INGREDIENTS

- I box devil's food cake mix Water, vegetable oil and eggs called for on cake mix box
- 2 containers milk chocolate frosting
- I tube white decorating icing
- I tube brown decorating gel Candy corn

Chocolate candy sprinkles

DIRECTIONS

Step I: Make, bake and cool cake as directed on box for 24 cupcakes.

Step 2: Frost cupcakes with frosting. Place remaining frosting in corner of resealable freezer plastic bag. Snip off small corner of bag.

Step 3: To decorate each cupcake, pipe 1-inch mound of frosting on I side of cupcake to look like head of turkey. Make eyes with white decorating icing and brown decorating gel; add candy corn for beak. To make feathers, pipe frosting on opposite side to hold candy corn; place candy corn upright on frosting to look like feathers. Sprinkle chocolate candy sprinkles near head and at base of feathers. If desired, add candy corn at base of cupcake for feet. Enjoy!

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A Creative and Visionary Genius, Gone

Steven Jobs passed away on October 5, 2011. This man was a significant person in the technology community. He was the co-founder, chairman, and chief executive officer of Apple Inc. He was also the



co-founder and previously served as chief executive of Pixar Animation Studios.

Jobs died at his home in Palo Alto, California, age 56. A copy of his death certificate, which was made public on Monday, October 10, indicates he suffered from respiratory arrest as the immediate cause of death, with "metastatic pancreas neuroendocrine tumor" as the underlying cause. His occupation was listed as "entrepreneur" in the "high tech" business. The cancer had been diagnosed seven years earlier.

In the late 1970s, Jobs — along with Apple co-founder Steve Wozniak, Mike Markkula and others—designed, developed, and marketed one of the first commercially successful lines of personal computers, the Apple II series. In the early 1980s, Jobs was among the first to see the commercial potential of Xerox PARC's mouse-driven graphical user interface, which led to the creation of the Apple Lisa and, one year later, the Macintosh. After losing a power struggle with the board of directors in 1985, Jobs left Apple and founded NeXT, a computer platform development company specializing in the higher-education and business markets.

All of these wonderful creations that we enjoy today were a direct result of the imagination and determination of Steven Jobs. But now, his presence lies below the surface. He will be remembered for what he has done to Apple, and to help change our world.
