Acts of Kindness Spirit Week is held, each day has a different theme about being kind such as: Powered by Kindness, Let Kindness Shine, Team Kindness Day, Words that Hurt Can't Be Taken Back.

Several opportunities for kindness were demonstrated throughout the year:

- Every year the Dingman Delaware Primary School takes part in a Christmas Wish gift giving tree. The Staff and Faculty sign up to buy gifts for students and family members in the community. This year a total of 54 gifts were bought for Dingman's families. The families are always so appreciative.
- DDPS Student Leadership team presents a check to the American Leukemia
   Association each year. The DDPS student lighthouse team together with Mrs. Schuster
   and Mrs. Fells initiated a "Change for Leukemia" fundraiser, which raises money for the
   Leukemia and Lymphoma Society for Children. The whole school participates by bringing
   in different coins each day and dressing according to that day's theme.

**PTA sponsors several whole school assemblies**—Sedecky Puppets for Bully Preventions, Magicians, Science Tellers, YO-JO, and many, many, more. These assemblies help to enhance the curriculum and engage our young learners.









**DDPS PTA** does many things for our school. PTA has purchased two Buddy Benches for our playground. One of our second grade alumni students, Nick Keller, was instrumental in getting Buddy Benches for our school. Nick's name is engraved on the benches. The original bench was created by a second grade student as a cure for loneliness. The idea behind the bench is to allow students who may not have someone to play with at recess to sit on the bench and find a friend.







**Community Connections!** Smokey Bear and Forester Bill Delling visited first grade classrooms to discuss forest fire safety. Students learned what they should do while camping to ensure fires do not spread from bonfire pits to the surrounding forests. Students also were excited to learn what forest firefighters do to help stop the spread of wildfires and how airplanes also aide in putting out wildfires. It was a great presentation by Smokey and Forester Bill.



**DDPS uses DVSD role models** from DVHS, DDMS, and DDES often. DDMS and DDES inspire DDPS students. The band and chorus students inspire DDPS students with a music and introduction to strings. Musicians play a variety of music for DDPS students and interact with students, promoting musical talent. A big thanks to the musicians.



#### DINGMAN DELAWARE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

#### MR. VITO QUAGLIA, PRINCIPAL

 New Student Orientation was held on August 14. Our new students were provided an overview of our policies and procedures. Staff took parents and students on a tour of our building. We opened our doors on August 26, the first day of school, with 494 students. We had an outstanding opening week of school.



- Students were assessed during the first 2 weeks of school for both reading and math abilities. Grades 3-5 used DRC's Computer Diagnostic Test to help in identifying areas of strengths and weaknesses. Along with Star Reading, DIBELS and PSSA data will help determine reading and math programs throughout the building.
- PTA provided a **yogurt bar** for our faculty/staff on August 30, and announced a plan for a Back to School BBQ for our students, after school, on September 13.
- Open House was held on September 4, and was well attended by many families. Two
  sessions were held, each lasting one half hour, so that parents could visit more than
  one teacher. Parent comments were positive as to the beginning of the new school
  year. PTA held their first meeting that evening as well.
- Carnegie Science Assembly took place on September 5. In the morning, students attended the Wild By Design assembly. Then, in the afternoon, they rotated through stations where key concepts were reinforced with hands-on activities.

• PTA provided a **Back to School BBQ** for our students, after school, on September 13. Faculty, staff and over 200 hundred students attended.



- Annual Book Fair was held from September 24<sup>th</sup> through the 26<sup>th</sup>.
- On October 2 and 3, the 5<sup>th</sup> grade students went on a **field trip to Harrisburg**. The students visited the Capitol building and also went to the state museum.
- On Oct. 4, we had the first Elementary Schools Night at the home football game against Abington Heights. To promote the event, players and cheerleaders visited DDES and even participated in the morning news broadcast. All elementary students who attended the game were recognized. It was a great night for Warrior Nation to come together as a school community and build more DV Pride! We plan to make this an annual event.



• This year's Veteran's Day breakfast and assembly was held November 8<sup>th</sup>. Student council along with our veteran buddies' club organized the day. PTA provided a wonderful home cooked breakfast for over 150 people, hallways were decorated and the assembly was once again outstanding! The assembly highlighted the musical talents for our DDES students. Children's choir and 5<sup>th</sup> grade chorus sang patriotic songs. Several of our band and orchestra students performed solo pieces in honor of our veteran's. Each branch of our nation's military were honored in song.





• The "Veteran Buddies" club was very active again this past year. The Veterans Day breakfast and assembly was a huge success again. The Buddies decorated the school with posters and signs recognizing our military veterans. There were more than one hundred veterans and their families in attendance, and they all enjoyed the PTA breakfast as well as the assembly. Veteran Buddies greeted the guests, gave them personalized name tags, and escorted them to the breakfast. During the breakfast the Veteran Buddies took time to speak with the guests and ask them questions about their military experience. At the assembly that followed, they helped the guests to their seats and gave them all flags and pins to honor their service to the country.

Also, the Veteran Buddies had their own table set up at the Leader in Me Family Night. They spoke with the families that attended and solicited donations for the veterans at the Gino J. Merli. They were able to collect many donations of needed items as well as money for the residents of the veterans' home in Scranton.



- **Parent Conferences** were held on November 26<sup>th</sup>. Parent response was positive and with 370/495 of DDES students were represented.
- DDES Student Council held the annual food drive for the local food pantries. They
  collected over 1200 nonperishable food items.
- The Pennsylvania Farm Bureau's Mobile Agricultural Lab visited DDES. Students
  had the opportunity to perform hands-on lab experiments from curriculum choices
  aligned with the state standards for Science & Technology and Environment & Ecology.

Bundled up in holiday colors, the Dingman-Delaware Children's Choir, led by Brian Krauss, performed classic Christmas and holiday songs Saturday at the Milford Borough Tree Lighting.

- 4th grade had another successful around the world culture day where the students rotated all day learning in each classroom about a different culture and ways people around the world celebrate different holidays or traditions in the winter. Each teacher taught their own lesson in a variety of ways, through art, music, and reading. Students created crafts, sang songs and learned about many different world traditions.
- Teachers had their students try "an hour of coding". Using the website called code.org; It has tutorials on how to write lines of code that have been created for students. The website promotes a campaign every year called "An Hour of Code". They encourage schools to dedicate one hour to learning code during a specific week in December.



- The week of December 16-20 was Holiday Spirit Week. Each day had a specific theme: Holiday Dress Up, Ugly Sweater Day, Mismatch Holiday Outfit, etc.
- The **annual Holly Day craft fair** was held on December 7th. The PTA has done a great job of reaching out to the community to get them involved in our school events. This year there were several new "entertainment" events as well. A great time was had by all.
- DDES continued our "NBA" challenge. Students are encouraged to NEVER BE ABSENT. Each marking period students will earn a spot on the basketball court. Students names will be entered into a quarterly and end of year raffle. The more quarters that they are "NBA" the more chances they have to win.

 All supplies and materials in our FOSS science kits were organized and inventoried to be utilized in the Innovation Lab. We utilize our lab to create more hands-on opportunities for students to complete science experiments and also engage in additional STEM activities.










On January 23th & 24th a committee of teachers from our elementary and middle schools attended at training at LIU 18. This training is in conjunction with a PAsmart Targeted Grant we have been awarded. The grant's purpose is to accelerate learning and professional development in computer science. The committee will complete six days of in-person professional learning as well as twelve hours of embedded online learning in which they will engage in computer science concepts, experience instructional practices, and explore strategies for engaging stakeholders.

DDES Ski Club has been active. We've made three trips to Big Bear Masthope Ski
Resort in January. Our students' skill levels range from expert to beginner. It's been a
great experience watching these students experience the terrific opportunity. We have 3
trips left, and the students are having a blast with Ms. Cooke and Mrs. Keller.



- Officer Kat Petti provided DARE instruction at DDES. She has coordinated a schedule with the teachers to accommodate her rotating through all the 5<sup>th</sup> grade classrooms.
- DDES commemorated the 100<sup>th</sup> Day of School on February 7, with many students and staff dressing as if they were 100 years old.



- DDES had our annual Leader In Me Family Night on February 10. It was well attended and the students had an awesome time presenting for their families.
- The Bridge Building Club held an assembly for all of 5<sup>th</sup> grade on February 21, where they tested and calculated the strengths of their constructed bridges utilizing various weights. This club also met after school and involved sixteen students who researched, designed and built popsicle stick bridges for a competitive event. Each team of four students attempted to build an efficient weight-bearing bridge that was also the lightest. Teams built practice bridges, made improvements/refinements based on testing, and competed in a final competition in a 5th grade assembly. The winning bridge supported 97 pounds, and the winning (top 2 teams) were scheduled to visit the Franklin Institute in Philadelphia, but this trip was cancelled due to the school closure.
- The **DDES PTA sponsored a dance** on February 21. It was very well attended and the students and their accompanying VIPs had a fun night.
- Dr. Bell met the DDES Student Cabinet on February 27<sup>th</sup>. The students took advantage
  of their opportunity to ask questions of Dr. Bell, and also to give him ideas for new
  programs at DDES.
- Global Studies Club approximately a dozen DDES students participated. We met after school and investigated different cultures from around the world, celebrated important days/holidays from various cultures, investigated daily life in other countries, disparity in resources and possible solutions, and met virtually with a current Peace Corps volunteer in Ecuador to learn about the Peace Corps program and her experiences there. The club had planned a school-wide fundraiser to benefit the Lerala Junior Secondary School in Lerala, Botswana in March, but due to the school closure, the fundraiser was cancelled.

## **Delaware Valley Elementary School**

 DVES had a Magic Tree House theme, organized and led by the Special Area teachers! The teachers created a treehouse in the hallway between the Art room and the Library. Classrooms were challenged to "Read Around the World" with the Magic Tree House series. Students completed activities at home and school that correlated with the stories.



• The DVES 2019 **Summer Reading Incentive** was called the "Camp Read-A-Lot Challenge." Students were asked to read at least 6 books that fit into various categories of their choice during the summer months. Some of these choices included a book that makes them laugh, a book with talking animals, a book about friendship, and a book that takes place in the past. Many students chronicled their summer adventures in a journal. Any student who handed in the chart with at least 6 books read or returned with a journal was invited to participate in a celebration of their summer reading and writing with the DVES reading specialists. The celebration included ice cream and a story. Two of the students shared their journals by reading an excerpt of their choice.



• DVES students were full of spirit during DVE Spirit Week. The five days of spirited fun began with red, white and blue day. On Tuesday, students wore gear from their favorite sports teams, midweek the Warrior's mascot, a few cheerleaders, and football players came by for a visit to drum up Warrior pride as the students arrived to school, the 70's and 80's were brought back on Thursday, and the week concluded with Wacky Day where anything went! Spirit was plentiful all week.









