## District Wide Academic Achievements

- Eighty seven teachers and administrators were trained in the 7 Habits of Highly Effective People in June. Fifteen teachers and administrators attended additional sessions training to become certified trainers. Another 130 staff members were trained in August by our newly certified staff.
- Throughout the year, and during Summer Academy, a total of 68 Professional Development offerings were provided for the staff, district wide. These sessions encompassed topics in Special Education, Curriculum, Common Core Standards, Instructional Strategies, Data Collection, Analyzing Assessment Data, Technology Use and Integration, Safety, Behavior Management, CPR/AED, Bullying Prevention, PSSA and Keystone Exam Preparation.
- The curriculum writing process and template was revised to reflect the adoption of Common Core Standards, Keystone Exams, and next generation tests. Professional Development was required and provided for all teachers prior to writing and revising curriculum. A total of ninety-eight curricula were revised across the K-12 disciplines.
- A Delaware Valley Cyber Academy (DVCA) informational night for prospective parents and students was held. The decision was made to partner with Pearson Connections Learning and open the DVCA for the 2013-2014 school year. To date, 37 students have registered to attend.
- The administrators presented an overview of the new Teacher Evaluation Framework to the staff, district wide. This framework is based upon Charlotte Danielson's The Framework for Teaching Evaluation Instrument. Training and planning sessions were held in the spring and summer. The Delaware Valley School District Teacher Evaluation Plan: Differentiated Supervision Model will be implemented in the 2013-2014 school year.
- Kinder Morgan, in support of the Delaware Valley Career and Technical Education program, donated a total of $\$ 25,000$ for a possible Welding Program of Study. In addition, Kinder Morgan provided grants for technology throughout the district totaling $\$ 21,575$.
- Federal Perkins Grant funding was received in the amount of $\$ 51,104$, for the first time since 2007. A successful compliance monitoring was achieved for the 2012-2013 Perkins Grant.
- The Delaware Valley School District 2013-2016 Comprehensive Plan was created, reviewed, and then approved by the Pennsylvania Department of Education. This plan encompasses Chapter 4: Academic Standards and Assessment, Chapter 12: Student Services, Chapter 16: Special Education for Gifted Students, Chapter 49: Certification of Professional Personnel requirements, and satisfies the requirement for a Technology Plan.
- Winter and Spring Keystone Exams were administered in the high school and middle schools in grades 8-11. Total Keystone Exams administered district wide were: 506 Literature, 757 Algebra 1, and 596 Biology.
- Guides4 Learning, an online tool designed to assist teachers in developing lesson guides and lesson plans while providing a method for integrating the PA Common Core State Standards, was implemented for the Career and Technology Education /Vo-Tech Department.
- The Pennsylvania Electronic Student Transcripts and Records System (PA eSTARS), a statewide network that enables Commonwealth schools to quickly and securely exchange student records and transcripts, was implemented in the high school.
- The High School Engineering program was expanded to include a fourth year Capstone course.
- An Elementary Student Assistance Program (SAP) was initiated. Professional staff were trained at no cost to the school district through grant funding. We are now providing SAP in conjunction with the Instructional Support Teams (IST) in the primary and elementary buildings.
- Elementary math and reading Curriculum Writing/Common Core workshops were held. Over the four days, 38 K- 5 district wide teachers participated. Dr. Jane Wilburne, a mathematics professor from Penn State University, facilitated the math workshop and two members of the Intermediate Unit 20 Curriculum Department co-facilitated the reading workshop.
- Two teams of teachers worked together to develop common standards-based mathematics unit assessments for grades 4 and 5 . These assessments were implemented during the 2012-13 school year. The assessments allowed teachers
to evaluate students' progress toward learning outcomes and helped to develop consistency across buildings, classrooms, and grade levels.
- Throughout the year, our grade level teams and special area teachers met to review current grading practices and to design grading practices that are parent/student friendly. As a result of these planning meetings, our teams developed a new kindergarten report card based upon the PA Common Core. Also, a new grading scale, which is consistent for grades $1-5$, was adopted. Our special area teachers also made a few modifications to the grades for those subjects (Health, Physical Education, Art, and Music). The new grading system will be implemented this fall.
- During the fall, we began evaluating various $\mathrm{K}-5$ science programs. Two programs were selected for more in depth analysis. Educational specialists conducted presentations to the teachers regarding these science programs. Teachers were then asked to complete the TPECs. The teachers selected the FOSS Science program. We are also obtaining Cross Walk materials from the McGraw Hill - A Closer Look (our 4-5 text series) to link the two programs.
- The Arts in Education Project was an exciting program that took place this spring. Working with Jeffrey Stocker, the Director of the American Readers Theatre (ART), we designed a series of lessons, activities and projects focused on the E.B. White novel, Charlotte's Web. It was a wonderful experience for our 4th grade students. We engaged experts from our community, interviewed EB White's niece, and conducted a non-print text analysis with a renowned film expert. This project is funded through the EITC and we hope to continue our partnership with ART.
- The fifth grade students and faculty were able to resume the State Capital field trip this spring. We worked closely with State Representative Mike Peifer and Rosemary Brown's offices to arrange this trip for our students. The trip included a tour of the beautiful capitol building, a visit to the State Museum and a planetarium show. This program provides rich educational experiences for our students. It was wonderful to be able to offer this program to our students.

## DELAWARE VALLEY HIGH SCHOOL

- The College Board announced that based on AP scores, DVHS had 126 AP scholars.

- Newsweek magazine named DVHS as one of "America's Best High Schools."
- US News and World Report ranked DVHS among the nation's best high schools.
- The Washington Post recognized DVHS as one of "America's Most Challenging High Schools."
- The Warrior mascot was officially unveiled. Our Warrior made his first appearance at freshman orientation on August 21, 2012, and was officially recognized and introduced at the home football game vs. Parkland. The Warrior attended many events throughout the district throughout the school year.

- The $12^{\text {th }}$ annual United Way Day of Caring was held on Saturday, September 15, 2012. Nearly 300 DV students took part in this great community service event.
- Our annual Veterans dinner was held on November 8, 2012. More than 160 veterans and their guests were treated to a fine dinner. Entertainment was provided by our outstanding students in the music department.
- On November 29, 2012, DVHS held its annual National Honor Society induction program. Over 90 new students were inducted during the ceremony which was followed by a nice reception in the cafeteria

- The annual Jingle Ball dance took place on November 30, 2012. There were 240 toys collected and $\$ 500$ in cash. All proceeds went to the Toys for Tots program.
- During the half day on December 21, 2012, DVHS held a question and answer session for seniors who applied to college. Approximately 270 seniors were invited to the cafeteria for an hour long session with 28 recent DV graduates that are enrolled in colleges and universities.
- The following juniors were recognized as National Merit Scholar honors as their PSAT scores are among the top $1 \%$ or $2 \%$ in the nation: Heather Reitmeyer, Daniel Reno, Maisha Shamim, Hannah Thompson, Eric Winkler, Josiah DeVizia, Dencil Wilmot, and Krystina Busacco. Cathy Li, a sophomore, also scored among the top $1 \%$ in the nation.

- The following list of students was recognized as Commended Students for the 2013 National Merit Scholar Program: Emily Belsterling, Dimitrios Hrissohoidis,

Lance Larsen, Morganne Mallon, Victor Naturale, Jordan Trujillo, and Adrian Zebrowski. These students were among 34,000 commended students from across the country and are recognized for their exceptional academic performance on the PSAT. In addition, DVHS had two students named as finalists in the 2013 Competition for National Achievement Scholarships: Audrey Djiya and Ramonda Giddings. This program honors academically talented African American high school students.

