Title IX policy outlines crucial student rights at DV

Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 requires schools to quickly respond to any reports of sexual harassment or misconduct effectively and actively take steps to prevent sexual harassment. Federal laws prohibit any sort of retaliation, along with a list of procedures that must be followed after a case of sexual misconduct has been reported.

Dr. Peg Schaffer is the district's Title IX coordinator, whose primary responsibility is to ensure the district is following the Title IX policy and to coordinate investigations regarding complaints of sexual harassment and discrimination. Mr. Chris Lordi will replace Dr. Schaffer as the coordinator following her retirement in February of 2022.

Tracey Vitchers is the executive director of It's On Us, a nonprofit organization founded in 2014 under the Obama-Biden administration to help combat on-campus sexual assault and educate students regarding Title IX and similar federal laws. Vitchers recently held a Zoom meeting with DV parents and students discussing the proper handling of sexual assault cases in school settings.

"Ideally, a school district should have one Title IX coordinator per campus, and Delaware Valley only has one for the entire district," she said.

Dr. Schaffer stated that most issues are handled with the building principal, and if not settled, move to her level for a more in-depth investigation.

"I do not think it is necessary [to have more coordinators.] In my tenure of the Title IX component, I have only had employment issues that have come up to my level. I have never had a student issue raised to my level. Most issues are handled at the building level, and it has not been something that has been overwhelming to me," Dr. Schaffer said.

Vitchers stated that every district has the responsibility under federal law to easily distribute the district's Title IX policy, which she said is currently in direct contradiction of the federal Title IX policy.

"The school district is required to widely distribute who the Title IX coordinator is, as well as the actual Title IX policy itself. Right now, that

information is not easily accessible on the district website...To find the Title IX coordinator, students and parents must call the district office and ask, which directly violates confidentiality," Vitchers said.

Dr. Schaffer stated the Title IX policy is on the first page of the handbook, so students and parents can easily access it when they bring home the student handbook contract to sign. Due to the ever-changing position of the Title IX coordinator, the coordinator's name has not been published on the website. However, Dr. Schaffer stated that following her retirement, the district will seek

to publish more information regarding the name and contact information of the coordinator to fit changing federal guidelines.

Vitchers relayed that if a student feels their Title IX rights have been violated, she recommends addressing it with superintendent Dr. John Bell. Vitchers also said students and parents could file a formal complaint with the Federal Department of Civil Rights if they believe their rights have been violated.

"After seeing the thousands of disappointed students' faces, I will be openly considering a woodshop club in the future," Mr. Thiele said.



On Nov. 9, 16 student artists were inducted into the National Art Honor Society (NAHS). Students were selected based on their prolific artistic abilities displayed in school.





Irlen syndrome may affect vision, reading skills

After a minor concussion, I had trouble reading, experienced light sensitivity and felt excessively tired. Though these are normal symptoms for a concussion, my symptoms lasted long past the regular recovery period and were much more severe.

Several of my cousins have a condition called Irlen syndrome, a condition that causes many separate parts of the brain to activate when they shouldn't. Because of this, I decided to get tested. After a weekend trip to Rochester, I not only knew where these symptoms came from but how to solve them. In two weeks, I received a special pair of glasses designed for me specifically. Though you may mistake them for transversals, they were intentionally designed to have a yellow green color. The color helps the brain better process the information it's receiving and is the only proven method to correct the processing problems that come with Irlen Syndrome.

The Irlen method was designed by Helen Irlen over 20 years ago. She was researching under a federal research grant and discovered a group of people showing a noticeable improvement when their reading material was covered by a colored sheet.

Over time, she created colored lenses, which proved to work much better than the filters. There are over 100,000 possible colors, compared to the dozen filter colors. It is rather surprising that no one has ever heard of this remarkable discovery, when 12-14% of students with generally good reading skills can be helped by the Irlen method, which is approximately 180-210 students at DVHS. Early Childhood Education adjusts to COVID-19

Early Childhood Education (ECE) is a three-year Career and Technical Education course. The class teaches students to prepare curriculum and strategies for working with children from ages 1 to 9. Students are also taught how to understand the development of children intellectually, physically, socially and emotionally.

In all the levels of ECE, students spend two to three days of the week working on course curriculum. The other days are spent visiting four local early learning centers and volunteer working with children in the age range of two months to nine years.