Students in Ms. Atchison's fifth grade class worked on team building through some
collaborative activities during the first weeks of school. By synergizing, Habit 7 from
the 7 Habits, the students shared a common goal to complete a task that required
listening to team members' ideas.



e With the newly created **Innovation Lab**, grade levels explored many **science** related topics. Mrs. Hiller's **first grade** class watched 3 caterpillars turn into beautiful monarch butterflies. The class had 3 female butterflies and they named them Sophia, Snowflake, and Rose. They observed as the caterpillar developed into the chrysalis and then to a monarch butterfly. To conclude the lessons, the students sang "Happy Hatch Day" and waved good bye as the butterflies were released. **Second grade** students in Mr. Zielinski and Mr. McElroy's classes performed an experiment with celery. They did an activity to show the function of a plant's stem. By using food color in water, the students saw how water travels through the stem to the leaves of the plant. In **fifth grade**, Mrs. Moglia's students studied biological Science with the study and exploration of red worms. The students fed and took care of the worms while learning about the worms' roles of producers, consumers and decomposers within a local ecosystem.





 In October, The Matamoras Fire Department visited DVES to teach the preschool, kindergarten, first, and second grade students about fire safety and prevention.
 They were taught not to hide if there was a fire, to test door knobs for heat, and to not be afraid of firemen. Students asked the firefighters lots of questions during the presentation.



• Mr. Brent Daniels, an award-winning music producer, composer, sound designer, songwriter, and singer gathered the students for a fall assembly. During his music technology assembly, he spoke about how to make music and the different skills one needs to develop to continue on a path of greatness. His message connected taking care of the body and mind and needing to do well in school. He taught the students different fun music techniques and incorporated many students into making a song through funny sounds which generated a beautiful piece.




- The Milford Matamoras Rotary Club was interviewed on DVE-TV a morning in October and spoke about the importance of the Rotary Club worldwide and the work they do. They visited DVES to donate dictionaries to every third grader. The Rotary Club has been donating dictionaries to each third grader in the district for over thirty years.
- On October 30<sup>th</sup>, DVES fifth grade students traveled to **Harrisburg** for their field trip. They visited the Capitol and the Pennsylvania State Museum. A group picture was taken with 139<sup>th</sup> Legislative District House of Representative Michael Peifer.
- Ms. Nadeen Manzoni, Director of Elections and Voter Registration at the Pike
  County Board of Elections met with fifth graders to speak about voting. She
  encouraged the students to talk with their parents to make sure they are registered
  to vote and reminded them that one person can make a difference in an election.
  After Ms. Manzoni spoke, she gave the fifth graders a sample ballot to fill out, so
  they could experience the process of casting a ballot.

• Fourth and fifth graders studied Native Americans during the first marking period. Each fourth grader created a diorama to represent different types of Native American homes. Fifth grade students in Mrs. Zegarski and Mrs. Moglia's classes completed a Family Totem Pole Project. As totem poles told a story about the tribe family or their ancestors through symbols, the students' assignment was to make a totem pole about their family history to share with their classmates.













• Third grade students enjoyed their field trip to PEEC on November 6<sup>th</sup>. The students had fun learning about nature and being outdoors. Students were excited to go in a bat cave, uncover fossils, and see the inside of a beaver lodge, as well as, Garrett, the snake! They took a hike, saw a beaver dam, and found a fossil. Crepuscular, a species most active during both dawn and dusk, was a new vocabulary word that the students were able to share with everyone back at DVES.

DVES celebrated Veterans Day on November 8<sup>th</sup>. Students invited veterans and active duty service men and women to be honored in a school wide assembly organized by Mrs. Padgett. The orchestra and band played and the Chorus sang. Mr. Mang and his gifted students shared a video presentation that they had created. After the assembly, the students introduced their guest to their classmates, and each service man or woman had the opportunity to share what it meant for him or her to serve our country.





• Fourth Grade students participated in a Penn State Extension Pike County 4-H School Enrichment Program titled, 'The Magic of Electricity.' During this 4-part educational series, students received instructional presentations and completed hands on experiments guiding them to a basic understanding of the principles of electricity and magnetism. Students created series and parallel circuits, experimented with insulators and conductors, developed an understanding of electrons and energy production, discovered magnetic fields, constructed a compass, built an electromagnet, and determined electron directional flow using homemade galvanometers. A project that aligned with last year's Harry Potter House theme was added to the program. Students were able to complete a make and take light up wand project using craft sticks, LED diodes, and copper tape with a binder clip switch to open and close their circuits.







 DVES students in Mrs. Kudrich's fifth grade classes participated in, Offline and in the Wild: How to help stop the illegal trade in Endangered Species with Giavanna Grein through the WWF website. The students spoke online with Giavanna Grein, Program Officer of the Wildlife Crime and Traffic Coalition to End Wildlife Trafficking Online. They learned that one of the biggest threats to species like elephants, pangolins, and tigers is illegal wildlife trade and what they can do to help.



• All first grade students came together to celebrate Thanksgiving, the Charlie Brown Way. The students entered the cafeteria wearing their pilgrims' hats that each one of them had made and placed their special place mats on the table with the smell of fresh toast in the air! Toast, jellybeans, pretzels, and popcorn, exactly what the Charlie Brown special included, was served. They had fun watching the Charlie Brown Thanksgiving, ate the treats while socializing with their friends, and ended with a Turkey story and discussion of how thankful they are!





• In early December, faculty hosted Synergy Night as a part of the Leader in Me. During the event, DVES families utilized habit number six, "Synergize", which emphasizes that two people are better than one. Participants created fun crafts, ran an obstacle course, solved puzzles, and ate ice cream. Each of the seven activities was dedicated to one of Covey's seven habits which students learned about and utilized in school and hopefully beyond.

• During the month of December, the Special Area teachers coordinated the Third Annual DVES Holiday Traditions Around the World event. Classes were asked to select a country from around the world and to learn how their country celebrates the holidays. Each class then decorated their classroom door and/or hallway bulletin board to share what they had learned. Also special activities and events occurred, both during special area classes and throughout the week, including a Gingerbread House Contest, Holiday Scavenger Hunt, and Ugly Sweater Fashion Show.





 The fifth grade students performed Random Acts of Kindness by spreading some cheer in the holiday season. They collected candy canes and delivered them to the staff as well as the other grades in the building. They also baked cookies, sharing them with staff members, and wrote thank you notes, showing their gratitude for everything that is done for them.



• Twenty-four third grade students participated in Japanese Club at DVES. The students learned to say hello and good-bye, count to 10, and say color words. In addition, students learned about the culture of Japan. They made banners with their Japanese names on it, origami animals, haiku poems, and cherry blossom prints. The club concluded with a celebration that included a lesson in using chop sticks and a snack of real Japanese food and dessert sushi.   Rehabilitation Center.
- Ms. Kondracki directed the first grade, second grade, third grade, and the fourth/fifth grade chorus in a concert during the school year.







• **Kindergartners** participated in a kindergarten fashion show as a culminating activity with the alphabet. The children received paper bags, made vests out of them, decorated them at home with an assigned letter as their theme, and modeled them for family and friends that were invited to the fashion show.

• The Delaware Valley Elementary School celebrated 100 Days of School on February 7<sup>th</sup>. The walls were decorated with 100 Day projects, the students and staff dressed as 100 year olds, some classes made 100 Day crowns, and others used an app which aged the students, using their real pictures, so they could write about being 100 years old.

## Business Department Maura Angle, Chair

The year was a unique year. In March schools were closed due to the Coronavirus. Teachers had to utilize on-line programs and resources to instruct. Some of the programs that were used were: Google Classroom, Google Hangouts, ZOOM, Screencastify, Remind App, Edmodo and Quizizz online application. The teachers created and posted lessons and assignments for the students. Students participated in online scheduled classes and submitted work electronically. The access to Gmail for students enabled a much more efficient way to communicate with them. It allows students and teachers to be accountable instead of relying on personal/parental emails. Overall, students did well and completed their curriculum for the year.

#### **Highlights:**

#### Speakers/Career Day:

A variety of speakers came to DVHS Business classes to inform students about career choices, opportunities and post-secondary options. Speakers included: Keystone College, Pittsburgh Technical College, Free Enterprise Week and Walmart Managers. Mr. Luhrs took students to Kings College to attend the Pennsylvania CPA Foundation Accounting Career Day.

#### **Business Communications:**

Business Communication offered students a broad learning experience that encouraged creativity and allowed them to enhance their public speaking skills. This class gave student the opportunity to step outside of their comfort zones. Students were assigned 5 speeches throughout the semester; each speech was longer than the last. I allowed the students to select the topic for one speech, specifically creating a Public Service Announcement of their choosing that would raise awareness within our community. Speeches were done individually as well as in partners to allow for some great collaboration

Students also learned how to appropriately communicate in the business setting using the Textbook *Essentials of Business Communication*. Topics were presented via PowerPoint in a lecture-based format where students took notes. Criteria covered included but was not limited to: Sending and Receiving Positive, Neutral, and Negative Messages, Direct Claim Resolution, Revising Business Messages, and Professionalism in the Workplace (Business Ethics, Proper Etiquette, Teamwork, and Conducting Meetings).

## **Personal Budgeting & Finance:**

In Personal Budget and Finance students were offered a variety of different learning methods. In addition to the students learning the skills to make informed decisions about real world financial issues they participated in the following activities:

## The Morning Brew: (www.morningbrew.com)

For a warm-up, each day students would read through current event articles related to business (in the Morning Brew). This was a great way to keep track of what was happening in the business world and to keep tabs on stock market trends.



#### **Virtual Business:** (www.knowledgematters.com)

Virtual Business is an online learning curriculum with 18 different modules that were each broken down into 3 sections (reading, math, and a simulation) on each topic. The topics covered include but are not limited to: "Finding a Job", "Finding an Apartment", "Choosing and Balancing a Checking Account". Getting a Credit Card", "Fixing Your Credit", and ending with "Buying a Home" and "How to Purchase Insurance".

The students also participated in the *How the Market Works:* (www.howthemarketworks.com)

Students were given \$100,000 of play money to research, track, and invest in stocks all while competing against schools across the State of Pennsylvania. We also created friendly competition within our classroom and the students were up for the challenge. The website is very intuitive and allows students to do in-depth research about how/what drives the stock of major companies and what potential pitfalls to avoid while investing.

#### Introduction to Business – College Credit can be earned.

Intro to Business students continue to research Fortune 500 and local companies throughout the course. This project is meant to create awareness of the businesses that they patronize and that operate around them on a regular basis. Integrating it with a basic understanding of how the economy works allows students to approach the business world with a more educated perspective. Students also research the sustainability efforts of those companies. The students researched all careers that involved working in the business industry from management, entrepreneurship, real estate, financial careers and economists.

### **Web Development:**

Students created websites using the Adobe complete program. Students also learned the principles of design to enhance their projects. They also researched technology-related careers.

## Office Technology:

This class is set up to mirror a real-life office setting. Students are hired by a fictitious company named "Star River Resort" where they are given weekly task lists to complete (Friday being their deadline to complete their work). They are tasked with conducting the business in such aspects as marketing, payroll, drafting the company's policies, composing and revising company-wide memos using mail-merge, etc. This was a small class, but I think that it really gave them a sense of teamwork and collaboration. Another section of this class was completing workorders from other teachers and administration. If a member of the Delaware Valley faculty needed a task done, they could fill out a workorder and send it to the Office Technology class to have it processed. Examples of the workorders the students completed were:

Printing brochures for the Turkey Trot, designing and printing brochures for the Rho Kappa induction, assembling Art textbooks and other projects for teachers.

