

How to Succeed in School



Success in school means more than "being smart"

The teacher handed back your math tests. As usual, Maria got an A. As usual, you didn't.


After class, you stay a minute to complain. "It's not fair," you say to your teacher. "I wish I were smart in math like Maria is." Your teacher's answer surprises you. "Maria is smart," she says. "She's smart enough to listen in class. She's smart enough to do her homework every day. She's smart enough to review for tests. And she's smart enough to ask for help when she needs it. There's no reason on earth why you couldn't be that smart, too."

Your teacher is right. The most successful students are those who do smart things. You can learn the secrets those "smart" kids already know, so you can be a smart student, too.

No one is born knowing the slope intercept form, or knowing that the subject of a sentence will never be inside of a prepositional phrase. It takes practice to learn those things and "be smart".







Here are a few things you can do to "be smart"

- 1. **Get organized-** Have a folder and notebook for each class. Make sure all papers for each class are put in their correct folder. And keep it clean. Don't add unneeded papers to your binder.
- 2. Write your homework down- In that binder have a place to write down your homework each day. Even if you don't have homework, write *no homework*.
- 3. Ask questions- if you don't understand an assignment or what's expected of you, ask the teacher. Don't wait until the homework that night, or the day of the test to say you don't understand something.
- 4. **Bring all your materials to class-** It takes no knowledge or ability to have a pencil and your book and notebook for class. Make sure to have your stuff for class.
- 5. Charge your Chromebook at night- That way you don't have worry about carrying your charger around all day or having a dead Chromebook. Former DDMS student Jake Wolak told me once, he charges his Chromebook at night, and it stays charged all day, even when he uses it a lot during the school day.
- 6. Review the stuff you learned- Even if your teacher doesn't say to study, review what you learned in each class period. Think about what you did in class that day, and try to remember what you learned or what the topic of the lesson was about.