The class work for ECE students varies. Students may have traditional textbook and written assignments, group projects or they may work on resource creation.

“Students create resources to use later in their career with working with children,” said Early Childhood Education teacher Mrs. Jill Farr-Bodnar.

Last year, the ECE classes were not allowed into the early learning centers due to COVID-19, but this year protocols have been put in place to allow them back into the centers.

Upon entering and exiting both the Delaware

School, students must wash their hands and are required to wear a mask the entire time they are in the facilities. The students are also socially distant in the classrooms, are limited to work with a child for 10-15 minutes and all interactions with children are tracked in case contact tracing is necessary.

learning centers this school year,” said Early Childhood Education teacher Mrs. Beth Pavinich.



Building CTE students start construction of sports shed

Building Construction students have started work on a new sports shed by the stadium and have collectively worked together on the beginning stages of a long-term project that is likely to be finished in April or May.

The project started when Building Construction class 1 dug out the area where the new shed will be located and backfilled the area with clean stone that will go under the concrete slab. Building Construction classes 2 and 3 installed the wood forms that are the edge of the concrete slab.

The students were able to pour the concrete slab after receiving three yards of 4,000 PSI concrete from Peenpack Sand and Gravel in Huegenot, New York. After the truck arrived, six Building Construction 2 and 3 students assisted with the pour: senior Ralph Courtright, senior Patrick Moran, junior Joe Carpenter, senior Nate Harbeck, junior Tim Cortes and junior Kayla MacDonald.

Once the concrete was placed in the form and the top was screeded level, a first pass over the concrete was done with a Bull Float to make the surface smooth, that was followed by a second one with a steel trowel. Anchor bolts were then placed in the fresh concrete that will tie the walls down to the slab.

U.S. port crisis may result in holiday disaster

Many ports around the United States have been in crisis or are rapidly approaching one right now. They have been blocked with a surplus of shipping containers, piling up for weeks, and it does not appear like they will be cleared any time soon.

These containers are stuck at places such as warehouses, truck yards and parking lots, waiting to be emptied in time for the holiday season.

The problem arose from the combination of the ongoing pandemic, COVID-19 and China's export market. An international freight marketplace, Freightos, has reported that the cost of transporting goods by shipping containers has doubled since May 2021.

One of the most heavily impacted ports by this crisis is the Port of Los Angeles. According to The Business Insider, the largest port in the United States has been shut down by half a million shipping containers. Most of these containers are 20 feet tall

and carry about 12 million metric tons of goods.

Another California port, The Long Beach Port, experienced trouble with these shipping containers. They responded by increasing their hours of operation to 24 hours on Mondays through Thursdays.

The overflow of these containers also pose a great threat to American neighborhoods, specifically ones in California. On Oct. 20, a shipping container fell off the back of a truck and flattened a car in the process. Nobody was injured, but concern is growing amongst residences that are located close to these overwhelmed ports.

The Port of Savannah, located in Savannah, Georgia, is also in the middle of this crisis. According to The New York Times, about 700 containers were left there for a month or more. They also reported that in September, 4,500 containers sat in the port waiting to be unloaded or moved to a different location.

With shipping containers likely to be stuck at these ports for months, many people are starting holiday shopping early to avoid the increasing demand for popular holiday gifts.


70 'Ndrangheta mobsters convicted in maxi-trial

On Nov. 6, 70 'Ndrangheta mobsters were convicted in a maxi-trial, receiving prison time from one to 20 years, depending on the severity of their crimes and if they were an informant or not.

Over 300 alleged mobsters, mob bosses and corrupt officials who opted out of the speedy trial will have their cases processed separately in upcoming hearings.

The 'Ndrangheta is thought to produce global profits worth about \$72 billion each year and control 80% of Europe's



trade of cocaine trafficking. Alleged mob boss, Luigi Mancuso, who is considered the leader of the 'Ndrangheta family, opted for a lengthier trial. Giancarlo Pittelli, ex-senator and lawyer, accused of being the family's white-collar fixer, also opted for a longer trial.

Nicola Gratteri is leading the case, known as one of Italy's most respected anti-mafia prosecutors. He has been targeting Italian gangs for over 30 years, and as a result, is forced to live in police protection, driving in armored cars with constant bodyguard surveillance.