#### Computer Applications:

Student's created spreadsheets, data bases, mail merge letters and WORD documents, visual presentations and integrated projects. They also researched technology-related careers.

## Video Game Design:



In Video Game Design, students were introduced to the history of gaming as well as the numerous components and labor hours that go into designing a video game from scratch.

Topics included but are not limited to: Introduction to Basic Functions, Hardware Technology, Collision Theory and Game Logic, Pixel Mapping, and Landscaping Design and Static

Animation. Microsoft Office Suite pairs well with some of the assignments from the textbook "Video Game Design Foundations". Students used animation functions in Microsoft PowerPoint to learn a lot of key foundations to designing a video game. Microsoft Excel was used in lessons involving Pixelating images and Pixel mapping. This class culminated with students applying what they have learned to develop their own video game from scratch. They first had to storyboard "plan" their game on paper. Character development (names, appearance, etc.), overall mission of the game, achievements, point-based system, how to win or complete the game, etc. Their games were shared using the software developed by *Game Factory 2*.

#### **Business Law:**

The students participated in activities relating to personal law. Business Law students researched careers in the Legal profession such as law enforcement, government agencies, and lawyers

#### **International Business:**

The students learned the importance of international business and trade in the global economy and explored the factors that influence success in international markets. The students focused on careers that would be based outside of the US, and researched documents that would be required to live and work abroad.

#### **Career Exploration:**

Career Exploration is a very project-driven course. The students started by creating a High School Timeline of achievements they want to conquer and/or had conquered throughout their career at Delaware Valley High School. The class transitioned into a more "Career-Readiness" focus, Comparing Colleges, Conducting Career Research at <a href="https://www.bls.gov">www.bls.gov</a> (Bureau of Labor Statistics) and <a href="https://www.pacareerzone.org">www.pacareerzone.org</a> (Pennsylvania Career Zone), as well as learning proper interview techniques and what to expect during an interview (Top 100 asked Interview Questions, Types of Interviews, Taking-notes during an interview, and asking questions at the end of an interview).

Students completed a variety of self-evaluation tools throughout this course. Each student conducted a Strengths, Weaknesses, Areas of Opportunities, and potential Threats (S.W.O.T Analysis) in starting a new career that they researched, narrowed down, and are focusing on. Students were also introduced to S.M.A.R.T Goals (Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Relevant, Timely) to make their existing goals more achievable.

Lastly, this class focused on the importance of having a well-thought out Cover Letter and Resume when applying for positions. This is a way to build your own "Personal

Brand" and to applicants.

## Introduction to Hospitality – College credit can be earned:

Hospitality students used the Pocono Mountain Visitors Bureau website to learn more about the recreational environment that exists around them. The students also learned about working in the travel and tourism industries such as hotels and resorts, cruise ships, culinary careers, recreational leaders, and national parks. A speaker and the annual field trip to Great Wolf Lodge was canceled due to COVID19.

#### **Business/Marketing class:**

The three-year instructional Marketing CTE Program of Study prepares individuals for occupations and careers in advertising, marketing, public relations and sales. Through actively participating in the Marketing program students will develop leadership ability, strengthen communication skills and demonstrate the professional skills necessary to succeed in today's business world. Topics include but are not limited to: advertising, retailing, merchandising, business operations, promotion, selling, economics, financing, distribution, inventory control, pricing, entrepreneurship and professional development.

The Business-Marketing class had hands-on experience by completing work for local businesses and school projects. The students worked on projects that included creating programs for the DVHS and DVMS Honor Society and the DVMS School Play. Students also created posters, tickets, and flyers to promote school activities and created physical cards for the athletic department.

The Business/Marketing students were responsible to operate the DV Warrior Pride

School Store during the school year. The store is successful and is open in the mornings, during all lunches and after school. Some of the tasks the students were responsible for were designing the store layout, arranging merchandise, processing orders, operating the register, communicating with customers, determining prices, inventory and preparing reports. The online

website was created using the Weebly program but was not rolled out due to the school closure. It will be launched in Fall 2020.

Level one students also took the RISE customer service exam from the National Retail Federation and earned certification. The students took the OSHA 10 course and received certification. Ten students also earned college credits though dual enrollment with Luzerne County Community College. The following credits were earned: customer service, advertising, marketing, and sales. Level 3 students were unable to take their NOCTI test, but the skills were reinforced with projects that were presented online. Level 3 students also received a certification in Interview Skills by completing the Career Safe program.

#### **Diversified Occupations/Capstone classes:**

The Diversified Occupations program provides a cooperative arrangement between Delaware Valley High School and local employers whereby the student receives career- related theory instruction in the school and on-the-job training through part-time paid employment in business/industry. The area of training may be in any career area where there are needs for trained persons and must relate to the student's career objective. Students in the program participate in a school-to-work class every 1st period to learn soft skills, finance, employment documents and teamwork. Students are employed in a meat deli, daycare, restaurant, water authority and

landscaping business. Students also received an OSHA 10 safety certificate by completing a Career Safe Program and the Customer Service Certification from the National Retail Federation.

The Capstone students extend their learning by working in a business relating to their CTE program. The students meet once a week to reinforce their shop skills and employability skills. Students were placed in local autobody shops.







## 7th grade Career Leadership classes at DVMS and DDMS:

### Career Leadership:

The students read "The 7 Habits of Highly Effective Teens" and participated in class discussions as well as numerous projects to enhance understanding of the topics in the book. When they were home their reading assignments were posted on Google Classroom with a PDF version of the book, and an audio recording to follow along. After reading, students reflected on how the different topics relate to their lives, and how they can work to develop positive characteristics and habits.

Students began to explore college and career options, completed career readiness surveys, developed resumes, and began to put together a plan starting in 7th grade and finishing with the career they hope to get into. The students also created a slideshow and presentation on a career of their choice, with ten slides covering all different aspects, conducted interviews of adults for the how-why-etc. of their career choice, completed a budget activity to determine how much students would have to earn to support their lifestyle, created career posters depicting related tasks, and describing elements of that workforce, created a career family tree showing what different generations did for work, showing how careers change over time and collected career artifacts for their electronic career portfolios for the guidance office.

#### Computer Literacy:

The students explored numerous 21st century skills in this portion of the class. They all began the year learning keyboarding skills, which they continued practicing throughout the school year. The students took some time exploring internet safety and how to use the internet as an effective research tool. The students built numerous Power Point projects and learned advanced skills within Power Point. We also spent time going over the 21st century skill of how to give an effective presentation using those Power Points. The students began to familiarize themselves with Microsoft Office, and when we had to transition to e-learning, we used the Google Applications to discover how they differ from Microsoft Office and how we can use the two programs together.

The Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA) chapter at DVHS is one of the largest club in the DVHS. The students are highly active in community service where the chapter received awards at the local and state levels. Students assist in the Pike County Day of Caring, serve as guides for Parent/Teacher conferences and Back to School Night., Humane Society, Safe Haven and peer tutoring The students also fundraise and contribute a portion of their proceeds to the PA FBLA State Project each year. The state project for 2019-2020 was the American Heart Association. The students participate in three competitions yearly. Students need to qualify at the local level to proceed to the state and national competitions. Events consist of individual, group, performance and state-only events relating to business and technology.

The students attended the Region Conference at the University of Scranton in December and 30 students qualified to attend the State Conference in Hershey. Kaleigh Kuddar was also elected Region 22 President and Olivia O'Grady was elected Vice- President for the upcoming 2020-2021 school year. The face-to-face State Conference was canceled due to the Coronavirus but was held virtually. Students competed by using ZOOM for the presentations and interviews and tested online. The Virtual Awards program was held on May 15 and DV FBLA was highly successful. DV received the 1st place Outstanding Chapter Award in the state of PA for the 3rd year. The following awards were received, and fifteen students will participate in the Virtual FBLA National Experience in June.





# CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION Barbara Coyle, Dept. Chair

#### **OVERVIEW:**

The 2019-2020 school year was full of thrills and challenges for the Career and Technical Education Department. We are grateful to the DVHS Administration, Dr. Bell and the School Board for their support as we settle into our new shops. We continue to expand our dual enrollment and articulation agreements with our post-secondary partners (Luzerne County Community College, Lackawanna College, Keystone College and Johnson College) through our SOAR- Students Occupationally and Academically Ready program. Our team of Instructors, Dr. Blaum, Mr. Mitchell and our Guidance Counselor, Jennifer Cosentino are proud to represent our department as we continue to "spread the word" about the value of CTE and attract and enroll an ever-growing number of students to prepare them for careers of the future.

### **NOCTI Testing**

\*NOCTI (National Occupational Competency Testing Institute) administers exit testing for our Senior CTE students. These tests are comprised of online (written) and practical components. Due to Covid-19, Spring 2020 testing was cancelled. In place of testing, our programs devised a series of virtual and videotaped activities to assess each graduating senior's proficiency in completing Program of Study tasks. They are described below in the "Program Highlights" section.

#### PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS:

## **Automotive Technology**

Mr. Ryan began his first full year as program instructor with a total enrollment of 50 students. The Automotive Technology Program continues to provide services to district and community drivers while providing state-of-the-art education to our students. The Automotive Technology is at maximum enrollment and has 25 new Level 1 students starting in the fall.

Enrollment for the Automotive program included 25 Level 1, 13 Level 2, 11 Level 3 and 1 Level 2a (a transitional level accommodating student's needs). 10 Seniors passed, completing the program. There are 20 students registered for Level 1 for Fall 2020.

Despite the shortened year, Mr. Ryan provided a variety of activities allowing students to explore post-secondary options. These included inviting the National Guard to visit the shop with vehicles, guest-speakers from Universal Technical College, Lincoln Tech, Ohio Technical College and University of Northern Ohio. Automotive students also participated in a day trip/tour of Johnson College.

Projects the students worked on included getting a 1971 Chevy El Camino running and driving again including engine and electrical work. The students replaced all components in the front end for the steering and suspension systems. This was a great project. They also worked in getting a 1938 international kb5 truck running that has not run in over 40 years. We were not able to get this one done due to the shortened year. This was another great project and a team effort between all 3 levels.





## **Building Trades**

Congratulations to Mr. Fitzpatrick upon the completion of his first year as Building Trades Program Instructor! Students in the program were busy at work completing a variety of projects.

For the 2019-2020 school year Building Trades had 12 Level 1, 8 Level 2 and 7 Level 3s. 8 Seniors (one Level 2 senior is also a program completer) completed all required tasks for the Program of Study. There are 11 students registered for Level 1 for Fall 2020.

Highlights of the year were building a 12X16 "Little House" on the outdoor apron of the shop allowing students to acclimate themselves to the variety of weather conditions they will encounter in industry. Before the transition to distance-learning the block foundation was completed, framing, roofing and windows were done, and the siding was started. Upper Level students (Levels 2 and 3) started roughing in the plumbing and electrical wiring (picture below).

After the transition to distance-learning Levels 2 and 3 completed an OSHA 10-hour industrial safety training course online. Levels 1 and 2 built a scale model of a house at home (picture below).