## Additional DVHS Highlights 2012-2013:

- From the scholastic art awards, DVHS had 6 seniors earn Gold Key Awards and 1 Gold Key Portfolio.
- World Languages produced a first place winner in the Northeast Region National French Contest, a $9^{\text {th }}$ place at the National level, and a $4^{\text {th }}$ place in the National Spanish Contest.
- Our Career Tech Program recorded 22 advanced scores on the NOCTI exams.
- Two students were accepted into the Air Force Academy and one was accepted into the Naval Academy.
- We had 24 students from the class of 2013 that will be serving our country (3 Air Force, 1 Army, 13 Navy, 2 National Guard, and 5 Marines).
- The achievements of the Class of 2013 have led to the acceptances to the following colleges: Dartmouth, Williams College, Yale, Wake Forest, University of Virginia, Vassar, Vanderbilt, University of Delaware, University of Maryland, University of Arizona, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Carnegie Mellon, Boston University, Bucknell, Johns Hopkins, Embry-Riddle Aeronautical, Culinary Institute of America, and Rochester Institute of Technology.
- Odyssey of the Mind produced one world finalist team (the theatrical team) and finished $9^{\text {th }}$ in the World.

- Our Music Department had another banner year. Jaymarie Santana was selected to participate in the All-State Vocal Jazz Ensemble. Alex Testino was selected as $1^{\text {st }}$ Chair Oboe in the All-State Orchestra.
- Skills USA produced a Silver Medal for Occupational Health and Safety and a Bronze Medal for Industrial Motor Control.
- Danielle Dubee served as a state officer for FBLA (Future Business Leaders of America) for the past two years.
- Our Scholastic Bowl team finished in the top 16 in the Nation.

- $\quad 1^{\text {st }}$ place award in the Pennsylvania Junior Academy of Science.
- Our Student Council President, Dylan Brown, won the United States Senate Youth Program Scholarship.
- The Drama Club once again dazzled our school community with their production of Beauty and the Beast.
- Student Council organized and created a music video called a Lip-dub. It showcased all the activities that DVHS has to offer students.

## Dingman-Delaware Middle School James Mitchell, Principal

- The Wyland Clean Water Mobile Lab arrived from California and visited the Dingman-Delaware Middle School on Wednesday, September 19, 2012, the seventh-grade science classes at DDMS took part in an exciting hands-on/minds-on mobile laboratory with a variety of simulations dealing with water conservation and aquatic life.
- The Dingman-Delaware Middle School held its annual "Career Day" on Friday, October 19, 2012. The afternoon started with a luncheon for all presenters and their host teachers. Our guest speakers represented a variety of careers, including our very own superintendent, Mr. John Bell, who presented educational career opportunities. Eighth-grade students were placed into small groups and had the opportunity to meet with five speakers to learn about different careers. The day was a huge success due to all the help and support from the community, faculty, and staff.
- Our PTA was gracious enough to sponsor Cary Trivanovich and his "Choose Character Over Bullying" performance/message to the Middle School on Tuesday, November 6th. Mr. Trivanovich is billed as "America's Leader in AntiBullying Assemblies". He is a performer, conference speaker, theatre director and humorist, noted for his pantomime. He was able to captivate the entire auditorium within seconds of introducing himself with his voice and more importantly with his unique talent. Within less than two minutes he had gained their undivided attention with his comic pantomime routine and he would continue to use his talent as his ticket to deliver an outstanding message about character, bullying and even their own existence.
- The Dingman-Delaware Middle School hosted the twentieth annual "Senior Citizen Dinner Theatre" on Friday, November 9, 2012. Over two hundred and thirty senior citizens enjoyed a complete pasta dinner with dessert, refreshments, and door prizes. Many students from Dingman-Delaware Middle School helped in setting up, escorting, and waiting tables throughout the evening. The night was a great success! On November 9 and 10, 2012, the Dingman-Delaware Middle School Drama Club presented the fun-filled musical "Little Mermaid, Jr." for the senior citizens and general public. The sixty-five students who performed in the show and were part of the set crew did an outstanding job. The show was enjoyed by all.
- The Dingman-Delaware Middle School honored our students' grandparents and great-grandparents on the morning of Wednesday, November 21, 2012. Students invited their grandparents to be our guests for a brief social in the cafeteria provided by our Parent/Teacher Association and participate in our classes throughout the building. Students were asked to introduce their
grandparents to their class and invite grandparents to observe, share a story, or participate in the day's lesson.

- During the first marking period of this school year, remediation assignments utilizing Performance Tracker and Study Island were created for $6^{\text {th }}$ through $8^{\text {th }}$ grade students in the Mathematics focus groups at Dingman-Delaware Middle School. These assignments were created specifically for each student and drill down from $7^{\text {th }}$ through $4^{\text {th }}$ grade in those anchors in which students scored Basic or Below Basic on last year's Mathematics PSSA's. Students have the capability to access these assignments during study hall, mathematics tutoring, lunch tutoring, and also from home provided they have Internet access. These assignments are meant to "fill in the gaps" in those areas in which students scored Basic or Below Basic last year; this remediation should help to improve student performance on the upcoming Mathematics PSSA's in the spring of 2013, as well as helping students to gain a greater understanding of current concepts being covered in the Mathematics curriculum. Additionally, in-service classes were offered for middle and elementary teachers on how to create these assignments for their individual students to help improve not only focus group student performance but the performance of all other students as well.
- The DDMS Theatre Club's production of "The Mystery of the Minisink Monster" was a great success! The Country Western music was performed with outstanding energy and enthusiasm by the 45 middle school members of the cast on Friday, April 19 and Saturday, April 20. The plot revolves around a mysterious Monster that is haunting the Minisink Dude Ranch, but there is a small group of inquisitive students who unravel the mystery. All the students put forth a very impressive effort and the audience was thrilled as they laughed and clapped their way through two acts. Even the intermission was entertaining when the Pit Band played a series of current western and rock songs for the enjoyment of all. The Technical Crew, Stage Crew, Set Crew, and Costumers comprised another 15 students from both the Dingman-Delaware Middle School and the Delaware Valley High School. These students worked very hard behind the scenes building sets and props, arranging lights, and creating special effects.
- On Monday, April 29, 2013, the sixth-grade students went on a field trip to the Pocono Environmental Education Center (PEEC) through a generous grant provided by the Dime Bank. Students had the opportunity to participate in two different environmental activity sessions (morning and afternoon) which included pond ecology, stream ecology, forest ecology, wildlife study, scenic gorge hike, soil study, or habitat study. The day was filled with fun and learning!
- The Pike County Bar Association members visited the Dingman Delaware Middle School on May $1^{\text {st }}$ in celebration of Law Day. Law Day Chairpersons Attorney Shannon Muir and Attorney Elizabeth Burton created a fun and educational program for the 219 sixth grade students. As part of the program, attorney volunteers referred to the "Equal Protection Clause" of the $14^{\text {th }}$ Amendment of the Constitution. Students were supplied with "Constitution booklets" and pens in further celebration of Law Day. Attorneys discussed this year's theme of "equality under the law." Students discussed situations where groups of people have been treated unfairly or discriminated against based upon race, gender, religion or otherwise. The attorneys discussed the Constitution, its Amendments, statutes and case law. Students also learned about the role of attorneys and judges.
- The Dingman-Delaware Middle School averaged 81\% student participation in some type of club or activity throughout the 2012-2013 school year. The new clubs introduced this school year included pen crafting, ecology, jigsaw puzzle, glee, RYOT (Rallying Youth Organization Together Against Violence), and WTSS (We the Strong Survive) which is an Alateen support group.

- DV Warrior visited the Primary School in September to meet our students. Students lined the halls to cheer and welcome the Warrior.

