The 2018 Delaware Valley Prom will be held Friday May 11th at the Kalahari Convention Center in Pocono Manor Pa. The cost of the tickets are \$40 per person and includes a full dinner and dancing from 6-10pm. Tickets will be on sale Thursday 4/12 -4/18 before school and during all lunches. This event is open to all DV seniors and approved guests.

This year the Class of 2018 will be hosting the first ever post prom activity at Kalahari Waterpark! This event will run from 10pm on Friday 5/11 through 5am on Saturday 5/12. All after-prom attendees will have exclusive access to the Kalahari waterpark and entertainment center, a pizza and frozen yogurt buffet, unlimited soft drinks, and a 75 token entertainment center gift card. 




On Friday, February 9th the DVHS Engineering Club competed in the Pennsylvania Governor's STEM Challenge at Colonial IU 20 in Easton, PA. The team, consisting of Richard Albanese, Cody Dailey, Nicholas McBride, Harlan Muttee, and Isaac Thollot, came up with a very innovative design for a portable emergency shelter. The team presented their design to a group of industry professionals for judging. The students worked many hours on their own time on this project. The competition also included a "Project-in-a-box", where the students were given 30 minutes to design and build a vehicle to travel as far as possible in a straight line, using only the materials supplied to them. They finished in second place overall.



FBLA CONDUCTS BOOK DRIVE FOR PROJECT ABILITY – COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECT

The Community Service Project team of Delaware Valley HS FBLA held a children's book drive for children in grades K-6. The books are going to be donated to CDD and Cori's Place, both that service children and adults with disabilities. The goal was to collect 500 books but the community effort was so successful that 2,004 books were collected.

FBLA and Business/Marketing students were informed on how to start up their own business by participating in the Pennsylvania Free Enterprise Program (PFEW.) Students will attend the week summer camp either at Lycoming College or PA College of Technology. The participants make up an "imaginary" management team where they will learn first-hand about the Free Enterprise System. Their task is to turn their failing company into a financial success! They will develop their own marketing strategies, design a website and, make all of the decisions that are demanded of real life company executives.





On February 15th, 2018, State President Shane Fagan spoke at the PACTA CTE Symposium at the Hershey Lodge in Hershey, PA. Along with the other State Presidents of their respective CTSOs, they were honored for our outstanding contributions to CTE and its students statewide. Shane prepared and delivered a three-minute speech highlighting the successes of last year and the goals of this year, discussing membership statistics, state project funding for the Alzheimer's Association, and the upcoming State Leadership Conference approaching quickly. This conference acted as a fantastic way to further promote PA FBLA and its goals to premier career and technical schools throughout the Commonwealth. With over 500 teachers, administrators, and legislators in attendance, this was the perfect audience to hear PA FBLA's inspiring message. Furthermore, Shane had the unique opportunity to network with the other CTSO Presidents and gain valuable knowledge and information to bring back to our organization. Overall, this experience was very beneficial to Pennsylvania FBLA, serving as a stepping stone before the final showdown in April.

The DV FBLA chapter competed at the State Leadership Conference in Hershey the week of April 9h where over 4,000 members competed. Chapter awards received were: first place for the William Selden Outstanding Chapter for all the activities and community service the chapter does throughout the year. There are 500 chapters in PA., first place for the most community service hours – 5,522.75 hours, second place for the top fundraising chapter for the state project and third place for community service project.

Individual event winners were: 1st place – David DeFreese in Open Event Computer Operating Systems, 2nd place – Eileen Nikles – Business Communications, 3rd place, Anastasia Grigoryeva, Database Design and Application and 16 students placed in the top ten. Shane Fagan received a \$2,000 scholarship and achieved the America, highest level of the BAA award. Shane Fagan and Eileen Nikles received the Keystone Leadership award and the following were inducted into the National Business Honor Society: Natalia Torres, Eileen Nikles, Tyler Magee and Liliana Hendrix. Seven students advanced to compete at the National Competition in Baltimore, MD at the end of June.

She brought information about Keystone's Business and Hospitality majors as well as fun swag for the students! 



The Gallery was filled to capacity; the power outages and hardships endured by most of the participants' families did not dampen enthusiasm. In fact, the excitement and turnout was especially celebratory this year. The show, entitled "Unplugged: The Timeless Joy of Making Art" features works from all of the disciplines offered by the high school art program: drawing, painting, photography, computer art, ceramics, and jewelry. The work was for sale; with many pieces selling on opening night, and remained on display at the gallery until April 16th.

Language Arts

Ninth grade English students were treated to an immersive study of the classic novel, *To Kill a Mockingbird* during the wintermonths. The ninth grade teachers used many active reading teaching strategies to help students comprehend the challenging language and intertwining plot lines of the novel. Teachers drew on strategies they learned through the Reading Apprenticeship program. This teaching strategy aids the development of oral reading fluency in grade-level and struggling students. Several classes even conducted a Skype interview with Elmer Pizzi, a veteran whose family experienced and struggled through The Great Depression.