"[This trial] will open the path to yet more trials and allow us to make even deeper inroads into the group. I want people to believe in us and begin to collaborate and have great trust in us," Gratteri said.

Jeff Bezos under fire for allegedly lying to Congress

On Oct. 17, five members of the United States House Judiciary Committee wrote a letter to Amazon's chief executive accusing the company's founder, Jeff Bezos, and other company executives of lying to Congress about Amazon's business practices.


The letter states that the five members of the committee are considering if a criminal investigation is needed.

After a Reuters investigation, it was shown that Amazon had started a campaign of copying products, and they rigged search results in India so certain brands within the Amazon company would get a boost in sales. Amazon denied engaging in any of those

practices.

The letter written by the committee states that the credible reporting from the Reuters investigation "directly contradicts the sworn testimony and representations of Amazon's top executives- including former CEO Jeffrey Bezos." The letter also states that Amazon may have violated the federal law if it is proven that executives lied to Congress.

An Amazon spokesperson later responded to the letter stating that executives "did not mislead the committee." The spokesperson also stated that Amazon prohibits the use of any seller data to be used to produce private label products, and Amazon investigates the situation if it happens to come up.

Climate conference pushes for ambitious goals

The 26th Conference of the Parties, also known as COP26, was hosted in Glasgow, Scotland, from Nov. 1-12, and the remarks and goals made by the leaders who attended the conference are ambitious in nature.

U.S. borders open for nonessential travel

On Nov. 8, the United States reopened its border to vaccinated individuals from 33 different countries including Mexico, Canada and most of Europe.

Travelers may now board airlines as long as they have proof of vaccination

and a negative COVID-19 test taken three days prior to the trip. They will not need to quarantine upon arrival. Those traversing by land do not require COVID-19 test results, and children under 18 and people medically unable to be vaccinated are exempt from this mandate.

The Trump administration passed the pandemic travel ban in March of 2020 due to rising COVID-19 concerns. After President Joe Biden

took office, he publicly announced in September of 2021 that the United States would relax the restrictions.

State Department spokesman Ned Price said that "this policy will further boost economic recovery."

This decision raised concerns for the World Health Organization because Europe is currently battling new waves of coronavirus

infections.

"We are at another critical point of pandemic resurgence," WHO Europe chief Hans Kluge said. "Europe is back at the epicenter of the pandemic, where we were one year ago."

Nonetheless, the aviation industry is seeing a significant increase in bookings as passengers are enthusiastic to reconnect back with their loved ones after being separated for nearly two years.

Corrupt Afghan officials falsify security force records

Attacks in Afghanistan are steadily increasing, while the Afghan security forces decrease in stability and strength. Most of the fighting has occurred in five of 34 provinces in Afghanistan including Helmand, Badghis, Faryab, Herat and Farah.

Former Minister of Finance in the Islamic Republic of Afghanistan, Khalid Payenda, reported that most of the 300,000 troops and police on the government's payroll did not exist. Allegedly the "ghost soldiers" were added to official lists in order for generals to collect the wages.

The Taliban rapidly seized control over the country in August, leading Payenda to blame the advances of the Taliban on the false records that said that the number of security forces greatly outnumbered the

Taliban.

"The way the accountability was done, you would ask the chief in that province how many people you have and based on that you could calculate salaries and ration expenses and they would always be inflated," Payenda said.

A particular instance that was affected by the lack of troops occurred in a cluster of villages called Babaji, located close to Helmand's provincial capital, Lashkar Gah. Twenty four members of the Afghan border police dug into a mud fortress beyond a river bridge under the tricolors of the Afghanistan flag.

The men were relocated there, some 300km from a frontier with Pakistan in efforts to defend against the

Taliban, who continue capturing territory. During the first few days, three border police were killed, reported Raz Mohammad, a soldier stationed in Babaji.

"For two months, we had trouble getting to know the area," Mohammad said.

Captain Ghulman Wali and his men were in Babaji to fill the void left by the "ghost soldiers." However, the low morale was a noticeable problem in the area's police presence.

In a recent investigation, Helmand's provincial council discovered that approximately

40% of enlisted troops did not exist. Possible reasons for the inflated number of troops include corruption of officers and other officials or commanding officers hiding their failures by purposely not reporting casualties and desertions.

Presidential assassinations: conspiracy or coincidence?