## Business

Maura Angle, Chair

## Highlights:

- Business/Marketing class: This is the third year of the class and four students have completed all three levels. The third level students had an opportunity to complete a five-week internship at local businesses in the area they wanted to pursue for the careers. Carl Will worked in a management position in Wal-Mart, Danielle DuBee and Nick Ottinger worked at KKPR Marketing and Danielle Azzollini worked at Myer and Meyer Accounting firm. Students in the class also received college credits from Keystone College and Luzerne County Community College. All students in the program gained hands-on experience by completing work for local businesses and school projects. The students worked for OMG, It' Not Gluten Free Bakery, Chant Realty, KKRP Marketing, DVHS Honor Society, DVSD Golf Tournament, DVHS 5K Run, DVSD Hall of Fame and the DVMS school play. The students utilized equipment for their projects: photocopier, scanner, laminator, various computer programs and the poster maker.
- Cooperative Education class: This year the cooperative education class had the opportunity to gain classroom instruction related to employability skills, job retention and advancement. The students met three times a week and completed work modules on topics related to the world of work. The students also prepared resumes, cover letters, applied for jobs and completed college applications and forms.
- Desktop Publishing class: the students created programs and cards for various event and designed $t$-shirts and bags for Earth Day.
- Personal Budgeting and Finance Class: Students who participate in the The Stock Market Game ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ program learn more than investing. As they progress, they learn core academic concepts and skills that can help them succeed in the classroom - and in life.

Starting with a virtual cash account of $\$ 100,000$, students strive to create the best-performing portfolio using a live trading simulation. They work together in teams, practicing leadership, organization, negotiation, and cooperation as they compete for the top spot. The setup is engaging, and the learning is a natural part of the experience.

In building a portfolio, students research and evaluate stocks, and make decisions based on what they've learned. Teams trade common stocks and mutual funds from the NYSE and NASDAQ exchanges; earn interest on cash balances; pay interest if buying on margin and pay a commission on all trades.

To determine why certain stocks perform the way they do, or why the broader market has moved up or down, they need to understand how the economy works, and to calculate their returns they need to do the math.

- Personal Budgeting \& Finance: InvestWrite, an innovative national writing competition, produced by The Stock Market Game program, adds a critical thinking component to help reinforce concepts learned in the classroom. Every assignment introduces or relates to investment principles linked to The Stock Market Game program. Both teachers and students will have a chance to win gift certificates, laptop computers, trips to New York (middle and high school), and other great prizes.
- Career Exploration - Electronic Career Portfolio: Career portfolios are used to plan, organize and document education, work samples and skills. People use career portfolios to apply to jobs, apply to college or training programs, get a higher salary, show transferable skills, and to track personal development. They are more in-depth than a resume and serve as proof of one's skills, abilities, and potential in the future. A career portfolio should be personal and contain critical information. Items that are included but are not limited to; personal information, college applications, college essay, scholarship applications, scholarship essays, FAFSA forms, resume, cover letter, thank you letter, evaluations, sample work, and awards and acknowledgments.
- Introduction to Business: Financial Plan: Business financial planning is paramount to the success of any business enterprise. This project is designed to teach students the knowledge and skills needed to establish and develop a complete financial plan for a business venture. The financial plan requesting a loan from a financial institution must be economically and financially sound with a realistic time frame. In addition to learning and applying financial business decision-making skills, team participants develop business contacts, implement written and oral skills, and develop familiarity with procedures of financial institutions.
- International Business - Business Plan: Business plans are an effective tool for evaluating, organizing, and selling a new business concept. A well-developed business plan can be a key component of a successful business start-up. This project teaches students an understanding and mastery of the process required to develop and implement a new business venture.
- College Accounting - Manual Accounting Simulation: Accounting simulations are an effective tool for evaluating, organizing, and recording the transactions in a business. A developed accountant can play a key role in overall business decisions. This project teaches students an understanding and mastery of the accounting processes within a business.
- PFEW- PA Free Enterprise Week: Business students can attend the PFEW held in Lycoming College for a week. The students that attend are paired up into teams where they create their own business and also participate in other business related activities and listen to speakers from a variety of businesses. The students attend PFEW for a week in the summer, they have their choice of three weeks are housed in dorm rooms. The students have to pay their own transportation cost but the registration fee is paid for by our local businesses.


## Student Organizations/ Competitions:

The Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA) chapter at DVHS is the largest club in the DVHS. There are 186 active members in the organization and also are the largest of eleven chapters in Region 22 which include schools in Pike, Wayne and Lackawanna counties. The students are very active in community service where the chapter received awards at the local and state levels. Students assist in the HS blood drives, Day of Caring, and serve as guides for Parent/Teacher conferences and Back to School Night. The students also fundraise and contribute a portion of their proceeds to the PA FBLA State Project each year. The state project for 2012-2013 was the Trauma Society. The students participate in three competitions yearly. Students need to qualify at the local level to proceed to the state and national competitions. Events consist of individual, group, performance and state-only events relating to business and technology. This year 65 students qualified to attend the state competition in Hershey, PA. $75 \%$ of the students placed in the top 15 at the state level. Seven students qualified to attend the National competition in Anaheim, CA. At the National Level, the team of Christian Chelak and Tyler Masker placed in the top 15 which is great accomplishment. Danielle DuBee presented a workshop on Membership Recruitment to a large audience that was represented by numerous states. Maura Angle, Advisor, assisted in the workshop.
Danielle DuBee also served as a PA FBLA state officer for two years and served on the National FBLA Board as assistant to the President.

## Highlights

- The English department welcomed Brian Blaum as our administrative leader. Under his tutelage the department has made great strides in Keystone preparation, curriculum revision, common assessments and course alignment. We are already making plans to move the team forward next year.
- After many years of dedicated service, our beloved Kathy Pauling has retired. We are all replaceable, but it is certainly harder to replace some people. Kathy will be missed in many ways.
- Erica DiMarzio spoke at the 2012 Annual Convention for The National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE).She presented during the panel, "FIRE UP WRITING! IDEAS TO SPARK STUDENTS' IMAGINATIONS." An excerpt from the description of this session in the convention's program reads: "The 'mid-teen experience' fires up students' interests in connecting writing and literature, returns creative and narrative writing to test-driven curricula, and results in peer reviewed student anthologies. We illustrate high-interest, multi-modal, and innovative ways to spark students' writing, critical analysis, and publishing through internet memes and other innovative methods. Handouts and time for discussion provided."
- Jackie Weston continued to work as a member of the Lesson Plan Vetting Committee with PDE and was asked to return again this summer to Harrisburg in August sit on the Keystone Item Review Committee.
- Leslie Lordi's Combo 11 class, a regular level English course, was 100\% proficient on the very first administration of the Keystone exam this past winter.


## - Awards and Competitions

- Word War - The ninth and tenth grade annual vocabulary Word War competitions were held on Monday, June 10. The sophomore competition took place in the morning, and the freshman competition took place in the afternoon. Word Warriors were selected from English classes in both grades. The intense competitions included rounds of parts of speech, spelling, definitions, synonyms, and antonyms. The winner of each word war received an award and a celebration for his/her class. Also, the teacher of the winning student took possession of the Word War trophy for the next school year.
- Skyler Drew from Crystal Wummer's class- $1^{\text {st }}$ place at sophomore competition
- Jan "Izzy" Secular from Jackie Weston’s class - $1^{\text {st }}$ place at freshman competition
- Reading Team - In the words of Joseph Brodsky: "There are worse crimes than burning books. One of them is not reading them." The Delaware Valley Reading Teams give the opportunity of encountering new books to students. Each team of approximately ten students is faced with the task of reading 45 books, ranging
from The Great Gatsby to The Scorpio Races, and competing against other schools in a competition sponsored by the Colonial IU. Two teams from Delaware Valley High School participated in the Colonial IU Reading Olympics in April. Ms. DiMarzio's team tied for third place in the competition, winning signed copies of Beauty Queens by Libba Bray. In addition, this was the first year that Delaware Valley school district had middle school teams as well.
- Rotary Club Essay Contest - A number of our students participated in the Milford-Matamoras Rotary Club Essay Contest. Students developed essays in accordance with the following prompt: "An enthusiastic role model can change lives. 'Describe your personal role model and how they influence you to make a difference in your community."' The first-place essay advanced to the regional competition and the top three receive monetary prizes. This year's Rotary Essay Winners were:

- Fifth place: Erin McNeeley
- Journalism Awards - The Student Keystone Press Awards contest recognizes high school and college journalism that provides relevance, integrity and initiative in serving readers. Any student at any public, private or parochial Pennsylvania high school, college or university who has had his or her material published in the school newspaper may enter the contest. The Student Keystone Press award winners were honored at a luncheon on April 10 in Hershey, Pa. The Del.Aware's own Valerie Lannon won 3rd place in the state for her TV review on "Chicago Fire." Also, the Del.Aware staff accepted a 2nd place award in the design and layout category with their centerspread design "Swap the Snacks." This centerspread was designed by DV alumna Aoife Dowd.
- Pike County Courier Children's Edition - This year, four students' book reviews were published in the Pike County Courier's Children's Edition. The books reviewed ranged from perennial favorites such as Stargirl and The Hunger Games to Unbroken, the contemporary classic of adversity and resilience by Laura Hillenbrand. Natalie Ward, Vanessa Paolella, Brittany Mross, and Dalton Hines from DDMS had their reviews published.
- Brown Book Award - This award, which includes an automatic interview at Brown University, is given to the junior with the most highly developed verbal and written communication skills. Elena Eschleman received the award this year.
- English Proficiency Award - This award goes to the strongest senior English student. Department members donate money to give the student a monetary award. This year's award went to Dominique Marcial.
- National PTA Reflections - This competition's theme was "The Magic of a Moment."
- The following seventh grade students from DDMS were winners in the Literature category at the Local Level: Browen Yoncak, Carlos Serrano, Hailey Kormann, Kaiya Destefano, Julia Steele.
- The following seventh grade students from DDMS were winners in the category of Literature on the Council and Regional Level: Browen Yoncak ( $1^{\text {st }}$ place Council, $3^{\text {rd }}$ place Regional) and Carlos Serrano ( $2^{\text {nd }}$ place Council, $2^{\text {nd }}$ place Regional).
- Trips
- Tri-State Film Festival Trip - Certain works of literature transcend time and are as relevant today as they were when they were written; To Kill a Mockingbird in that it speaks directly to the issues of violence, prejudice, and racism in a way that young people can readily understand is certainly one such novel. Approximately 120 sophomores from Delaware Valley High School were fortunate to have the opportunity to attend the 50th anniversary screening of To Kill a Mockingbird and participate in a question and answer session with Mary Badham, the actress who played Scout in the movie.
- Movie Viewing Trip - On Friday, May 24, 149 members of the student body at Delaware Valley High School, comprised of students from AP Language and Composition, AP English Literature and Composition, and Advanced American Literature, enjoyed a field trip to view Baz Luhrmann's modern take on The Great Gatsby at Majestic Cinemas.
- Annual Trip to the Times Herald Record - The Sunday before the senior edition is published, Leslie Lordi takes the seniors on the newspaper staff out for dinner and ice cream and then they head to the printing building of the Record. Once there, the kids enjoy a tour of the complex and then get to watch the 28page color senior edition print in front of their eyes. They bring it back with them that same evening. It is an amazing trip to cap off the year in Journalism II.


## - Special Moments

- Book Discussion - Unbroken and its themes were the subject of a wonderful book discussion held in February and attended by seventh and eighth grade teachers from both middle schools.
- Poem in My Pocket
- DVMS - Each Language Arts class has a celebration of poetry. In one teacher's room which is turned into "The Kratz Cafe," students decorate pockets, read either an original or published poem (at the mic, of course), and then have some light refreshments.
- DDMS - Each April, in recognition of National Poetry Month, the middle school celebrates Poem-in-Your-Pocket Day. Students spend several class periods reading poems by a broad variety of authors and then select those that they would like to share; they also complete an activity called "Tickets to Poetry," in which they receive ten tickets and write a favorite word on the back of each one. On the big day, the students read their selections to adults throughout the school, and the hallways resonate with the music of poetry. During language arts class, there is a "poetry café," where students sit at "tables" covered with colorful art paper; each table group is given a random assortment of word tickets, which they use to create nonsense rhymes on the "tablecloths." The café
also includes an open mic, bongo drums for accompanying the poetry readings, and, of course, refreshments. A good time is had by all; these activities serve as a whimsical and much-needed release from the rigors of the PSSA testing that students have just completed.
- Eighth Grade Holocaust Unit - This was the third year using the College Board's SpringBoard Pre-AP Program, with its emphasis on a framework of collaboration, metacognition, and shared inquiry using explicit strategies to improve reading, writing, speaking and listening skills. The team of teachers continued to expand the use of nonfiction, both with stand-alone texts and with supplementary text sets.
- The culmination of this instructional framework is clear in the fourth quarter in-depth study of the Holocaust. After researching and sharing important background information, students are placed in academic book clubs, or Literature Circles, where they read and discuss personal narratives written by Holocaust survivors. These discussions are structured around five role assignments: the Reporter, who prepares a summary of the reading assignment to start the discussion; the Discussion Leader, who prepares questions to "seed" the discussion; the Diction Detective, who selects powerful quotes from the reading assignment; the Bridge Builder, who identifies connections between the text and other texts, personal experiences, and real world situations; and the Artist, who creates some sort of visual image of an important incident from the reading assignment. Since the Literature Circles meet five times and discuss a different portion of the text each time, each group member has the opportunity to play all five roles. In addition to their role assignments, students complete dialectical journal pages before each discussion, selecting and commenting on powerful passages from the reading assignment. At the end of each discussion, they rotate these pages within the Circle and respond to each other's comments; students find this activity especially meaningful. After the final book discussion, students remain in their Literature Circles and work together to create a multi-genre project based on their reading and study of the Holocaust. Each group chooses one of three categories: a family album, a poetry anthology, or an underground newspaper; students then work within the conventions and formats of genres from the category to assemble a binder that includes a cohesive title page, visual and print pieces that reflect the group's book and its historical period, and a one-page reflection from each group member on all aspects of the unit. Finally, the projects are shared and celebrated using a Feedback Carousel, during which students have an opportunity to peruse and respond to their peers' work, leaving comments on colorful "sticky notes" in three categories: Applause, Questions, and Suggestions.
- Performance of Greek Myths - After selecting their stories, students in Carmel Kratz's class had to write out a script version as a group, get it approved, bring in props, costumes, etc. They were hilarious!
- Memoir Project -Erica DiMarzio's tenth graders did a project in which they read Memoirs of their choice from the curriculum. In conjunction with this, students read and analyzed essays from the NPR series, This I Believe. Students analyzed and annotated these for elements such as main idea, author's purpose, and effective writing. They were also required to make a personal connection to each one. Students then had to create their own essays modeled after the This I Believe essays. The requirements were very similar to those put forth by the original series: students had to write a short ( 500 word) essay in which they explored and expressed their core principles and beliefs or their most closely held convictions. They had to remember to frame their beliefs in positive terms and employ elements of effective writing modeled by the essays read in class. After they were graded, students had to submit anonymous versions to be included in an anthology that contained the essays of students in both of Ms. DiMarzio's classes. They had to organize and critically analyze the work of their peers before binding the anthologies and writing an introduction to the work as a whole and section headings describing an exemplar in each section.
- Combo Short Stories - Combo 9 students wrote their own original short stories from the perspective of immigrants coming to the United States. Each group of students focused on a different immigrant group. Their stories followed Freytag's Pyramid and included various literary elements. In addition, the stories, works of historical fiction, had to include historically accurate references, dialect, etc. The kids had a tremendous amount of fun with this creative assessment.
- Combo Debates - The annual debates of the Combined English/History program (grades 9-11) were once again a success. In an attempt to put forth the most convincing argument, students wrote persuasive speeches and thought provoking questions. During the debates, students faced global issues in an attempt to better understand the world in which they reside. They also worked on speaking and listening skills as addressed by the PA Common Core.
- Combo Picnic - To celebrate a year of hard work and dedication and to highlight camaraderie, the cornerstone of the Combo experience, the Combo teachers organize a picnic at the end of each school year for the Combo students in grades 9-11 and our twelfth grade alumni. It is an opportunity to come together, share memories, and build our team for the future. This year's highlights included individual student awards that focused on the personalities and contributions of our kids.
- Guest Speaker - Jessie O'Brien set up an author chat with Edward Bloor, the author of our 7th grade SpringBoard novel Tangerine. All seventh grade students attended the live chat and were able to ask questions. It was awesome!