## **Business and Marketing, Diversified Occupations and Capstone**



The three-year instructional Marketing CTE Program of Study prepares individuals for occupations and careers in advertising, marketing, public relations and sales. Through actively participating in the Marketing program students will develop leadership ability, strengthen communication skills and demonstrate the professional skills necessary to succeed in today's business world. Topics include but are not limited to: advertising, retailing, merchandising, business operations, promotion, selling, economics, financing, distribution, inventory control, pricing, entrepreneurship and professional development. There were a total of 15 students enrolled in the Business/Marketing Program and 9 enrolled in the Capstone/Diversified Occupations for the 2019/2020 school year. All students passed. There are 13 students registered for Level 1 for Fall 2020. The Business-Marketing class had hands-on experience by completing work for local businesses and school projects. The students worked on projects that included creating programs for the DVHS and DVMS Honor Society and the DVMS School Play. Students also created posters, tickets, and flyers to promote school activities and created physical cards for the athletic department.

The students also had speakers from the Pittsburg Technical College, Johnson & Wales University, PA Free Enterprise Week and past DV graduates to share their expertise on Business/Marketing and career opportunities.



The Business/Marketing students were responsible to operate the DV Warrior Pride School Store during the school year. The store is successful and is open in the mornings, during all lunches and after school. Some of the tasks the students were responsible for were designing the store layout, arranging merchandise, processing orders, operating the register, communicating with customers, determining prices, inventory and preparing reports. The online website was created using the Weebly program but was not rolled out due to the school closure. It will be launched in Fall 2020.

Level one students also took the RISE customer service exam from the National Retail Federation and earned certification. The students took the OSHA 10 course and received certification. Due to the school closure because of the Coronavirus students learned online in March. The students continued to complete their task list by attending online ZOOM classes, presenting projects, and participating in online mock interviews. Google Classroom, Screencastify and the REMIND app were used to instruct, post assignments, and send messages to students. Level 3 students were unable to take their NOCTI test, but the skills were reinforced with projects that were presented online. Level 3 students also received a certification in Interview Skills by completing the Career Safe program.

## **Diversified Occupations/Capstone classes:**

## **Culinary Arts:**

The 2019-2020 was an exciting and challenging year for our Culinary Program. Construction finishing touches and transition to remote learning cut the year short, but the program still rallied to provide and include several learning projects. Full-Service luncheon was served to faculty/staff several times during the year (to rave reviews), our School Board conducted a meeting in the new restaurant with refreshments provided by students, and students prepared and served a lunch to the local Rotary Club. Additionally, students roasted Thanksgiving turkeys for the Salvation Army and prepared and donated 20 gallons each of chicken noodle soup and chili for the Northwest Christian School Annual Craft Fair. Finally, after experimenting with potential entries, our students competed in the Annual Chili and Wing Cook-Off at the Silver Birches Resort in February.

Enrollment for this year is as follows: Level 1, 11 students (10 passing), Level 2, 4 students (3 passing), Level 3, 7 students (6 passing). There are 16 Level 1 students enrolled for Fall 2020.

Although NOCTI was cancelled, Senior Completers completed practice tests during the year, and after shutdown. Additionally, students prepared NOCTI-required tasks at home and communicated the process and product via video.





## **Early Childhood Education:**

In September Luann Scardino from the Mt. View Early Learning center in Matamoras came to speak to Mrs. Pavinich's Early Childhood Education Level 1 students. Luann covered a variety of topics. She discussed the importance of confidentiality when working with young children. She also talked about methods in observing children. Luann showed the high school students how to properly wash their hands and how to sanitize a table.



ECE Level 1 has 16 students 2 non-traditional All students passed for the year. Level 2 had an enrollment of 4 students and Level 3 had 5 students. There is a total of 17 Level 1 students enrolled for Fall 2020.

Early Childhood Level 2 students are responsible for running and planning DVHS's preschool under the supervision of Ms. Farr. Level 3 students produce lesson plans and visit DVES with Ms. Farr to participate in "real-world" teaching experiences at the elementary level. This year Upper-Level students launched a fundraising campaign through *donorschoose.org* and raised over \$1200 for an "Eat What We Grow" greenhouse. Building and Electrical Trades students helped construct the 6X8 structure which included a heater, shelving, plant hooks and grow lights along with various educational materials for preschool-level children. The effort also received a \$50 grant from PSEA for soil and seeds. ECE students also volunteered at Shohola Elementary Christmas and Valentine's Day activities with the 2<sup>nd</sup> grade Inclusion class.

While at home classes zoomed 2x a week to continue lessons and curriculum activities. The students wrote lesson plans and created ideas for activities to teach preschool students. Upper Level students videotaped and submitted original lessons.







#### **Electrical Trades:**

Mr. Watson began his first year as the Electrical Trades Instructor in November of this academic year. As he acclimated himself to his shop and program, he had a total of 11 Level 1, 5 Level 2 and 5 Level 3 students (all passing except for 1 Level 3 student). The program has 12 students registered for Level 1 for Fall 2020. During the four months of his 2019-2020 tenure, students worked on tool identification, tool safety use and load calculation. Students also studied industry workplace safety, shop safety, professionalism, and post-secondary industry options. Electrical Trades students worked closely with the Automotive and Building Trades programs on their respective projects involving wiring. Electrical Trades students also worked with maintenance staff observing "finishing touches" on the Warrior Café electrical system as well as working with the Building Trades class on Early Childhood Education's greenhouse project. During the remote learning transition, students worked on professionalism and safety modules. Electrical Trades students also participated in the variety of guest speaker and college visits scheduled for the Department.



#### **Healthcare Careers**

The Healthcare Careers Program has been busy at work expanding into our new classroom and lab. Enrollment this year was up by ten students from the 2018-2019 school year. Out program finished the year with 18 Level 1, 14 Level 2 and 7 Level 3 students. All passed for the year. 26 new Level 1 students have enrolled in the program this fall. Of our graduating seniors, 5 have enrolled in 4-year post-secondary programs, 2 in 2-year programs and 1 is headed to the workforce. Ms. Coyle is especially proud of the upper-level Healthcare Careers students who stepped-up to enter (or continue in) "frontline" healthcare roles during the Covid-19 crisis.

Our program continues to partner with Milford Healthcare and Rehabilitation and Belle Reve Senior Living to provide our upper level students with real-world client care experiences. Both valued partners offer monetary awards to graduating seniors. We welcomed a guest speaker from Apria Healthcare, a technician who visited client homes

to educate them on CPAP (continuous positive airway pressure) equipment. All upper level students (levels 2 and 3) receive CPR/AED certification and an OSHA Workplace Safety certification through "CareerSafe". Finally, each graduating senior earns a Pennsylvania Personal Care Assistant Certification through the PA Department of Health. This certification qualifies them to work in an Assisted Living setting providing direct patient care when they graduate and turn 18.

Healthcare Careers students and HOSA members participated as volunteers in both the United Way Day of Caring 9/11 Memorial Blood Drive and DVHS' Student Blood Drive in January. Our Red Cross Leadership Team attended the "HS Kickoff Event" at the Pike County Training Center in October where they learned and explored donor recruitment techniques.

In place of the Spring 2020 NOCTI exam, graduating seniors completed an online virtual written test. Fortunately, required skills for the practical exam are practiced and assessed throughout the year, beginning in September.


## **FBLA (Future Business Leaders of America)**



The Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA) chapter at DVHS is one of the largest clubs at DVHS. The students are highly active in community service where the chapter received awards at the local and state levels. Students assist in the Pike County Day of Caring, serve as guides for Parent/Teacher conferences and Back to School Night, Humane Society, Safe Haven and peer tutoring The students also fundraise and contribute a portion of their proceeds to the PA FBLA State Project each year. The state project for 2019-2020 was the American Heart Association. The students participate in three competitions yearly. Students need to qualify at the local level to proceed to the state and national competitions. Events consist of individual, group, performance and state-only events relating to business and technology.

The students attended the Region Conference at the University of Scranton in December and 30 students qualified to attend the State Conference in Hershey. Kaleigh Kuddar was also elected Region 22 President and Olivia O'Grady was elected Vice- President for the upcoming 2020-2021 school year. The face-to-face State Conference was canceled due to the Coronavirus but was held virtually. Students competed by using ZOOM for the presentations and interviews and tested online. The Virtual Awards program was held on May 15 and DV FBLA was highly successful. DV received the 1st place Outstanding Chapter Award in the state of PA for the 3rd year. The following awards were received and fifteen students will participate in the Virtual FBLA National Experience in June.







## FCCLA (Future Career and Community Leaders of America)

The Family, Career & Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) had thirty-two students the Regional Leadership Conference in Reading, PA this past November. Students attended sessions related to Culinary Arts, STAR events, and ways to implement various community service projects. The conference provided students an opportunity to network with other chapters, share creative ideas for their projects, and brainstorms ways to increase chapter membership.



This May FCCLA member, Anna Bailor, was elected to serve on the Pennsylvania State Leadership Executive Council as the Vice President of Membership for the 2020-2021 school year. Within this role Anna will help to create and implement a statewide membership campaign for FCCLA, design and promote an election campaign for the 2021-2022 state officers, and will help to plan and organize the PA FCCLA Regional and State Leadership Conferences.



## **HOSA- Future Health Professionals**



Delaware Valley Warrior HOSA had a total of 15 students participating in the competitive events of Medical Innovation, Health Career Display, Veterinary Science, Emergency Medical Technician and Pathophysiology this year. Our Chapter participated in The United Way Day of Caring and DV's Warrior Fest. Unlike other Career and Technical Student Organizations, HOSA does not conduct Regional/District Conferences. Unfortunately, our State Leadership Conference was cancelled for 2020 (scheduled for April 1-3). Due to Covid-19 National HOSA opted to conduct a virtual International Leadership Conference with a reduced number of competitions. Pennsylvania HOSA decided not to participate in this year's International Leadership Conference. As is the case in healthcare, the majority of HOSA competitive events require person-to-person contact and teamwork. The elimination of these events would have excluded all but 1 member of DV's Delegation from participation. We look forward to the 2020-2021 school year with renewed enthusiasm.

## **SKILLS USA**

Skills USA is a Career and Technical Student Organization that provides learning and competitive opportunities for a variety of CTE areas. Students from Culinary, Electrical Trades, Automotive Trades and Building Trades are members of DV's Chapter. DV's Skills USA Chapter participated in their Regional Competition in November.

## **English Language Development (ELD)**

#### Raycharlyn Krasulski, Chairperson

#### **Highlights:**

There is never a dull moment in the English Language Development (ELD) department. From screenings and identifications to collaborating with staff members on how to best meet our students' language needs, the ELD staff is always hard at work. There were thirty-nine identified English Learners (ELs) enrolled at the end of the school year representing over twelve different languages and cultures in grades K-12. This past year, the ELD staff worked on promoting unity and celebrating differences. Mrs. Kristen Strocchia and Mrs. Raycharlyn Krasulski worked together to develop and implement a department project called World Team. In this project, students in grades K-12 participated in a reading and writing activity that highlighted how similar we are as students regardless of our backgrounds and what our personal goals are for the future. All of the participants signed a soccer ball that was a designed as a globe to highlight the students' home cultures. In addition, Ms. Samantha Orr helped our department plan for Harmony Day, which was to be held the week of March 16-20<sup>th</sup>.