There are several similarities between the lives and assassinations of President Abraham Lincoln and President John F. Kennedy.

Both Lincoln and Kennedy were elected to Congress in 1846 and 1946 respectively. West Virginia folklore The conspiracy of Mothman Area 51

The Mothman folklore initially began on Nov. 12 in 1966 in Clendenin, West Virginia, when a group of gravediggers noticed something strange. They reported they saw a massive human-like figure rapidly moving amongst the trees.

The second alleged sighting of Mothman happened three days later, two hours away from Clendenin, in Point Pleasant, West Virginia. Witnesses reported that the creature had bright red eyes and a 10-foot wingspan. The witnesses also reported that they believed the creature was able to fly as fast as 100 miles per hour. Three days after the Point Pleasant sighting, eight more encounters were reported to The Gettysburg Times.

Wildlife biology professor Dr. Robert L. Smith debunked the idea that a flying monster was in West Virginia. He suggested that the creature might be a sandhill crane, which is roughly five foot and has large red eyes. While Smith's explanation convinced some, others still believed and feared that Mothman was real.


To this day, no real evidence has been found that aliens exist anywhere in the world.



Although he did not start out with the drum kit, he has been playing percussion in concert band since elementary school.


He participates in jazz band, concert band, marching band and pit band as well. John Michael plays multiple other

"Squid Game" has become Netflix's most-watched series ever upon its initial release. It has sparked


countless trends and even a cryptocurrency based on the show.

Disappearance of D.B. Cooper stumps FBI

1971 true crime story still baffles individuals decades after the mysterious event took place.



On Nov. 24, 1971, a man going by the name of Dan Cooper bought a plane ticket for Northwest Orient Airlines Flight 305 going from Portland, Oregon, to Seattle, Washington. He boarded the plane and asked for a bourbon and soda. Around 3 p.m. he gave a flight attendant a ransom note stating he had a bomb on him. He then proceeded to open up his briefcase showing numerous wires and a battery. The ransom note contained his requests: four parachutes and \$200,000 specifically in \$20 bills (worth about \$1.2 million today).

When the plane landed in Seattle, the 36 passengers on board were exchanged for two parachutes and the money

that was requested with only four crew members staying on board. Cooper told the pilots to drive to Mexico City with no given route; his only requests were to fly only under 10,000 feet at a speed lower than 230 mph. Around 8 p.m. Cooper jumped out of the plane with the money and parachutes, never to be seen again.

Cooper can be described as a six-foot-tall man in his mid 40's wearing a business suit with a black tie and a white shirt. It was said that he put on a pair of wrap-around sunglasses



before he jumped off the plane. Within the first five years of his disappearance, over 800 suspects were interviewed but most were removed due to lack of evidence or no DNA match to the clip-on-tie left behind by Cooper. There was only one suspect who was a favorite of the FBI, Richard Floyd McCoy. He was eventually ruled out because none of the pilots or flight attendants could identify him.

There was a break in the case in 1980 when a little boy found a brown bag containing \$5,800, in \$20 bills with the serial numbers matching the ones given as ransom. This lead never materialized and the case was officially closed in 2016.

The name D.B. was not his real name or the name given on the ticket he purchased. Someone misheard him when he said his name and as a result his well known name became D.B. Cooper. No one has seen or heard from Cooper to this day.

10 people dead after Travis Scott concert

On Nov. 5, hip-hop artist Travis Scott held a concert called the Astroworld Festival. The festival was scheduled to be at NRG Park in Houston, Texas, on Nov. 5 and Nov. 6, but the second day of the festival was canceled after eight crowd members died on the first day.

Over 50,000 people attended the concert. As seen in videos, the crowd was hectic, and many people were being pushed into others and into the ground.

Houston police also confirmed that there was an individual who was injecting audience members with some sort of drug. Houston Police chief Troy Finer stated that a security guard working at the event lost consciousness after feeling a prick in his neck, which was later found out to be from a needle by medical staff.

10 people ended up dying, including a 9-year-old boy. Hundreds of people were injured, some from the “raging” of the crowd and some from the drug injection.

Scott is facing backlash for not stopping the show earlier than he did. As audience members were receiving medical attention, he continued on with the performance. There is a lawsuit seeking \$750 million from rapper Drake, Scott and Live Nation over the event.