- Alex's Lemonade - The junior Combo class sold lemonade again this year to raise money to help fight childhood cancer.
- Joy to the World - Each year Combo 11 bakes cookies after school and takes a trip to the elderly home adjacent to the HS. Their selfless gesture brings joy and warmth during the holiday season.

- The Water Project - The sophomore class organized a DVHS talent show to raise money to help provide clean water for poverty stricken areas in Africa. It was a wonderful afternoon of comedy, song and dance for a great cause.

The Delaware Valley High School Guidance Department continues to have an ongoing commitment to building relationships with various colleges and programs of postsecondary education. Admissions representatives visit the high school in the fall and spring to meet with seniors and juniors to aid our students in the college exploration process. An Instant Admit Day was held with East Stroudsburg University, for the third year, where 49 students participated in the process. A Senior Parent Financial Aid Night and Junior Parent Informational Night were held to assist parents and students in the financial aid and college admission process.

## GUIDANCE HIGHLIGHTS

- The elementary counselors provide guidance classes to students in Kindergarten through Fifth grade. Topics covered include Caring, Sharing and Respect; Good Manners, Telling the Truth, and Working Together; Self-Discipline; Bullying; and Career Choices to name a few.
- Elementary counselors participated in ESAP and IST meetings with parents to aid identified at risk students.
- Elementary counselors coordinated PSSA's at their respective schools.
- The middle school counselors coordinated PSSA's and Keystone exams for their respective schools
- Middle school counselors conducted $6^{\text {th }}$ grade orientation programs for parents and students who will be entering their buildings in the fall of 2013-2014 school year.
- Middle school counselors provided and coordinated Johns Hopkins information to appropriate students and parents.
- Middle school counselors conducted a Career Day for all $8^{\text {th }}$ graders. Speakers were arranged, students surveyed and session meeting times were setup to assure all students met with a variety of speakers within their interest area. The DVMS Career Day was recognized by Pennsylvania State House of Representative Michael T. Peifer as a stellar program to shed light on the many possibilities available to students in their future.
- Middle and high school counselors participate in SAP and conduct interventions with students and parents.
- Our school social worker participated and completed Truancy Elimination Program for middle school students.
- The school social worker worked in coordination with the counselors, administrators, community agencies, students and parents on all aspects of assisting to promote academic success, open communication and resources within and outside the school.
- Individual and group counseling was provided to decrease academic distractions and promote better coping skills as well as choices that would enhance daily living by our school social worker at the middle school and high school level. Some of the groups included grief group; Girls self-esteem and Motivating for Success to promote better study habits and awareness of personal responsibility for good and bad grades.
- The high school counselors were responsible for the state wide testing for students in grades 9-12. Seniors needing to retake the PSSA were tested in the fall. Students in grades 9-11 were administered the Keystone exam in the winter and spring in the curricular areas of Algebra 1, Literature and Biology.
- All sophomores and juniors were given the PSAT/NMSQT exam in October of which eight students are continuing on in the 2014 National Merit Program, One student was named to receive consideration in the 2014 National Achievement Program and one student was named to the 2014 National Hispanic Recognition Program.
- High school counselors held a Career Day for sophomores with 25 different speakers covering 20 different careers.
- Career groups in the $9^{\text {th }}$ grade level were conducted using the Harrington O'Shea Interest Inventory and the Strong Interest Inventory was utilized with the $11^{\text {th }}$ grade students. High school counselors organized the administration of the ASVAB test to interested students.
- The high school guidance counselors administered 907 AP exams to students in 24 subject areas over a period of 13 days.
- High school counselors Interviewed and organized students for various community leadership camps, Rotary Exchange program.
- Counselors at all levels coordinate, participate or conduct the following for their students -
- Schedule all students (transfer and current) for classes, ensuring proper class placement.
- Work with outside community agencies to provide for the safety and well-being of our students.
- Maintain student files and records.
- Conduct new student orientation.
- Participate in IEP meetings.
- Meet with parents, teachers, administration and students to discuss various topics.
- Provide groups for different topics including anger management, home and family, grief and loss, self-esteem, healthy relationships, changing families, academic success, transition and coping skills.
- Coordinate Chapter 15s and Gifted IEPs for students.
- Work with teachers, parents and students in assisting at risk students.
- Organize and monitor homebound instruction.
- Provide individual counseling, peer mediation

## Highlights

- The DVHS library received a much needed renovation last summer. The library was updated with new shelving, tables and chairs, circulation desk, paint and carpet.
- The 2012-2013 school year saw the addition of iPad carts to the districts' libraries for classroom usage. The students have been enthusiastically using the iPads for research, enrichment and fun!
- Boxes of books, both library and textbook, were sent to DVMS from SES and DVES in preparation for the $6^{\text {th }}$ grade return to DVMS. Those books are currently being processed and will be added to the collection count for DVMS.
- DVMS library hosted several events, including: the DVMS oral spelling bee, an author chat via Skype that Miss O'Brien arranged with Edward Bloor (author of Tangerine), and the Scholastic Book Fair (130 books were added to the collection at no cost to the district based on the profit match).
- The DDMS library hosted two separate webinars featuring singer, Taylor Swift and author, James Patterson. Taylor Swift spoke about the effect of reading and books in her life. James Patterson spoke about his novels, his new website,

Read Kiddo Read, and the impact he hoped to make on children and young adults.

- DDMS also hosted the second round of the spelling bee, and State Police Officer Ives, who visited with the $7^{\text {th }}$ grade social studies classes and spoke about how the law and the constitution affects them as minors.
- DDES and DDPS each applied for and received grants from the KinderMorgan Foundation to improve technology resources. DDES received $\$ 5000.00$ and DDPS received \$4,075.00.
- DDPS library directed and produced special event videos throughout the year, including: Bus Driver Appreciation, $2^{\text {nd }}$ Grade Send-Off, Holiday Spectacular, and Special Olympics/Area P.
- The SES library staff worked cooperatively with the $4^{\text {th }}$ grade team to engage in a district-wide literature program using the novel Charlotte's Web. They also supported the school-wide effort of the Ross Reading Challenge. They library was open as much as possible to assist the students in their goal of reaching 16, 20 and 30 million words respectively.