This year, the department welcomed Mr. Jimmy Mitchell as the ELD administrator. With his help, the department was able to streamline new student registration procedures and Kindergarten enrollment procedures to help identify all potential English Learners and PHLOTE students. His guidance and encouragement were greatly appreciated. We wish him luck in his retirement at the conclusion of this school year.

As a department, Mrs. Lindsey Strapec and Mrs. Raycharlyn Krasulski hosted inservice offerings in the fall to educate our staff about the needs of our EL population. This year, Mrs. Lindsey Strapec, Ms. Samantha Orr, and Mrs. Raycharlyn Krasulski attended ELD networking meetings hosted by IU 20 to gain valuable information about best practices, PDE policy updates and current issues in English Language Development.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, many of our ELD staff members were able to participate in virtual IU meetings and PDE workshops on a variety of topics including Foundations for Teaching ELs, Culturally Responsive Teaching, Planning for Academic Language Development through Formative Assessment, ELD Reclassification Procedures and EL Identification Procedures. In addition, Mrs. Raycharlyn Krasulski was able to participate in several PDE ELD Office Hours ZOOM sessions which were designed for periodic check-ins about current ELD policy and educating our ELs during the COVID-19 school closure.

## **Highlights:**

## Dingman-Delaware Primary School (DDPS)

There were eight ELs with three home languages and four home cultures represented at DDPS. Thanks to our new ELD curriculum, the ELs narrated short, wordless video clips about scientific processes and daily activities in the garden including a time-lapsed seed growing into a plant, a bee visiting a flower, and picking carrots to name a few. Students also learned high frequency words and phrases through song, a hands-on activity board, and mini-book activities. Throughout the year, we were able to utilize many of the library and hall displays to extend conversation about lesson topics.

## **Dingman-Delaware Elementary School (DDES)**

There were eleven students that represented our English language development program at DDES. A variety of different cultures and languages were represented by these students. The students spoke Korean, Hindi, Spanish, and Russian. One student even spoke fluent sign language. They were a bright group of ELD students in our building who received several achievement awards over this past school year. Two rewards to highlight were Eric Choi who was awarded the positive award by Mr. Vito Quaglia, and Abigail McConnel -Furnival who was rewarded an opinion candy writing award. The Delaware Valley ELD program planned on celebrating Harmony Day on one of the last Fridays in the month of March. However, that was not successful due to COVID 19. Harmony Day was created to represent many different cultures and languages in our school. The "I COME FROM" poem was a Harmony Day Flag project planned. Students in the ELD program had the opportunity to color a flag to represent their home country.

## Delaware Valley Elementary School (DVES) & Shohola Elementary School (SES) There were two students identified as ELD learners at SES during the 2019-20 school

year. They were brothers, first and third grade. They were new to the district transferring from New Jersey.

There were three third grade students and two fifth grade students at DVES. Four students received instruction once a day and one was on the consultative model. Developing English proficiency through writing, reading, and speaking were the primary focus for these students for this past school year. Technology was a valuable tool and highly motivational for these students as we incorporated the use of the Smartboard. Chrome books, and IPad apps to engage them with English language rich experiences as well as using the ESL Companion books to the ELA curriculum for each of their grade levels. A new component in the ELD curriculum was the REACH series from National Geographic.

The ELD, classroom teachers, and reading teachers were in daily contact and discussion to collaborate and plan an individualized program which was designed to each student's specific ELD needs. Students were fully engaged within their classrooms with their grade level peers attempting to complete curricular work and tasks with adaptations and accommodations discussed and provided as needed by their teachers.

As the end of the year approached, the school closure truly impacted our fourth marking period leaving us with online learning and virtual classrooms; not an ideal situation for developing and collaborating to keep our ELD learners engaged and present in learning.

Up to that time, the students, for the most part, were determined, eager learners, who exhibited a true interest in each other, their peers, their teachers, and the overall school environment.

#### **Dingman-Delaware Middle School (DDMS)**

At Dingman-Delaware Middle School, there were four ELs with three different home languages and cultures represented. David and Eunice were very active in school activities. David played soccer and participated in chorus and band. Eunice also participated in chorus and band, as well as Yearbook club, school drama [in which she had speaking & singing roles], and Art club. Throughout the year, the DDMS ELs worked on Focus Country presentations in which they studied another Anglophone country outside the U.S. Students were asked to create slides for these presentations that extended the topics and grammar/vocabulary lessons being studied in class. Students chose to study England, Canada, and New Zealand. Each guarter they presented their findings in class, and during this time of distance learning, they added to these projects and recorded presentations to post on Google Classroom. During whole class activity times, students were challenged to communicate about a variety of visual prompts, including: photos of our national parks, line-drawings representing homophones, Far Side comics, charts and graphs representing a variety of data, and the like. Background soundtracks also set the stage for daily communication. Students had to listen carefully to talk about what they were hearing, and they had to ask questions, express opinions and even doubts until the mystery soundtrack was successfully identified.

### Delaware Valley Middle School (DVMS) Mrs. Lindsey Strapec

At DVMS, there were three ELs representing Spanish and Chinese as their home languages. Our ELs have come so far during their first year in the district. One seventh grader, Kevin Grady, had a great season on the middle school basketball team and began to participate in track and field in the spring. We participated in the door decorating contest during the holiday season. We won in our hearts. Throughout the course of the year, the students wrote creatively every Friday. Throughout that process students found themselves inside burning volcanos, evacuating for natural disasters, and inside famous works of art. Although this was an atypical year, it was still outstanding in the world of ELD.

#### Delaware Valley High School (DVHS)


This past school year, there were five identified ELs in grades 9-12. This year's group of ELs represented five different home cultures from Haiti, Yemen, India, Turkey, and Moldova. From these students, there were over seven different home languages spoken in our classroom including Haitian Creole, French, Arabic, Gujarati, Hindi, Turkish, and Russian. This diverse group of students brought with them varying

degrees of educational backgrounds, literacy levels, cultural practices, and English language proficiencies. This school year, there was also one student who participated in the Career Tech Early Childhood program.

The high school ELD class was fortunate to feature two Students of the Month. Rosemita Kielty, grade 12, was chosen as the September Career Tech Student of the Month. Diya Patel, grade 9, was chosen as the April Student of the Month for her diligence as an online learner. Both students were recognized by the staff and administrators of the high school and were featured in the local newspapers and the school announcement board.

During the fall, Mrs. Raycharlyn Krasulski shared resources and knowledge with volunteers at the Pike County Correctional Facility (PCCF) to help implement an adult ELD program. She met with volunteers from the program to answer questions and to give guidance on English language development.

This school year, the high school section of ELs participated in several cross-curricular lessons to promote listening, speaking, reading and writing in the target language including a lesson on the Sierpinski triangle. Students created and discussed their own Sierpinski triangle design to understand the concept of fractals in mathematics and in our environment. Another exciting lesson included participating in a science procedure where students discovered what DNA looked like while extracting DNA from split peas. Biology teacher, Mr. Nick Irwin, shared the necessary scientific materials to help the students perform the procedure. Our current group of six English Learners (ELs) worked hard to build their current reading levels and English proficiency abilities. On a daily basis, we practiced our listening, speaking, reading and writing skills while learning about current events, cultural practices in the United States and themes while tailoring the course to meet each of the student's current English proficiency levels. This year, the student unanimously chose their Class Read of the Year as the novel, Bronx Masquerade, by Nikki Grimes. In this engaging story, the characters in the story each shared their own teenage struggles while participated in their English class Open Mic Poetry Café. Each chapter in the book featured a different student character. As the culminating event, the high school ELs wrote their own chapter featuring their own highs and lows, and how they have worked to overcome those obstacles. Mrs. Krasulski's ELD class



planned for an Open Mic reading to be held in March in conjunction with Harmony Day. Students created invitations, posters in hopes of delivering an Open Mic performance to the high school staff that have been supportive of their English development and academic success at the high school level.

#### Trips



  - The Combo 11 class participated in the United Way Day of Caring where they ran the car wash raising money for a GAIT. Over \$1,000 was raised throughout the day.





Students in Mrs. Probst's Intermediate Foods A class created delicious Halloween Treats. The winners received the chefs hat and golden whisk!








#### **Muffin Wars**



The Delaware Valley High School Counseling Department continues to have an ongoing commitment to building relationships with various colleges and programs of post-secondary education. The Delaware Valley High School hosted the second annual College Fair. All 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> grade students were assigned to visit with the recruiters from 46 different colleges and universities. An instant admit day was held this year with East Stroudsburg University. Seventy-two students participated in the dual enrollment program with local colleges. A Senior Parent Financial Aid Night and Junior Parent Informational Night were held to assist parents and students in the financial aid and college admission process. The 11/12 Counseling Office, through the use of Naviance, processed approximately 1176 college applications for the Class of 2020.

#### **Support Groups Offered**

Support groups are offered at all levels and vary by school and student need. Groups that are offered include: Alateen, Anger Management, Boys Group/Girls Group, Changing Families, Coping Skills, Dealing with Anxiety and Depression, Dealing with Feelings, Expressive Art, Expect Respect, Girls Empowerment, Go Girls, Goal Setting, Grief, Healthy Relationships, Leadership, Organizational Skills, Self Esteem, Serenity Now, Social Skills, SOGIE (formerly LGBTQ+), and Stress Management.

#### **Classroom Instruction and Meetings**

Classroom instruction is part of the Elementary School Counseling curriculum. School Counselors and Social Workers offer other classroom instruction and meetings that take place at the secondary level. Elementary classroom instruction topics covered include: The 7 Habits, Bullying, Career Education, Coping Skills, Effective Communication, Feelings, Goal Setting, Good Touch/Bad Touch, Healthy Choices, Problem Solving, Safety, Self-Awareness, Stranger Danger, and Test Taking Skills. Secondary level topics include: Advanced Placement courses, Career Planning, College Application Process, Counseling Services Offered, CTE presentations, Hobby Presentations, "I" statements, Scheduling, Social Skills and Transition Groups.

#### <u>Instructional Assistance and Student Assistance Program</u>

School Counselors and School Social Workers work closely to identify and help students in need of academic or personal/ social assistance. As members of the team, they collect and analyze data and work with teachers and families to develop a plan for student success.

#### **Student Attendance Improvement Plans**

The School Counseling Department worked with students and families to create an attendance plan for any student with truancy or excessive absenteeism. All students referred to the SAP Program were checked in on and monitored during COVID-19 distance learning.

#### **Suicide Prevention**

The School Counseling Department is committed to the safety of our students. Members must speak with students who express a concern, screen their level of safety and make appropriate referrals for further care or assessment.

### SCHOOL COUNSELING DEPARTMENT HIGHLIGHTS

#### Comprehensive School Counseling Program

The Delaware Valley Advisory Committee for the Comprehensive School Counseling Program met for the first time this school year. The purpose of the counsel is to help maintain and implement a comprehensive school counseling program for grades kindergarten through 12. Following the American School Counselor Association guidelines, members of the counseling department met and collaborated on the current comprehensive program in place. We also took the first steps in creating and completing a Counseling Department Needs Assessment for all staff and for our community parents. We are thrilled at this step moving forward to improve meeting the needs of our students, parents and faculty through the School Counseling Department.