The movie’s incredible action scenes also help the movie stand out from both modern and classic westerns. Samuel was able to create buttery smooth action scenes that help the

Check out “The Harder They Fall” on Netflix for its grizzly violence and its entertaining cast.





‘Spider-Man: No Way Home’



Europe has become the epicenter of coronavirus once again with over 2 million cases last week. Infection rates have skyrocketed even in European countries with higher vaccination rates.

First pig to human kidney transplant successful

On Oct. 21, scientists announced in a news conference that the first pig to human kidney transplant was considered a success, as the kidney functioned normally for 54 hours.

According to Dr. Robert Montgomery, a surgeon at NYU Langone Health in New York City who led the surgical team, the surgery was performed on a brain-dead woman whose family consented to the procedure in September.

“I want to [acknowledge] how grateful we are to the family of the decedent, who in a time of profound grief, found a way to help their loved one realize her desire to give a gift to

humanity at the time of her death,” Montgomery said.

Under the guidance of ethical advisers, kidney monitoring stopped 54 hours after it was last seen producing regular amounts of urine.

Xenotransplantation, the process of transplanting animal organs into humans, has become increasingly

popular due to the demand surge of organs. The pig kidney used in this procedure was genetically modified and was kept outside of the body to monitor its status and

ensure it was not rejected. Pigs' organs are commonly used in xenotransplantation due to their anatomical similarities to humans, in addition to their ability to be bred quickly and efficiently.

Cashierless shopping becomes more popular

Cashierless shopping has been on the rise all around the country. New stores allow a customer to go shopping and leave without having to check out at a register.

On Jan. 22, 2018, Amazon released the first cashierless store called Amazon Go located in Seattle. Eight other stores followed that year including three more in Seattle, two in San Francisco, four in Chicago and one in New York.

When arriving at the store, employees encourage customers to download the Amazon Go app and scan the QR code in the app. At each aisle visited, the app registers what was put in the cart and shows a receipt. Each aisle has its own receipt so the customer can see what was purchased.

Customers have raised concern over whether or

not they would be charged for an item they picked up to look at and put away. Employees assured that the shelves have sensors as well so the customer would not be charged for any item taken off the shelf.

Amazon said they spent several years developing the technology for Amazon Go. The technology includes computer vision, sensor fusion and deep machine learning. Some of the technology is also used in self-driving cars.

Amazon Go has also shown to have some limits. Some customers

complained that the stores did not have what they wanted or many items were not in stock.

Along with Amazon Go, American Express launched their own cashierless store. Their first store is located in the Barclays Center in Brooklyn, New York.

Before entering the store, customers will tap their American Express card on the reader and walk through the gate. Once the customers finish shopping, they can walk out of the store and their card will automatically be charged. A spokeswoman from American Express says the company does not plan on expanding to other locations anytime soon.

Cashierless shopping gives customers the opportunity to have a quick and easy shopping trip with the use of an app or tap.

Apple releases new AirPods, MacBook Pro

Apple released the new third generation AirPods and the new MacBook Pro in late October. The AirPods have an incredible sense of detection to the user's ears, and the MacBook Pro has 21 hours of battery life.

The AirPods "remastered," have spatial audio, which places the sound around the user. The new AirPods can span up to six hours of listening from a single charge in comparison to the AirPods Pro, which only has 4.5 hours of listening time from a single charge.

The Find My app has been enhanced, so now a user can track down their AirPods with the proximity view in order

to see the precise location of the AirPods.

The new pinch control works by the user pinching the sides of the AirPods causing it to play, pause and skip through songs and to answer and end calls. On a call, the AirPods minimize wind noise by an inset microphone in each earbud so that the user's voice is always heard directly and loudly.

The MacBook Pro comes in 14 and 16 inch options and has 13 times faster graphics performance. The M1 Pro can hold 32 GB, compared to the extremely fast M1 Max Chip, that can hold 64 GB of unified memory.

Both chips have 10 core CPU (central processing unit)

and the M1 Pro Chip holds 200 GBs of memory bandwidth, whereas the M1 Max Chip holds 400 GBs of memory bandwidth.



“The girls really bought into our idea of working on the basics every single day, and they were able to make huge strides,” coach Cavallaro said.


She also said the

"CJ had a great game. He made some great decisions throwing the


ball and had some big moments for us," coach Olsommer said