## Mathematics <br> Kevin DeVizia, Chair

## Highlights

- Over the course of this year, members of the Mathematics Department worked in teams on the revision of the curriculum for the majority of our students in grades 8 -12. The Algebra One curriculum was revised to more closely align with State standards for Keystone testing and the Common Core State Standards.
Department members also worked on the revision of the main core of other curricula to align with Common Core State Standards.
- The Math Department added apps to help students get hands-on with Algebra. The Algebra Touch app for iPads allows Pre-Algebra and Algebra students to manipulate algebraic expressions and equations to discover and better understand the concepts behind Algebra One.
- In October, three teams of ninth-graders from our Honors Block program were honored for their proposals for the development of former Santos Farm land for the new DVES and recreational area for Pike County. These three teams were selected from among twelve teams (a total of 58 students) who presented proposals to local environmentalists and our Superintendent of Schools, John Bell. Their proposals used statistical techniques learned in class to justify that their development would have minimal impact on the ecosystem. The three selected teams presented their proposals at a regular meeting of the Pike County Commissioners, who selected one team to present to the Delaware Valley School Board
 at a monthly meeting. The five students on that selected team included Karthik Ramaswamy, Sofie Lutfy, Jake Ondo, Joey Centanni, and Hannah Matthews.
- In November, thirty $7^{\text {th }}$ and $8^{\text {th }}$ grade DVMS students participated with Mrs. Lindsay Gonzalez in the annual American Mathematics Competition for grade eight. Nicolas Shi earned a first place for DVMS, while Andrew Greene and Connor Madsen tied for second place; Cindy Li and Joseph Scelba tied for fourth place. DVMS is very proud of these up-and-coming Mathematical stars!
- In December, DV welcomed back alumnus and MIT graduate, Raymond Cheng, a participant in the Honors Block program in Mathematics and Science. Ray spoke to all current Honors Block students about the opportunities afforded to
him because of his achievement in the Honors Block program and the skills and experiences he gained here at Delaware Valley.
- In March, three Delaware Valley High School freshmen earned State awards in the Pennsylvania Statistics Poster Competition. This equaled the secondgreatest number of State honorees that our school has earned in a single year. Students were challenged to gather data on a topic of their choice and find a clever, creative way to represent that data graphically to justify a conclusion. The winning projects, selected by a panel of statisticians and professors to advance to the National competition, were:
- Earthquake Occurrence vs. Climate Change by Daniel Adams;
- Is Global Warming Really Affecting Polar Bear Populations? by Allison Wulfhorst

- How Close is America to Another Great Depression? by Meghan Kiederer.
- In April, students competed in a Computer Programming contest at Gannon University. The overall top award was won by DVHS senior, Richard Selneck, for a project that demonstrated a variety of programming skills, understanding of computing algorithms, creative graphical-user interfaces, and good use of technology. Richard won $\$ 300$ for his first-prize award.
- Also in April, a team of programmers from DVHS won first place in the University of Scranton Programming Contest. The team comprised of Anthony Handwerker, Josiah DeVizia, and Richard Selneck finished all seven tasks in the competition with an hour and a half to spare to win the contest.
- In May, Matthew Benintendo, a criminalist with the New York City Department of Forensic Biology, spoke with students about how he uses Mathematics, Statistics, and Biology to solve "puzzles" that help him identify suspects, victims, and more. He used examples from his own experiences to show the riveted audience how the links between Math and Biology are changing the face of Criminal Science.
- In May, $9^{\text {th }}$ and $10^{\text {th }}$ grade students from the Honors Block program in Mathematics and Science presented to a public audience their year-long independent research using Math and Science. The audience also included some invited experts, some of which were alumni of the Block program at DV who are furthering their studies in these fields, including Valerie Langberg, Statistics, Brown University; Hope DeVizia, Experimental Psychology, Kutztown

University; Matt Stewart, Biology, Juniata College; Matthew White, Applied Math and Statistics, MIT. Current students defended their work while visitors questioned them on their results.

- The Math Department hosts a Peer-Tutoring program from October to May, providing students who need help in any math course either individual or small group instruction under the supervision of two math teachers. Students who have demonstrated proficiency in the course tutor other students. Tutoring builds a depth of understanding of math concepts and processes as students find ways to explain and apply previously learned skills. Students who are being tutored often find it easier to understand someone their own age in a small group setting. During this school year, more than 415 students were tutored in this program. In May, the Math Department honored those who served in the Peer Tutoring Program with a celebration and awards presentation following the final tutoring session for the year. The following students were honored: Marina Bilello, J'smier Collins, Josiah DeVizia, Francesca Hommel, Cara Knieser, Taylor Leek, Cathy Li, Mario Marroquin, Cassandra Miller, Nicholaus Miller, Kevin Osczepinski, Dayna Schiffer, Andrew Squires, and Zoe Workstel. Honores as Math Tutor of the Year was Ramonda Giddings, a senior who has taken all of our highest-level courses including both AP Statistics and AP Calculus. Ramonda has volunteered more than thirty hours of her time to tutor students in courses from Algebra One to Academic Pre-Calculus throughout the year. Ramonda plans to study engineering at Harvey Mudd College in the fall. Special thanks go to DVHS Math faculty, Susan West, Christine Marcial, Laurie Osczepinski, Tom Price, Joel Davis, and Jeff Krasulski for overseeing the program this year.

## Highlights

- DVHS-Kathy Farley facilitated fourteen hours of Professional Development for the Career and Technical Education teachers. They focused on integrating literacy skills into the CTE classroom using word walls, literacy centers, vocabulary strategies, Performance Tracker, Study Island, and Bridges.
- DVHS -Critical Reading was added to our high school courses to help students learn to read critically and to respond to constructed-response questions. This course is aligned with the PA Common Core Standards and helps prepare students for the Keystone Literature Exam.
- DVHS- The Critical Reading and Literacy 1 curricula were updated to include the PA Common Core Standards. The Literacy 2 curriculum was revised to meet the demands of the PA Common Core Standards.
- DVHS -The English Department and Reading Department held their monthly meetings together, giving teachers the opportunity to collaborate. It was a positive experience for both groups, and our students benefitted from the collaboration.
- DVMS and DDMS- Reading 7 and Reading 8 curricula were updated to include the PA Common Core Standards.
- DVMS-7th and 8th grade DVMS reading students had a busy year learning and applying reading strategies, preparing for and taking assessments, engaging in fluency activities, and reading both fiction and nonfiction from a wide variety of materials. Students enjoyed the 8th grade novel, The Outsiders, and the 7th grade novel, Everlost. Students in Mrs. Masker's first period class contributed to the morning announcements by reading and sharing a positive message of the week with the DVMS listening audience.
- DDMS-Mr. Irving authored a book entitled Touch the Sky. He invited students to write him a letter. Four 7th grade students took advantage of this opportunity, and they each received an autographed photograph of Mr. Irving. His story it truly motivating and inspirational. With hard work and a strong desire, you can accomplish your wildest dreams.