#### **PAYS**

In September, students in the 6th, 8th, 10th and 12th grades had the opportunity to participate in the Pennsylvania Youth Survey (PAYS). It is a biennial survey that inquires about students' perspectives of their school environment, attitudes, knowledge and behaviors in regard to alcohol, tobacco and other drugs. It also collects information about risk factors and protective factors. The data collected helps schools and communities select appropriate prevention and intervention programs to address identifiable problems.

#### **Start with Hello**

DVSD joined thousands of schools and youth organizations across the country to bring Start with Hello to our schools. This is part of the Sandy Hook Promise to be kind to others and not make students feel left out but more included in their school. Students had fun as they shared kindness throughout our schools by wearing Hawaiian shirts and saying Aloha to others, wearing green for Sandy Hook and sending post cards.



#### **Bully Prevention & Unity Day**

Each building participated in Bully Prevention Month in October including Unity Day. A wide variety of activities and events took place including an annual unity walk, spirit week(s), daily announcements, bulletin boards, and classroom lessons all related to types of bullying, statistics, and resources.



# **School Assessment Coordinators**

Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, DVSD School Counselors serving as School Assessment Coordinators were in the process of preparing for the PSSA exam. In addition, high school counselors served as the School Assessment Coordinators for the winter Keystone Exams, PSAT, NOCTI, and the Advanced Placement Tests.

## **Career Readiness Standards**

The Counseling Department developed, collected and oversaw the Pennsylvania Career Readiness Standards. Students are required to generate six artifacts in grades 3-5 and 6-8, and eight artifacts in grades 9-11. Counselors maintain these artifacts and report completion to Pennsylvania Information Management System (PIMS) for each student.

# Elementary School Counseling Department Unity Day

In the fall, a Unity Walk was held. DDES and DDPS joined the walk together to stand up against bullying for Unity Day.



#### **Red Ribbon Week**

We spread the message about being drug free and no bullying through guidance lessons and spirit days such as wear camo day.

#### 100 Day of School Celebration

In February, DDES staff and students dressed like they were 100 years old. Each grade level collected 100 items to be donated to local community agencies. The 3<sup>rd</sup> grade collected items to be donated to the food pantry, the 4<sup>th</sup> grade collected items for the humane society and the 5<sup>th</sup> grade collected donations for a senior citizen home.



#### **Bulletin Board**

There's an "App for That!" bulletin board was created for students to be aware of the resources that are available to them. It included apps, hotline numbers and services on topics such as depression, anxiety, LGBTQ, and suicide prevention.







Career Tech Counselor and transition coordinator brought 33 students on a field trip to Johnson College on January 30, 2020. Students were able to explore the different technical programs at the school, tour the campus, and enjoy a pizza lunch in the cafeteria.




#### **Counseling Department During Distance Learning**

The counseling department remained committed to the academic, career and personal/social needs of the student population. Google Classrooms were set up, check-in forms were sent, groups and individual sessions were held. Communication with parents was critical, and counselors utilized a variety of ways to help support the families in our community. Each week a new topic was posted to the website/Twitter account as well as being sent to our students. Topics included local resources, help during COVID-19, stress management tips, sleeping tips, the importance of gratitude and laughter.

The Elementary Counseling Department remained available and accessible to students, providing classroom activities and individual counseling services as well as remaining in constant contact with parents and teachers. Counselors set up google classroom with activities and assignments related to stress and social and emotional learning. Communication was a main priority, and counselors utilized contact with parents via DOJO, email, and phone calls. Counselors continued to meet with students in the classroom, whole group, and individually via zoom meetings.

DVMS/DDMS middle school counseling department provided continuous communication with students by sending out a check-in form each month to gauge student academic and mental health functioning. Communication was maintained via email, phone, zoom and google classroom by counselors/social worker with parents and students to support academic success as well as to provide mental health support (as needed). Collaboration with teachers, administrators and staff was administered virtually to support and fulfill prescribed IEP plans, academic concerns, and distance learning anxiety. Established groups continued to be provided via zoom, and individual sessions were provided via phone, email and zoom. Mental health coping responses as a result of COVID-19 were provided by posting information via Google Classroom for students and families. Other crises were addressed virtually with a focus on student safety and linked to appropriate services. Community contacts with Pike County Children and Youth, Intermediate Unit 19, Friendship House as well as Community Solutions were maintained to address mandated reporting, attendance, and follow up with identified students. Participation in PLC meetings linked to COVID-19 response with students, school and community were also incorporated.

The high school counselors and social worker remained accessible to the school student population by setting up a REMIND account for individual direct contact. In addition, email, google classroom and Zoom were platforms offered for student contact. Groups that were in place before the pandemic were continuously offered, as well as an open group for students experiencing anxiety due to COVID-19 and distance learning. Other continued social work services rendered were those in IEPs as prescribed, as well as community contacts with Pike County Children and Youth, Intermediate Unit 19 and Friendship House.

#### **DVHS**

- The DVHS HPE department welcomed Ms. Mikaela Smith to the teaching staff in February. Transitioning from a daily substitute, Ms. Smith taught Health 9 and PE 11 courses during the second semester.
- Chief Moglia and Officer Gaughan continue to assist in teaching the drug and violence prevention portion of the Health 9 classes using the "Too Good for Drugs and Violence" curriculum. This is an interactive and hands on curriculum that uses avariety of learning strategies to teach topics such as assertive behavior, communication skills, relationship building, refusal skills, decision making skills and conflict resolution skills. They also teach lessons in Driver's Education on DUI, and in Health 11 and Health 12 on cyber safety, drug and alcohol prevention, and healthy relationships.
- The fall semester Athletic Training Classes took a field trip to tour the Kings College sports medicine facilities. Students participated in activities demonstrating the science behind lower and upper extremity taping, ankle injury prevention programs, modalities for healing, dual-energy x-ray absorptiometry for bone density, and tensiomygraphy for muscle function.
- The DV seniors are ready to save lives! Would you know what to do in a cardiac, breathing or first aid emergency? The right answer could help to save a life. With a hands-on approach to learning, the Health 12 curriculum gives our seniors the skills to save a life!
- The PE department created distance learning lessons that included fitness trackers,
   YouTube videos, virtual challenges, and content using EdPuzzle and Google Classroom.
- The DVHS physical education department continues to offer the following elective courses: Physical Fitness and Training, Sports Officiating, and

Leadership and Adventure Education. # Mathematics Department Christine Marcial, Dept. Chair

#### **Highlights:**

#### 2020 Media and Design Competition

On March 10th, students from DV participated in the 2020 PA Media and Design Competition held at Northampton Community College in Bethlehem, PA.

The team consisting of John Lockwood, Jess Rhule and Abby Vogel placed 1st in the Programming event. They were asked to write an educational application that could help students in schools. The team wrote an app that would help students to study for the Keystone Biology exam.



The team consisting of Jarett Baka and Rhyann Glenn placed 2nd in the Graphic Design and Logo event. They designed a PA Media and Design logo and presented it using a brochure and coffee mug.



Stevie Hamilton placed 2nd in the 3D printing event. She was asked to create an environmentally friendly device for the school that would solve a problem/issue. She designed and 3D printed a door stopper that would help protect students during a

school shooting.



#### **Math Peer Tutoring Program**

Under the supervision of math teachers, tutoring was primarily provided by students who volunteered their time after school each Wednesday to serve as math tutors in any math course, including Calculus and AP Statistics (a special thank you to Kevin DeVizia for his time and effort in providing extra help in AP Statistics). As the program ended, Dominic Dijan received the "Math Tutor of the Year" award for his commitment and dedication to the program.



# Algebra Keystone: After-school remediation program

From September to December students not yet proficient on the Keystone Algebra exam were invited to attend an afterschool program to review and reinforce Algebra topics in order to prepare them to retake the Keystone test in December. The program is student driven and individualized by using students' CDT results and past testing results from previous Keystone exams. Using the Edulastic and Khan Academy websites, students completed practice from the six different anchors. During each session two teachers were available to answer questions and reteach topics. Students worked at their own pace on topics in which they were deficient. State anchors were

reviewed, as well as test taking strategies. During each session constructed response questions were reviewed as this is an area where many of the student's struggle. Laurie Osczepinski supervised the program.

#### **ACM Code Jam**

On November 1, Computer Programming Club and AP Computer Science A/Principles students participated in the ACM Code Jam at the Colonial Intermediate Unit 20 in Easton, PA. The two teams consisted of Jonathan Baker, Mikayla Courtright, Evan Dong, Bergen Dove, Evie Hupka, Daniel Scheuermann and Aodhan Young. Although the results were only released for the top three teams, the two teams attempted to complete ten extremely difficult coding programs and were only given two hours to do so.



#### Mu Alpha Theta

The Delaware Valley High School Mu Alpha Theta Math Honor Society members participated in the Pennsylvania Math League Competition, which consisted of a series of 6 contests administered monthly from October through March.

Mu Alpha Theta finished the Pennsylvania Math League Competition in 28th place in the state and 2nd place in our region. 50 students (grades 9-12, except one 8th grader) participated in the American Mathematics Contest. The top scorers for the AMC-12 were Timothy Lloyd, Darius Bermudez, and Evan Dong, while the top scorers for the AMC-10 were Nixon Kameen (8th grade), Gabrielle Courtright, and Miles Nienstad.

#### **Annual Emmaus Programming Competition**

On February 20th, two DV teams participated in the 5th Annual Emmaus Programming Competition at Emmaus High School in Emmaus, PA. The two teams consisted of Jonathan Baker, Mikayla Courtright, Joby Curtin, Evan Dong, Bergen Dove, Evie Hupka, Daniel Scheuermann and Aodhan Young. This competition is unlike any other event the programming students attend because students from Emmaus's programming club organized, wrote and judged the competition (with little help from their advisers). The two teams were extremely competitive and represented DV well, managing to complete extremely difficult coding programs in just only three hours. Although the

results were only formally released for the top three teams, within the final minutes of the contest, the leaderboard showed Team 1 in 6th place out of 18 teams.



#### Women in STEM

On September 17th, DVSD took over forty girls (8th grade to 12th grade students) to the 5<sup>th</sup> Annual Women in STEM Symposium at Woodloch Pines Resorts in Hawley, PA (27 of the students were high school girls!). The symposium allowed DV students to connect with representatives from local colleges and companies to promote higher educational opportunities for girls in STEM fields. Student participants were able to meet with and listen to women that work in fields ranging from engineering to biomedical, as well as digital electronics and environmental professions. Students did not only get to speak with the female professionals, but they were able to visit over 10 stations that each had a specific hands-on component. Some hands-on activities included programming robots, 3D printing, veterinary medicine, solar panels, physics, etc.



#### The Math Lab

The Math Lab is open to students all seven periods of the day, including all lunches. The math lab is staffed by teachers each period and is a place for students to catch up on missed work, get additional tutoring or take an exam. This year the math lab serviced over 1500 students. One-third of the students came during their lunch time to get extra help and tutoring.