- DDES-Two Title I parent meetings, one in the fall and one in the spring, were held to inform parents about the program and to provide them with ideas to help their children at home with reading and writing.
- The DDES reading specialists held the $13^{\text {th }}$ Annual Oral Reading Contest on May 24th. One student from each homeroom participated. To determine the participant, each teacher held his/her own classroom contest and chose a student based on ability to communicate author's meaning effectively, voice control, interpretation, facial expression, and overall presentation. Each student received a participation certificate, and the winners from each grade level received a trophy at the end-of-year award ceremony.
- DDES-Title I students were continuously monitored throughout the year to ensure they were receiving the best instruction based on their needs and abilities. They were regularly assessed for comprehension, fluency, and decoding skills and placed in the appropriate programs that best meet their needs. Those programs include Sidewalks, Read Naturally, Corrective Reading, and FastForWord.
- DDES-The reading incentive program, Olympic Readers, was held to encourage every student to read independently and to promote a love of reading. Students read books of their own choosing throughout the school year and then took the corresponding Reading Counts (RC) tests on the computer. The student from each grade level with the most RC points at the end of the year won a prize and was awarded a certificate at award ceremony.
- SES-Shohola Elementary School has a reading incentive for its students: Reading Counts Millionaires. Each student in grades 3-6 that reads 1,000,000 or more words was recognized at the Awards Assembly in June. Criteria for the primary grades: Second grade: 500,000 words, first grade 250,000 words and Kindergarten 10,000 words.
- SES -Shohola Elementary School implemented the Read Live program with first, second, and third grade students. Students have been very positive about using this program. They enjoy practicing the stories and seeing their scores increase.
- DVES-The Delaware Valley Elementary School had an exciting week in March as the students celebrated the birthday of Dr. Seuss. A special activity was designated each day. The highlight of the Seuss celebration was the cake decorating contest. Cakes were judged based on originality and parent/student involvement. Prizes were awarded for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place, and certificates were awarded to anyone who participated. Classrooms also enjoyed decorating their doors and/or bulletin boards that illustrated their favorite Seuss character or book. Ice cream parties or free play were awarded to many of the classrooms.
- DVES -Every month, DVES celebrates authors' birthdays with movies and classroom activities.
- DVES -The DVES Title I Parent Involvement Night was April 17th. The reading staff discussed the importance of students' summer reading. Parents were provided with a variety of ideas and take home activities to encourage reading with their child. They were also provided with a variety of topics and activities through the Reading Adventures Program. Literacy bags with ideas and featured book titles were taken home to make summer reading both challenging and fun.
- DDPS-Experience the Magic of Reading is the spring theme for the Parent Involvement Meeting. Parents were invited to join their child and attend a magic show that correlates with a summer reading incentive and activities to prevent summer reading loss. Children were given a magic hat bag filled with magic trick cards, and a book, P.J. Funnybunny's Bag of Tricks (grades K and 1) or Ready Freddy Talent Show Scaredy-Pants (grade 2). Children who complete the summer reading incentive will have the opportunity to dress as a magician and perform a magic trick that will be televised on DDPS-TV in the fall of 2013: READING IS MAGICAL!

## Highlights

- This year's Environthon competition was held at the PPL Environmental Learning Center. Jennifer Henderson was the DVHS coach. Our students worked in teams of five and were tested in five different environmental categories: Forestry, Soils, Wildlife and Aquatics. This year's current event issue was Grazing and Pasture Management. Our teams competed in each category against both Pike and Wayne county schools. This year our Wildlife Warriors team of Kristen DeVilliars, Kyla Dewey, Shane Boyer, Grace Lutfy, and Madison Metzger won 3rd prize overall in the competition. This is the highest Delaware Valley has ever placed in the event to my knowledge.

- Heather Reitmeyer, Maisha Shamim, Ramonda Giddings, Yakira Mirabito, Annmarie Mullen, and Shauna-Mari Samuel represented Delaware Valley High School at the Tenth Annual Women of Science Competition in Bedford Massachusetts on December 8, 2012. The competition consisted of events involving Biology, Chemistry, Engineering, Environmental Science, Math, and Physics. The young ladies designed and constructed machines for throwing hacky sacks at a target. Twenty nine teams participated in the competition and Delaware Valley's two teams placed $7^{\text {th }}$ and $18^{\text {th }}$ overall.
- Gannon University Programming Competition is an online competition which allows students to create a computer program of their choice. The students get to work on their computer programs for three months before a submission deadline in February 2013. Students from all over the northeast region of the country participate in this event. Richard Selneck, a Delaware Valley Senior, placed first in this year's competition and received a $\$ 300$ scholarship.
- Bloomsburg University High School Programming Competition was held on April 23, 2013. The participants, Richard Selneck, Anthony Handwerker, and Gaeron Friedericks, had three hours to complete ten different computer programs. Delaware Valley High School placed 3rd finishing only 14 minutes after the 1st place team. Delaware Valley was 1 of only 5 teams to finish all ten programs out of a total of 48 . Each student on the team received a 16 GB flash drive.
- Richard Selneck, Anthony Handwerker, and Josiah Devizia, Delaware Valley High School Students, participated a computer programming competition at the University of Scranton on April 5, 2013. Contestants had four hours to complete seven programs. Delaware Valley's team finished in first place, completing all seven programs with an hour and a half to spare. Each student on the team received a $\$ 500$ scholarship to the University of Scranton.
- Yakaria Mirabito,Kate Hammond,Victor Naturale, Erik Decker, Ramonda Giddings, Annmarie Mullen and Like Riexinger, Delaware Valley Senior Science Research Seminar students were accepted by the PennsyIvania Junior Science and Humanities Symposium this year. Participants have to submit a scientific paper to the judges for evaluation and possible acceptance. The students that are accepted are invited to preset at the Symposium in mid-March. DV students presented in the Life Science and Engineering categories. During the two day Symposium our students were able to interact with neuroscience graduate students from the new millennium science center at Penn State. Erik Decker was awarded second place in the engineering category in the state and is an alternate for the National Symposium. Mrs. Martin, Delaware Valley research seminar teacher, was given a cash award of five hundred dollars for being the most supportive teacher of high school research in Pennsylvania
- On February 21 Mr. Robert Curtis took two teams to the Pennsylvania East Design Challenge at Forest City High School. The DVHS Principles of Engineering team, consisting of Jacob Ahner, Phil Plotkin, Stephanie Marcucci, and Matt Mastrelli, brought home the "Best Design" Award. The competition required teams to design a device to lift water from a container on the floor to a container on the table using only some simple materials supplied to them.
- On May 24 Kirstin Blancato visited Mr. Curtis's and Mr. Rhule's Physics and Mrs. Martin's Honors Chemistry classes to speak about her studies in astrophysics at Wellesley College in Boston, Massachusetts. She is currently doing research at Kitt Peak Observatory in Arizona on galactic collisions.
- On October 26, 2012, Mr. Curtis' Principles of Engineering class was able to tour the Bowline Generating Facility operated by GenOn in West Haverstraw, New York as part of their study of the different energy sources currently used in our country. The Bowline facility generates electricity for Orange and Rockland Utilities which includes Pike County Light \& Power. Mr. Chris Buermeyer, Operations and Maintenance Manager for the Bowline Facility, and Mr. Sussman Patel, Engineer for Orange and Rockland Utilities, conducted an extensive tour of the facility while discussing the engineering details behind the facility with the DVHS engineering students. Mr. Barry Short of Orange and Rockland Utilities was also instrumental in setting up the tour. The students were amazed at the
size and complexity of the mechanical and electrical systems at the power plant and had a great time at the facility. They also enjoyed a great pizza lunch and free hats and shirts courtesy of GenOn.

## Highlights

- The Social Studies department received 30 I-Pads this year. Funding for these IPads came through a generous anonymous donation and matching funds from the technology department.
- Superintendent John Bell spoke to Sociology classes on the workings of bureaucracies.
- Director of Elementary Education Peg Schaffer explained and described the "Glass Ceiling" to the Sociology classes.
- Two Introduction to Entrepreneurship students participated in an Entrepreneurship Competition involving 16 teams and had their idea/concept voted as the idea the competitors would be most willing to invest their money.
- Two businessmen, Mr. Noto and Mr. Teeple, presented a slide show depicting the cultural practices in China and also spoke to $7^{\text {th }}$ grade Social Studies students about their frequent business travel experiences to China.
- Pennsylvania State Police Detective Ives visited DDMS students to discuss and explain scenarios specifically regarding the 1st, 2nd and 4th amendments.
- DV School Board member Zach Pearce delivered a lecture/discussion on Political Violence and Terrorism to the AP World and AP Government classes. The discussion centered on Afghanistan and conditions which allowed for political violent behavior to grow.
- In both semesters, students enrolled in Sociology classes went on a field trip to the Pike County Correctional Facility in Blooming Grove.
- AP Government students participated in a Skype chat with Peter Sagal, host of NPR's award-winning show, "Wait Wait ...Don't Tell Me!" as well as the recent "Constitution USA" series on PBS.
- Peace Studies students had numerous speakers discuss a variety of topics including Dr. Evers lecture on the Holocaust. Throughout the course alumni presented information on race and stereotype, tolerance, inner peace, the treatment of women, and volunteerism.

## Highlights:

- Three of our Autistic Support classrooms belong to the Pennsylvania Autism Initiative, a program that is a collaborative effort to expand the provision of effective science-based interventions for children with autism in Pennsylvania. All three of our classrooms achieved "Model Classroom" status, earning scores of $100 \%, 97 \%$, and $82 \%$.
- The High School changed the focus of two Directed Study classes to include explicit instruction in Social Skills. Specific students, including many with Asperger's Syndrome, were recommended to take part in the classes.
- Three Parent Workshops were held throughout the year including "Bullying Prevention: Everyone's Responsibility", "Parent Assisted Learning: How to Become Your Child's Reading Coach", and "Effective Advocacy: Helping You Help Your Child".
- Of the 54 seniors who graduated this year, 18 will be attending college, 17 are entering the workforce, 16 are attending a Technical School, and three are going in to the military.
- Twenty-three seniors were found eligible for services through the Office of Vocation Rehabilitation.
- Twelve students participated in the School to Work Program, with internships at TJ Maxx, Wal-Mart, Price Chopper, Belle Reeve, Milford Senior Care, Best Western, Milford United Methodist Church, Pike County Humane Society, and Pike County Administration Building. Students in the School to Work Program also participated in three field trips to Pike County Correctional Facility, Tobyhanna Army Depot, and Woodloch Pines Resort.
- The Pike County Workforce Development Agency and the Pike County Transition Council sponsored Career/College night on May 22, 2013. Students and parents had the opportunity to gather information and talk to eleven colleges, nine technical schools, two community colleges, and three military branches.
- A total of 41 students attended college field trips to Sussex Community College, Lackawanna College Lake Region, and Northampton Community College.
- Representatives from Northampton Community College, Sussex Community College, and Empire Beauty School presented to students on the DV campus. A total of 63 students attended these presentations.
- Students participated in two events sponsored by the Carbon Monroe Pike Employment Coalition. The Fall 2012 event was titled Tools for Success. Fifteen students attended the event. Students listened to presentations by job coaches, an individual with disabilities who has been successful on the job, and representatives from Monroe County Career Technical Institute, Monroe County Career Link, and Hiram G. Andrews Vocational School. The Spring 2013 event was titled Your Future is Today. Sixteen students attended the event. Students listened to a presentation on how to complete a successful job interview. The students then participated in mock job interviews.
- Fourteen students from Life Skills and Autistic Support class attended the Human Resource Center Open House in Lords Valley, PA. Students toured the facilities including the integrated employment section and the new day program called Our Place Too.
- Middle and High School Teachers took part in a year-long training series on Indicator 13, one of the state's initiatives to improve transition services for individuals with disabilities.
- Speech Therapists took part in three webinars as a part of their continuing professional development. Topics included "Helping Adolescents Develop the Language Skills Necessary to be Competent Communicators", "Developing Language and Communication Power Using a Core Vocabulary Classroom", and "The Framework for the Teacher Evaluation Instrument Applied to Speech and Language Pathologists".
- Our May 2013 Special Olympics event drew over 350 athletes from the area.
- The Special Olympics Swim-a-thon raised over \$3,000 for Area P Special Olympics.
- One of our Special Olympics skiers earned two gold medals at the Special Olympics World Games in South Korea.
- The High School Peer Buddies Club held ten events this year.

## Highlights:

- Students in the Elementary Schools receive two hours per week of Gifted Education. The program is thematically based and centered around students' interests and areas of giftedness. In addition, based on the needs of the students', teachers provide specially-designed instruction through extensions to the general education curriculum.
- Middle School students receive two class periods per week. Students conduct at least one individual, research-based projects that are designed to include multiple content areas. The projects are presented periodically throughout the year. Based on students' Gifted IEPs, classroom teachers differentiate instruction to meet students' individual needs.
- High School students with Gifted IEPs have the ability to take Advanced, Dual Enrollment, and Advanced Placement classes. Within the general education curriculum, teachers provide specially-designed instruction through extensions to the curriculum in order to meet the unique needs of the learner.


# Comprehensive Plan

The Delaware Valley School District Comprehensive Plan was approved by the Pennsylvania Department of Education in the spring of 2013 for implementation from July 1, 2013 through June 30, 2016. Per PDE the plan meets the requirements of Chapter 4: Academic Standards and Assessment, Chapter12: Student Services, Chapter 16: Special Education for Gifted Students, and Chapter 49: Certification of Professional Personnel requirements. The district's Special Education Services and Programs, component of the Comprehensive Plan had been previously approved, thus meeting the requirements of Chapter 14. The goals of the newly approved Comprehensive Plan are provided blow.

## Goal \#1

To establish a district system that ensures that students who are academically at risk are identified early and are supported by a process that provides interventions based upon student needs and includes procedures for monitoring effectiveness

## Goal \#2

To establish a district system that ensures the use of curricula aligned to Common Core Standards and Keystone Exam anchors and eligible content across all schools for all students

Goal \#3
To establish a district system that ensures the use of common, standards-aligned, summative assessments for every course in every core content discipline (English/language arts, math, science, and social studies); these assessments will be used to help ensure the consistent implementation of standards-aligned curricula and effective instructional practice across all these classrooms in every school in the district

## Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools

The Middle States Commission on Elementary and Secondary Schools has extended the accreditation of the Delaware Valley School District until May 1, 2015. The extension was granted in order for the district to have an appropriate amount of time to conduct a meaningful self-study, which is scheduled for the 2013-2014 school year. The team visit will take place in the fall of 2014. The district's Middle States re-accreditation will be in alignment with the goals and objectives of the DVSD Comprehensive Plan.

## Highlights:

- Our homecoming/Warrior Fest was held on Saturday, September 22, 2012. The varsity football team won the game, Lucas Markowitz was awarded the "King of Legs" title, Grace Cadigan was crowned "Homecoming Queen," and the dance following the game was well attended and a huge success.
- DV Boys Soccer captured the District 2 title for the first time since 2005. They were PIAA State Semifinalist and beat nationally ranked Cumberland Valley to advance to the PIAA final four.
- Our Girls Volleyball team won its $3^{\text {rd }}$ consecutive District 2 Championship.
- Our Varsity football program earned its first district championship by defeating Scranton 27-16 on November 16, 2012. Five senior football players were named to the All-Regional team. Five were selected to the PA Academic Gold Team. And 10 seniors will be playing college football in the fall of 2013.

- The varsity wrestling team won their $3^{\text {rd }}$ straight District II Championship and remained undefeated in District II competition for the past three seasons. The team defeated Dallas and Coughlin to reach the finals. The team defeated Wyoming Valley West in the finals by a score of $48-9$. The Delaware Valley Wrestling team also won its second straight Individual District Title, and finished top 8 in the state for the second season in a row. The team had 8 finalists in the district championship with Jalen Palmer, Frank Carrozza, Martin Strenk, Lucas Markowitz, Matt Wagner, and Jack Fagan winning district titles. The team set a school record and District II record with 4 state qualifiers. This past year, the Foundation was able to provide three $\$ 1,500$ scholarships to graduating seniors. This money was raised through the annual golf outing which the Foundation holds yearly in June.
The Foundation was able to raise $\$ 26,000$ in advertising revenue on the stadium scoreboard located in the Warrior Stadium and paid the first of five installment payments back to the DV Board of Education.
Finally, the Foundation was successful in helping raise funds for the high school
Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) team and Scholastic Bowl team. This money was used to travel to competitions and compete at the national level. The money, donations provided by local businesses and the Atlantic Philanthropies, will also be used to support the Model United Nations Club, the history department, and enhance technology within the high school. Lastly, Kinder Morgan also kindly donated $\$ 35,000 ; \$ 25,000$ will be given to the DVHS Career and Tech Education program while DVMS, DDES, DDMS and SES will each receive $\$ 2,500$.