#### Women in Science/Math

On December 7, two teams consisting of Kaleigh Kuddar, Laura Marquez, Abigail Vogel, Alice Cauchi, McKenzie Panetta, and Hannah Williams competed in the 17th Annual Women of Science Competition held at Bedford High School in Bedford, Massachusetts. The competition consisted of four different events that tested their science knowledge. Both teams represented DV well and came in the top third overall. The team consisting of Kaleigh, Laura and Abby came in first place in the premade engineering event. They were able to build a trebuchet that launched the furthest out of all the teams. The team consisting of Alice, Kenzie and Hannah came in third place for the mystery architecture event, where they had to use their critical thinking and problem solving skills to calculate and determine the mass of given objects. The other two events focused more on science trivia and content knowledge, allowing the girls to show off what they know.





#### **MathCon National Contest**



- There were over seventy (70) performances given by the student musicians of the whole school district throughout the entire school year!
- Three students earned chairs in the **PMEA All-State Festival**, which, unfortunately was cancelled -Two in Concert Band, and One in Orchestra.
- Over 100 students excellently represented DV at 21 festivals and special events this year!
- 7 students earned the privilege of participating in **District 10 ensembles** at the high school level.
- 4 Students were selected to represent DVHS at PMEA Regional music festivals.
- **DVHS Drama Club** was in the midst of preparing "Once Upon a Mattress" for performance in the spring when the pandemic shut us down.
- The DVHS Jazz Band was looking forward to hosting our own Jazz Festival with a guest artist/educator, and was looking forward to attending the first ever Jazz Festival at Wilson Area High School.
- For the seventh year in a row, DV has been recognized by the National Association of Music Merchants as being one of the Best Communities for Music Education, 2020.
- Our **Marching Band** continued with a successful 6<sup>th</sup> season, continuing to participate in football games and compete in competitions.
- Our Guitar program continues to reach many students who would not otherwise be involved in music at DVHS.
- DVHS chamber Choir was invited to perform at the Essence 2 Ltd. High School Choral Invitational in February, held in State College, PA.
- DDMS hosted the annual Middle Grades Music and Art Festival in February.
- DVMS hosted the PMEA District 10 Elementary Band and Orchestra Festival in January.
- DVHS hosted the Pike/Monroe County Chorus in November.

## Reading

## Kathy Farley, Dept. Chair

#### **Dingman-Delaware Primary School (DDPS)**

The 2019-2020 school year was off to a wonderful start. Many students participated in our "Passport to Reading Adventures" summer reading incentive. Those that did received a gift certificate to McDonalds and a grand prize winner also won an Amazon Fire tablet.

In October, we had our fall parent engagement meeting. Parents were given information about our Title I reading program and fun ways to work with their children at home. Each family in attendance received a fun write and wipe board to practice spelling words and writing sentences. Many parents attended and it was a huge success.

In December, due to our long winter break, the reading team sponsored a reading incentive. The goal was to encourage students to continue to read over break. Each student received a bingo card with fun reading activities in each square. After completing activities and getting bingo on the card, students returned their bingo card and received a cute animal lanyard and a certificate of participation.

In January, the DDPS Reading Team planned a fun school wide scavenger hunt. Each class found and read clues throughout the school building. At each location, they collected letters and a snowman item. When finished, students returned to their classroom to unscramble the letters and discovered that they would be making one of their classmates into a snowman. They also had a classroom sight word snowball toss. To help celebrate the day, the reading team also dressed like snowmen. It was a fun, snowy day at DDPS!

At the end of March, we began online learning. We provided all students throughout the district in Kindergarten and First Grade DVOG online learning through Google Classroom. Video lessons included card pack and blending drill, phonemic awareness activities, new learning, and all of the other components of a typical DVOG lesson. We also provided online lessons for some special education students and their teachers. Many students participated and submitted work online, while others kept their work in a folder. Parents worked hard with their children, and we received many compliments and positive feedback from them. It was rewarding to know that students were working from home and to see the great work that they submitted.











#### **Delaware Valley Elementary School (DVES)**

Delaware Valley Elementary School's Title 1 reading program used a garden theme this year to support and encourage reading at our school. Our classrooms and bulletin boards promoted reading, positive attitudes, and the Seven Habits through themed displays. Our parent involvement meetings and reading incentives included many

activities.



In September, we held our Fall Title 1 Parent Involvement Meeting to explain the programs we use with our Title 1 students. We offered many tips and suggestions for parents to use at home to help their children with reading and homework.

As a team we wanted to promote more participation with the Reading Counts program. Our groups visited the library to discuss Lexile scores and how to select appropriate books. We guided our students to choose books they could read independently for RC, as that readability is connected to the test questions. Students who earned all of their Reading Count points for the second marking period were treated to ice cream





In March DVES was motivated to read and write during our *Read Across America* week-long celebration. Many Dr. Seuss inspired activities including guessing contests, scavenger hunts, trivia and character impressions were offered. Students were encouraged to read and learn more about Dr. Seuss and his stories.





And then our world changed as our schools were shuttered due to Covid-19. DVES reading team posted resources in a Google Classroom for third grade teachers across the district to use with their online instruction. We also created classrooms for our own students to provide weekly activities involving fluency, reading comprehension, and writing. These assignments were short but allowed us to stay in communication with our students. During this time as we learned so many new avenues of technology, we decided to create a website for our reading department. This site now includes many resources for parents to provide support with their child's education. It includes activities parents can do at home, along with educational websites to provide practice of various reading skills. Since we were unable to hold a spring parent meeting, we will be directing our parents to this website for information to continue summer reading. There are specific pages with our summer reading incentive and summer journal writing. All of this information will be shared in a newsletter to be sent home with purchased materials to promote parent engagement over the next few months.

#### **Shohola Elementary School (SES)**

It's been an unusual school year at Shohola Elementary School! There were many new adventures; this was the first year that SES was officially a Title One school. Throw distance learning into the mix, and we had our work cut out for us!

To start the school year, we rewarded our students who completed our summer reading challenge. Our challenge was a menu of activities that included authentic reading and writing. Students enjoyed a fun lunch with games.

100 Book Club and Millionaire Club continued for the 2019-2020 school year. These clubs encouraged our students to read more books on their reading level. The goal for kindergarten and first grade students was to read 100 books, while students in grades 2-5 were challenged to read 1,000,000 words in one school year. Many students continued to read at home during distance learning in an effort to meet these reading goals. Pictures were posted to the SES Facebook page with students reading their

favorite books. We had a primary student who read 300 books, and an elementary student who exceeded 6,000,000 words.

For Read Across America Week, students and teachers dressed up as their favorite book characters and read their favorite Dr. Seuss tales. Each day of the week, an excerpt of a book was read over the loudspeaker. Dr. Bell, Dr. Schaffer, Mrs. McNeely, Mr. Weston, and Mrs. Maida surprised our students as guest readers.



The switch to distance learning was "our final frontier" for the reading department and our students for this year. We created Google Classrooms to support our Title One students. Mrs. Kim provided Zoom meetings and challenging tasks that focused on keeping a connection. Mrs. Cottone and Mrs. Ramella provided 2nd grade DVOG prerecorded videos from our kitchen for the classroom teachers districtwide. We worked closely with our teachers to support parents and students alike. Our knowledge about technology has grown tremendously, and we will use it in our teaching moving forward. We have become creative in the ways that we connect with our students.



#### **Dingman-Delaware Elementary School (DDES)**

This year our amazing readers were able to join their parents in a Book to Movie Open House. The Open House was a chance for parents to learn what their child will be doing in their Title I program. We also introduced parents to resources and activities to help their children, and many books that have been made into movies to encourage reading at home. The students earned a movie night celebration for reading! Aside from the incentives and celebrations individually in each reading class, all Title I students were able to celebrate, "Camp Read A lot." Students were given a goal to read as much as they can over winter break. For students who met and/or beat their goal, we had a Camping Cookout at school -Hot Dogs, Burgers, Movies and Smore's to celebrate!!! Students also participated in a Scholastic read-a-thon. Students were encouraged to read books, track their minutes, and earn badges along the way!













#### **Dingman-Delaware Middle School (DDMS)**

2019-2020 was the first year the Middle School Literacy revised curriculum was taught to 7th and 8th grade students. The revised MSL curriculum supports the English Language Arts 7 curriculum. It remediates, reinforces, and enriches reading and ELA skills. The MSL curriculum was written to be flexible enough to follow the skills taught in ELA by marking period, but to also include resources within a wide range of reading levels in order to meet students' reading instructional needs. The curriculum also includes some higher-level complex text to ensure students are exposed to on-level material with teacher support and guidance in order to prepare for state standardized testing.

There was no better feeling than when a student remarked, "We are doing this in ELA." That was the whole purpose of revising the curriculum in; to support our students to become better readers and to allow students to connect what they are learning to other classes and the outside world.

Mrs. Caldwell had the opportunity to push into 6th, 7th, and 8th grade ELA classes this year. She was able to work with small groups of students to offer support or remediation with ELA skills or reading intervention. She was also able to co-teach and integrate reading comprehension strategies and close reading skills into the ELA curriculum and model the writing process with the ELA teacher throughout the school year. Mrs. Caldwell also had the opportunity to push into a 6th grade science classroom. It was the perfect opportunity to model reading comprehension in the content area with the new science textbook for students. She was able to co-teach, model think-alouds, find key information easily, take notes, and answer questions thoroughly and accurately.





#### **Delaware Valley Middle School (DVMS)**

Students in Mrs. Masker's Literacy class had the benefit of small class sizes and targeted instruction so that they could focus their effort on improving skills throughout the year. They read high interest, differentiated materials from a wide range of sources that mirrored the skills from the 7th grade English Language Arts curriculum. They learned how to carefully close read and annotate text, respond to text dependent questions, analyze writing prompts and develop text dependent analysis in response to a writing prompt. They also wrote creatively to strengthen their written expression.

When students were asked what was the most important skill they learned in class this year, they responded:

- "To be a better reader and writer."
- "To read and to never give up."
- "To give full attention to reading."
- "Learned how to really respond to a TDA and look for key details in the text."
- "To read the story multiple times, annotate, and analyze the questions before answering them."

After reading the short story "All Summer in A Day, the students created 'found poems' from words in the text to summarize important story elements.



In partnership with student teacher Stephanie Osczepinski, a book tasting opportunity was created for students to sample different titles and genres on Read Across America Day.





Mrs. Masker had many opportunities to work with individual students, as well as small groups throughout the year. One student, who at first struggled with the transition to online learning, became an online superstar after seeking help and participating in a video help session. He sent this via email and it truly warmed Mrs. Masker's heart!

#### **Delaware Valley High School (DVHS)**

While Mrs. Newman's Critical Reading 11 class read the novel, *Don't Get Caught* by Kurt Dinan, students completed a characterization activity. This project engaged students and was fun! It was a great way to use differentiation and alternately assess students. Each student selected a character from the novel. Next, they had to determine six important character traits depicted in the novel. Students used textual evidence to support the character traits. Students were assigned the task of sketching a life-sized rendition of their characters, considering their styles and personalities. Then, on the life-sized rendition, students wrote six-character traits about their character, with supporting evidence from the novel. To complete the project, students displayed their projects around the room and presented their findings to the class.





Mrs. Farley pushed into Mrs. Shatt's Concepts 11 English class. The class read "The Crucible," and as a review, Mrs. Farley created "An Escape Room." The students worked in teams to quickly answer the questions that allowed them to "escape" the room. The winning team received certificates, and everyone had a great time and learned a lot.



As Department Chairperson, Mrs. Farley asked the administration to bring in Meg Burke into the district to help our English teachers, reading specialists, and special education students gain a greater understanding of Text Dependence Analysis. Mrs. Farley met Meg while serving on the Pennsylvania Department of Education PSSA Range finding Committee. She was very impressed with Meg's knowledge. Meg asked our teachers what they needed from her, and she came to our district and provided them with that information. We gained a common language and have a consistent understanding of what is required at each grade level. The response to Meg Burke was overwhelmingly positive.





Mrs. Farley was invited to serve on the Keystone Literature Range finding Committee again this year for the Department of Education. It was cancelled due to Covid-19 and the cancellation of the Keystone Literature Exam.

Once we moved to online learning, the reading specialists provided daily Zoom meeting and lessons for our students. They worked very closely with the classroom English teachers to help their students succeed. On June 4, the READ 180 classes in the DV High School held their annual Awards Ceremony for outstanding achievement in the READ 180 classroom. The only difference this year was the event took place on Zoom instead of the usual classroom venue. This year's ceremony, hosted by Mrs. Knash and Mrs. Lemenille, also included a special guest appearance by Dr. Bixby. Students received their awards via email, even if they were not in attendance. Congratulations to all students for their accomplishments!


#### **Competitions and Accolades:**

As always, students were engaged in a variety of different labs, gaining hands-on to understand content in deeper and more meaningful ways.


At DDMS, Mrs. Gregorski's students learned about the dangers of radon and were top winners in the Pennsylvania Radon Contest.





At DVMS, Mrs. Gray's students were engaged in many investigations to investigate features of Earth Science.











#### **DVHS Technology Education: Mechanical Drawing and Design**

# World Languages Gary Cotroneo, Department Chair

#### **Highlights**

- For Hispanic Heritage Month, students in Sra. Strapec's Spanish 1 classes played Latin music every Friday and made a contest out of it. The students played current Latin pop hits from around the world, went to the cafeteria to help fellow students to vote, counted ballets, and made a bulletin board to keep track of the winners. Daddy Yankee and Luis Fonsi's *Despacito* won by a landslide.
- French 3 classes put on a skit which helped them to support their learning of the past tense. Students took on roles in a mysterious stolen dognapping and created their statements, asked questions/gave answers, listened carefully to the prosecution/defense lawyers and made creative alibis to present to the jury.
- On October 24, 40 Spanish students, accompanied by Mr. Cotroneo and Mr. Leiva-Vazquez, traveled to El Repertorio Español in New York City to see a play entitled En el Tiempo de las Mariposas (In the Time of the Butterflies). This play was inspired by the true story of the three Mirabal sisters who in 1960 were murdered for their part in an underground plot to overthrow the government of the Dominican Republic under the rule of General Rafael Trujillo. The play was conducted entirely in Spanish, which is an effective way to immerse students into the target language. Afterwards, the students were introduced to the actors in the play and encouraged to ask questions about what they saw. Students already saw the motion picture version starring Selma Hayek and Edward James Olmos and compared and contrasted what they saw on the stage versus the screen.

• AP French students also attended a production of Cirque du Soleil which was broadcast into theaters to explore the AP testing theme of beauty and esthetics.



 French 1 – AP French classes learned about the Paris Catacombs and La Toussaint on November 1st. All classes had a scavenger hunt in the dark to find the tombs of 5 famous French individuals.

 National French week activities at DVMS included cheese tasking, after-school baking, Belgium Waffle luncheon, and a photobooth during all lunches.

French had the opportunity to make "French-ship" bracelets for friends, thank you cards for special teachers/coaches/family members, and participated in voting for their favorite French songs for the week of November 18 - 22. Some students also stayed after school to watch a French movie and to cook quiche or ratatouille with Mrs. Maino.



On November 1 (even though it is celebrated on November 2), students in Mr. Gary Cotroneo's AP Spanish class and one of Mrs. Ross's Intermediate Foods A classes had a cross-curricular culture day pertaining to Day of the Dead, which is known in many countries and cultures as All Souls Day. Mr. Cotroneo's class presented the cultural comparisons and contrasts of the day, complete with altar, while Mrs. Ross's class prepared the food, explained the ingredients in each recipe, and if there was a way to prepare them in a healthier manner.











Art came alive in the Learning Commons for Spanish students! To end 2019, the students took part in various Hispanic art and culture experiences. Students learned about many Spanish artists like Frida Kahlo, Salvador Dalí, Diego Rivera, and Diego Velázquez. One of the activities was to recreate a picture painted by Joan Miró. The original sold for \$11 million dollars at an auction in London. The recreated one will eventually be displayed in the high school. The experience was organized by Sra. Michele Rojas with assistance with the rest of the Spanish teachers.



French 1 – AP French students celebrated with traditional foods and learned about Mardi Gras and where/how it's celebrated (February 25th). French 3 students were treated to a special Mardi Gras celebration in coordination with Mrs. Mercy Ross's 3rd period class. Mrs. Maino's students were responsible for discussion of Mardi Gras and Mrs. Ross's students learned about the cuisine of Mardi Gras/Louisiana and then created a menu of foods which was shared with both classes.







French 4 class was studying the theme of Love/Marriage/Friendship and to finish off the topic, Mrs.
Maino arranged for Chef Niosi's students to create a "croquembouche" cake which is a traditional
French wedding cake make of cream puffs and discussion of a traditional French wedding took place
that day as well.



• This year, students in Mrs. Krasulski's Spanish 2 class were an enthusiastic group of learners. In Spanish 2, students traveled to Florida, Costa Rica, Argentina, Mexico, Puerto Rico and Spain. In each country, students developed grammar and vocabulary skills while exploring the culture including lifestyle, customs, and holidays in each of the studied countries. There was a true sense of community amongst the students. Many were reluctant to engage with others in conversational and collaborative activities at the start of the school year. #### **Highlights:**

- The Friendship House outpatient therapy social workers provided counseling to 80 students across
  the district.
- Step-By-Step continues to partner with us in the primary, elementary, middle and high school Autistic Support classrooms. A total of 24 students are supported through the SASP program by one Board Certified Behavior Analyst, three Master-level clinicians, and five Bachelor-level clinicians.
- Technology continues to play a critical role for our students who require augmentative communication.
   Through the use of iPads, iPods, iPhones, and Chromebooks, students are able to access communication for both social and academic gains.
- Cheryl Nielsen, Educational Consultant and Kelly Adams, Autistic Support teacher conducted numerous professional development trainings for both teachers and instructional assistants.
- The Special Education Department partnered with Pike Autism Support Services to provide two
  parent trainings; Basic ABA for Families and Support Staff and Using an iPad as a Communication
  Device for Non-Verbal Learners. Maria Farrell, Brianne Nolan and Kelly Adams conducted a third
  parent training called Understanding Your Rights of a Parent of a Child with a Disability.
- Our IU-contracted Social Worker provided individual and/or group counseling for 74 students in our Emotional Support programs.
- Speech Therapists took part in two webcasts this year as a part of their continuing professional development. Topics included Treating Speech Sound Disorders 21<sup>st</sup> Century Style and Re-Conceptualizing Service Delivery.
- Of the 59 seniors who graduated this year, eight will be attending a four-year college, twenty-one are attending a two-year college, six are attending a Technical School, twenty-one are entering the workforce, one is considering military service, and two are attending community participation programs and working with a local service provider job coach in the community.
- Twenty-four seniors and twelve underclassmen were found eligible for services through the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation.
- Community Job Trials took place at Amica CrossFit, Belle Reve Senior Living, Center for Developmental Disabilities, Dona Helene Salon, Flagship Cinema, Goodfella's Pizza Italian Restaurant, Haven 4 Heroes, Home Depot, Jeff's Garden Shop, Jem Screen Printing and Embroidery, Key Food, Luhr's True Value, Mt. View Daycare, Pike County Board of Elections, Pike County Finance Department, Pike County Prothonotary Office, Price Chopper, Snips n Tails Groomer, Stewie's Restaurant, The Grille, Tractor Supply Co., and Trinity Pet Store.
- Students participated in job tours at Shopite, Key Food and Weis Markets. Students participated in volunteer opportunities at the Ecumenical Food Pantry, Milford Garden Club, and the American Legion.
- Students had the opportunity to attend self-advocacy presentations through Carbon Monroe Pike
   Mental Health and Developmental Services on two occasions. Professional self-advocates and skilled

- facilitators develop materials and lead the conversations. The Self-Advocacy Power Network for All (SAPNA) project is funded and approved by the PA Office of Developmental Programs (ODP), Department of Human Services. SAPNA is managed by Self Advocates United as 1, Inc.
- Transition Coordinator Laura Butler arranged for college visits for students with disabilities who are seeking post-secondary education. Nine students attended a field trip to Sussex Community College. In coordination with the Career Technology Education program, a total of thirty-three students attended a field trip to Johnson College of Technology. Students had the opportunity to meet with Admissions, Disability Services, and tour each of the campuses.
- The department continues to offer presentations and trainings for students, parents and staff as it relates to transition from high school to post-high school experiences.
  - Seniors, parents, and staff were invited to attend How to Access Accommodations at Post-Secondary School, presentation by Jill Ceasar Boyle, M.Ed., Coordinator of Office of Accessible Services Individualized for Students (OASIS) in October.
  - Parents were invited to a Transition Overview presentation by Laura Butler, Transition Coordinator in October.
  - Parents were invited to a Parent Informational Session about Guardianship in November. The session was facilitated by Mr. Tom Carasiti from Vision for Equality.
  - Students from several classrooms attended an OVR Early Reach Presentation by Brooke Padavan titled Social Media and Employment: What is a Digital Footprint? Early Reach is an outreach initiative intended to promote successful outcomes for youth with disabilities by increasing awareness of the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation services and the benefits of early career planning.
  - Parents were invited to attend a presentation by Adele Bond from Goodwill Keystone in May via a phone conference to learn about work incentives planning for transition aged youth and an overview of Social Security benefits.







Propelled by the generous support of our donors and philanthropic leaders, the DV Foundation, faculty and students impact society and lives every year.


Thanks to the generosity of our staff, local businesses, alumni and friends, the Foundation is stronger than ever. In the fiscal year 2019, the Foundation raised nearly \$10,000. We are extremely grateful for our alumni, friends, faculty and businesses who have actively participated in helping the Foundation as best as one could. The Foundation relies on donations which were considerable reduced during the world-wide pandemic, COVID-19.

However, this past year, the Foundation was still able to provide four \$1,000 scholarships to graduating seniors, Josh Balcarcel, Dominic Puglisi, Tara Stevenson and Virginia Yost.

The Foundation was able to raise \$7,000 in advertising revenue on the stadium scoreboard located in the Warrior Stadium and funds for the 2019-2020. These funds came from two vendors who had paid in advance of the school year.

Finally, the Foundation was successful in helping raise funds for the high school Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) team and Scholastic Bowl team.
